SUBJECT: Report to the county commission

At the November 21, 2002, county commission meeting, the following action was taken:

Commissioner Keeble made a motion that the County Attorney look into the possibility of bringing charges against the Planning Commission nominee/member that has been mentioned and look into the possibility of bringing charges and removing from the seat on the grounds that while he was on the Planning Commission he was involved with his own project with the County Executive.

According to the caption for this item in the minutes, this motion concerns the appointment of Ricky Rigsby to the Blount County Planning Commission (the "planning commission"). This motion passed upon voice vote. This memorandum constitutes my report on the motion.

Opinion

The motion suggests or presumes that Mr. Rigsby was involved with his own project with the County Executive while he was on the planning commission. I have been presented with no substantive evidence that Mr. Rigsby and the County Executive are partners or joint venturers or in any way involved in a business relationship to develop real property or in any project; however, I will answer the question in the manner that it was presented. For the reasons hereinafter stated, I am of the opinion that there is no legal cause currently existing to remove Mr. Rigsby as a member of the planning commission.

Analysis

The Tenn. Code Ann. § 13-3-101 governs the creation of county, regional planning commissions. The following provision is found under this enabling legislation, to wit:

(i)(5) The county legislative body may remove a member of such a commission for cause specified in writing served on the member and after hearing, of which such member shall be given not less than fifteen (15) days written notice.

The terminology “for cause” is not defined in the legislation, but it is presumed that it means legal cause.

Both Tenn. Code Ann. § 12-4-101, *et seq.*, and Tenn. Code Ann. § 8-47-101, *et seq.*, provide methods for removing a public official from office for legal cause. However, the Tennessee Supreme Court has ruled that these two statutes are cumulative and that a violation of Tenn. Code Ann. § 12-4-101, if “knowingly or willfully” done, would also constitute legal cause for removal under Tenn. Code Ann. § 8-47-101.

A planning commission member does not violate Tenn. Code Ann. § 12-4-101 because he is a real estate developer or because he has a business relationship with another public official. Indeed, previous county commissions have confirmed the appointment of past and current members of the planning commission who have been or continue to be involved in the business of real estate development. Under the statute, it is unlawful for a public official to be directly interested in any work or public contract which the public official votes for, lets out, overlooks or in any manner superintends. As a general rule, the public official should look to see who has the decision making authority in a matter and who may derive a direct benefit from the decision which is made. If the person who will benefit from the decision is also a part of the decision making process, then a violation of the statute may exist. Accordingly, a public official should abstain from voting or in any way participating in official acts or proceedings which directly affect the public official personally.

I have reviewed a draft of the minutes of the November 26, 2002, meeting of the planning commission. This is the only meeting in which Mr. Rigsby has participated as a member of the planning commission to date. The minutes indicate that Mr. Rigsby voted on approving the final plats for Carter Springs Estates and Kinzel Springs, Phase I; approving the preliminary and final plats for Bart Giffen Estates, Stonegate Unit 5 and the Walker Property; deferring approval of the preliminary and final plats for the Ogle Property; denying a variance for the George Hase Property; approving variances for property located at 4850 Sevierville Road and the McClung Property; approving a replat of the Hayes Property; and approving site plans for the Oliver Williams Property and the Jerry Morgan Property. He also voted in the election of the officers for the planning commission. I have no evidence that Mr. Rigsby was personally interested in or would personally benefit from any of these decisions. Accordingly, it is my opinion that he did not violate Tenn. Code Ann. § 12-4-101 in any official act in which he participated at the November 26, 2002, meeting of the planning commission and that no legal cause currently exists to remove him as a member of the planning commission.

INITIAL RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING ONE OR MORE LOANS UNDER ONE OR MORE LOAN AGREEMENTS BETWEEN BLOUNT COUNTY, TENNESSEE AND THE PUBLIC BUILDING AUTHORITY OF BLOUNT COUNTY, TENNESSEE IN AN AGGREGATE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF NOT TO EXCEED NINE MILLION ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$9,100,000).

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners of Blount County, Tennessee (the "County") has determined that it is necessary and advisable to borrow funds and incur indebtedness for certain public improvements as more fully set forth herein; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 9-21-205 and Section 12-10-115(a)(2), Tennessee Code Annotated, prior to obtaining of loans for said purposes, it is necessary to adopt an initial resolution authorizing said loans.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of County Commissioners of Blount County, Tennessee, as follows:

1. For the purpose of providing funds for the (i) acquisition, construction, improvement, renovation, repair and equipping of schools; (ii) payment of funds to the Cities of Alcoa and Maryville to be used for capital improvements to the educational facilities of their respective school systems; (iii) acquisition, construction, improvement, renovation, repair and equipping of the courthouse, the juvenile center, senior citizens center and other public buildings; (iv) construction, improvement, paving, equipping and repair of streets, bridges and roads; (v) acquisition of equipment and vehicles for the public safety and public works departments; (vi) acquisition of all property, real and personal, appurtenant thereto; (vii) payment of legal, fiscal, administrative, architectural and engineering costs incident thereto; and (viii) payment of capitalized interest during construction and for up to six months thereafter (collectively, the "Projects"), and for the payment of costs incident to the obtaining of the loans hereinafter described of the bonds issued to fund said loans, the County is hereby authorized to borrow money and incur indebtedness in an aggregate principal amount of not to exceed \$9,100,000 by obtaining one or more loans from and entering into one or more loan agreements with the Public Building Authority of Blount County, Tennessee. The indebtedness incurred pursuant to the issuance of each loan agreement shall bear interest at a rate or rates not to exceed the maximum rate permitted by law and shall be payable from ad valorem taxes to be levied on all taxable property within the County.

2. The County Clerk of the County is hereby authorized and directed to cause the foregoing resolution to be published in full in a newspaper having a general circulation in the County for one issue of said paper followed by the following notice:

The foregoing resolution has been adopted. Unless within twenty (20) days from the date of publication hereof a petition signed by at least ten percent (10%) of the

registered voters of the County shall have been filed with the County Clerk of the County protesting entering into loan agreements, as above described, such loan agreements will be executed and delivered as proposed.



A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING ONE OR MORE LOANS UNDER ONE OR MORE LOAN AGREEMENTS BETWEEN BLOUNT COUNTY, TENNESSEE AND THE PUBLIC BUILDING AUTHORITY OF BLOUNT COUNTY, TENNESSEE IN AN AGGREGATE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF NOT TO EXCEED NINE MILLION ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$9,100,000) AND EXECUTION AND DELIVERY OF ONE OR MORE LOAN AGREEMENTS AND OTHER DOCUMENTS RELATING TO SAID BORROWING; PROVIDING FOR THE APPLICATION OF THE PROCEEDS OF SAID BORROWING AND THE PAYMENT OF THE COUNTY'S OBLIGATIONS UNDER THE LOAN AGREEMENTS; CONSENTING TO THE ASSIGNMENT OF THE COUNTY'S OBLIGATIONS UNDER THE LOAN AGREEMENTS; AND APPROVING ONE OR MORE SWAP AGREEMENTS.

WHEREAS, counties in the State of Tennessee are authorized to finance certain public works projects by the issuance of bonds, notes or other obligations; and

WHEREAS, it is hereby determined by the Board of County Commissioners of Blount County, Tennessee (the "County") to be in the best interest of the County to finance the (i) acquisition, construction, improvement, renovation, repair and equipping of schools; (ii) payment of funds to the Cities of Alcoa and Maryville to be used for capital improvements to the educational facilities of their respective school systems; (iii) acquisition, construction, improvement, renovation, repair and equipping of the courthouse, the juvenile center, senior citizens center and other public buildings; (iv) construction, improvement, paving, equipping and repair of streets, bridges and roads; (v) acquisition of equipment and vehicles for the public safety and public works departments; (vi) acquisition of all property, real and personal, appurtenant thereto; (vii) payment of legal, fiscal, administrative, architectural and engineering costs incident thereto; and (viii) payment of capitalized interest during construction and for up to six months thereafter (the "Projects"); (ii) payment of costs of issuance and sale of the Bonds (as defined below) and the Loan Agreements (as defined below); and

WHEREAS, it has been determined to be in the best interest of the County to finance the Projects through a program known as the Tennessee Local Government Alternative Loan Program (TN-LOANSSM) underwritten by Cumberland Securities, Division of Morgan Keegan & Company, Inc. (the "Underwriter"), through the issuance by The Public Building Authority of Blount County, Tennessee established pursuant to the provisions of Tennessee Code Annotated Sections 12-10-101 et seq., (the "Act") (the "Authority") of its Local Government Public Improvement Bonds (the "Bonds") in one or more series (each, a "Series") in the aggregate principal amount of not to exceed \$9,100,000 and the loan of the proceeds thereof to the County pursuant to one or more loan agreements between the Authority and the County (the "Loan Agreements"); and

WHEREAS, the County shall pledge a tax authorized by Section 12-10-115, Tennessee Code Annotated, as amended, to be levied annually to the repayment of the amounts due under each Loan Agreement authorized herein; and

WHEREAS, the Bonds are to be secured by and contain such terms and provisions as are set forth in an Indenture of Trust, as supplemented (the "Indenture") entered into between the Authority and Regions Bank or such other trustee designated by the Authority; and

WHEREAS, subject to compliance with applicable provisions of Tennessee law and the guidelines of the Funding Board (the "Funding Board") of the State of Tennessee, and upon receipt of a report from the State Director of Local Finance, the County and/or the Authority upon approval of the County, may enter into one or more Swap Agreements with respect to a Loan Agreement and/or a related Series of Bonds; and

WHEREAS, there has been presented to this meeting the form of the Loan Agreement, which appears to be in appropriate form and is an appropriate instrument to be executed and

delivered for the purposes intended and the form of the following documents: (1) International Swap Dealers Association, Inc. ("ISDA") Master Agreement; (2) Schedule to Master Agreement; (3) Confirmation for a rate swap transaction; (4) ISDA Credit Support Annex; (5) Financial Guaranty Insurance Policy for Swap Agreement; and (6) Financial Guaranty Insurance Policy for Swap Agreement (Counterparty Payment Policy) (collectively, a "Swap Agreement"); and

WHEREAS, for the purposes of authorizing one or more loans from an Authority, the execution and delivery of one or more Loan Agreements by the County, the pledging of the County's full faith and credit for the payment of its obligations under each Loan Agreement, approving the assignment of such pledge to secure each related Series of Bonds, and authorizing the execution of such documents and certificates as shall be necessary to consummate the sale and delivery of each Series of Bonds, and approving the terms and conditions of one or more Swap Agreements, the Board of County Commissioners of the County adopts this Resolution.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of County Commissioners of Blount County, Tennessee, as follows:

Section 1. Approval of Loans. For the purpose of providing funds to finance the costs of the Projects and to pay costs incident to the issuance and sale of each Series of Bonds and each related Loan Agreement, and make and receive the loans herein authorized, there is hereby authorized one or more loans (each, a "Loan") from the Authority in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$9,100,000. Each Series of Bonds may be issued initially either as bonds bearing interest as an auction rate security ("ARS") determined periodically with a maximum period of 5 years and/or as variable rate bonds with the interest rate established either daily, weekly or for a short-term period (the "Daily Rate", "Weekly Rate" and "Short-Term Rate", respectively, as defined in the Loan Agreement) at the then market rate for obligations with

similar credit quality all as provided in the Indenture and the Loan Agreement. The County shall make payments of interest in the amounts and on the dates as set forth in each Loan Agreement and the Indenture, at a rate or rates not in excess of the maximum rate of interest permitted by applicable law. Each Loan shall be payable as to principal over a period not to exceed thirty-five (35) years from the date of execution of each Loan Agreement. The final principal payment dates, original interest rate mode (as set forth above), and amortization of principal amounts of each Loan may be established by the County Executive as shall be determined by the County Executive to be in the best interests of the County (taking into consideration the existing debt structure and amounts available for debt service of the County), in accordance with the terms of this resolution and each Loan Agreement.

Section 2. Interest Rate Conversion. At any time while any Loan remains outstanding, each Loan and the Series of Bonds issued in connection therewith, may, in whole or in part, to the extent permitted by applicable law, be converted from one Rate Period (as defined in the Loan Agreement) to the other interest Rate Periods permitted and as provided in each related Loan Agreement and in the Indenture (which conversion may include such put features relative to any Series of the Bonds as the Indenture may permit) at the direction of the County Executive and County Clerk and no further action shall be required by the Board of Commissioners.

Section 3. Approval of Loan Agreements. The form, terms and provisions of each Loan Agreement which have been presented at this meeting are hereby approved and the County Executive and County Clerk are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to execute and deliver each Loan Agreement in the name and on behalf of the County. Each Loan Agreement is to be in substantially the form now before this meeting and hereby approved, or with such changes therein as shall be approved by the County Executive and the County Clerk, their

execution thereof to constitute conclusive evidence of their approval of any and all changes or revisions therein. From and after the execution and delivery of each Loan Agreement, the County Executive and County Clerk are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to do all such acts and things and to execute all such documents as may be necessary to carry out and comply with the provisions of each Loan Agreement as executed.

To the extent any Loan Agreement can be designated as a "qualified tax-exempt obligation" pursuant to Section 265 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"), it shall be so designated in the Loan Agreement.

Section 4. Pledge of Taxes. The County hereby covenants and agrees, through its governing body, to annually levy and collect a tax upon all taxable property within the County, in addition to all other taxes authorized by law, sufficient to pay when due the annual amounts payable by the County under each Loan Agreement as and when they become due and payable and to pay any expenses of maintaining and operating the Projects required to be paid by the County under the terms of each Loan Agreement and, for such purposes, the County hereby pledges such tax and the full faith and credit of the County to such payments, provided, however, that the tax hereinabove described will not be required to be levied or, if levied, may be proportionately reduced to the extent of funds appropriated by the governing body of the County to the payment of the amounts described above from other revenues of the County. Such tax, to the extent levied, shall be assessed, levied, collected and paid in like manner as other taxes of the County. Such tax shall not be included within any statutory or other limitation of rate or amount for the County but shall be excluded therefrom and be in addition thereto and in excess thereof, notwithstanding and without regard to the prohibitions, restrictions or requirements of any other law, whether public or private. Any amounts payable under each Loan Agreement falling due at

any time when there are insufficient funds from the tax levy on hand shall be paid from current funds of the County and reimbursement therefore should be made out of the taxes hereby provided to be levied when the same shall have been collected.

Section 5. Approval of Bonds. For the purpose of providing funds to make each Loan to the County, as provided herein and in each Loan Agreement, and to pay legal, fiscal, and administrative costs incident thereto including costs incident to the issuance and sale of each Series of Bonds related to a Loan Agreement, the issuance and sale of each Series of Bonds by the Authority in connection with a Loan Agreement is hereby approved and allocation of such Series of Bonds to the County for purposes of Section 265 of the Code is hereby accepted.

Section 6. Approval of Swap Agreements. Subject to compliance with the applicable provisions of the laws of the State of Tennessee, the guidelines of the Funding Board, and receipt of a report of the State Director of Local Finance prior to a meeting of the County specifically approving a Swap Agreement, if required, the County hereby authorizes and approves the entering into and the execution and delivery by the County and/or the Authority of one or more Swap Agreements in connection with all or any portion of any Loan Agreement or related Series of Bonds, as such term is defined in the Indenture, in substantially the form of the International Swap Dealers Association, Inc. Swap Agreement, the form of which is presented to this meeting, with one or more financial institutions whose debt or claims-paying ability is rated, or is, collateralized, guaranteed or insured by an entity whose debt or claims-paying ability is rated "A" or better by Standard & Poor's or Moody's Investors Service (the "Swap Counterparty") in a notional amount which in the aggregate does not exceed the principal amount of the related Loan Agreement or Series of Bonds declining in accordance with the amortization schedule for such Series of Bonds and each Loan Agreement relating to such Series of Bonds, having a term not

longer than the final maturity of the Series of Bonds or the Loan Agreement to which it relates, providing for fixed rate payable by the Authority, or the County and a variable rate by the Swap Counterparty based on (i) BMA Municipal Swap Index, (ii) the rate on the Series of Bonds to which the Swap Agreement relates (iii) the rate on the Series of Bonds to which the Swap Agreement relates, plus Additional Payments (as defined in the Indenture), (iv) LIBOR or a percentage thereof or (v) such other index or method to be approved by the Chairman or Vice-Chairman of the Authority.

Subject to compliance with the applicable provisions of the laws of the State of Tennessee and the guidelines of the Funding Board and receipt of the report of the State Director of Local Finance, the County Executive and the County Clerk on behalf of the Board of Commissioners will be authorized, empowered and directed to do all such acts and things and to execute all such documents as may be necessary to carry out and comply with the provisions of the Swap Agreement as it relates to a Loan Agreement or any Series of Bonds issued in connection with a Loan Agreement. The execution of the related Loan Agreement and delivery of a certificate, which may be the confirmation of the Swap Agreement, approving the terms and conditions of the Swap Agreement by the County Executive and the County Clerk shall constitute conclusive evidence of their approval of the final terms and conditions of the Swap Agreement and, to the extent permitted by applicable law, no further action shall be required by the Board of Commissioners.

Section 7. Consent to Assignment. The County hereby consents to the assignment pursuant to the Indenture of all the Authority's right, title and interest under each Loan Agreement as security for the Series of Bonds to which such Loan Agreement relates.

Section 8. Additional Authorizations. All acts and doings of the County Executive and County Clerk of the County and any other representative or officer of the County which are in conformity with the purposes and intent of this Resolution and in furtherance of the issuance and sale of each Series of Bonds and the execution and delivery of each Loan Agreement and each Swap Agreement as set forth herein shall be and the same hereby are in all respects, approved and confirmed.

Section 9. Multiple Borrowings. The Loans authorized in Section 1 hereof, the Loan Agreements authorized in Section 3 hereof and the Bonds approved in Section 5 hereof may be executed and delivered in combination with other Loans, Loan Agreements and Bonds hereafter authorized by the County through the TN-LOANSsm Program.

Section 10. Separability. If any section, paragraph or provision of this Resolution shall be held to be invalid or unenforceable for any reason, the invalidity or unenforceability of such section, paragraph or provision shall not affect any of the remaining provisions of this Resolution.

Section 11. Repeal of Conflicting Resolutions and Effective Date. All other resolutions and orders, or parts thereof, in conflict with the provisions of this Resolution, are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby repealed and this Resolution shall be in immediate effect from and after its adoption.

WHEREAS, such a comprehensive website, full scope and interdepartmental in nature, is best governed by a representative body, and it is the opinion of this Commission that the Information Technology Committee is the most suitable entity to which to grant the authority of development, policy, operations, and oversight of a Blount County internet website.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that this Commission:

1. Charges the Information Technology Committee with the task of development of a comprehensive, unified Blount County Website, and granting authority to that committee for developing policy, operations, and oversight, pertinent to that task.

Blount County Government:

Website Development Plan

1. Mission Statement:

It is the mission of Blount County to develop a comprehensive internet website which will allow citizens to access all possible services and appropriate records of the Blount County Government.

2. Legislative Intent:

2.1. In the face of population growth and increased demand for county services, it is imperative that Blount County develop a website plan in order to relieve growing pressure on county facilities and resources.

2.2. An increasing number of citizens manage their affairs through the internet, and Blount County desires to conduct its duties in a manner compatible with the growth of the information age.

2.3. Citizens have a right to access public information and a responsibility for governmental oversight, and the Blount County Government seeks to enable and facilitate public scrutiny as a light to shine on governmental activities. The accessibility of public information should be limited only by appropriate safeguards and not censorship.

2.4. Blount County desires a unified, comprehensive website plan, with the authority for website development, implementation, and policy designated to the Information Technology Committee of the Blount County Commission.

3. Implementation Strategy:

3.1 Website Content: Each officeholder, department, or applicable committee or other county entity shall be called upon to identify those services and records amenable to public access. Input from users should also be solicited to ensure accessibility and ease of use. Any entity which desires to provide information on the Blount County Website must submit to the Information Technology Committee the nature of the information, the appropriate timetable for its regular updating (i.e., monthly, annually, etc.), and an authorization by that officeholder, committee chair, or person in executive capacity for that department that the information is suitable for public access.

3.2 Applicable Law: The appropriate laws and parameters of public disclosure must be followed in the development and maintenance of this website. Analysis of legal parameters would at least require the guidance of the County Attorney, State Comptroller, and County Technical Assistance Service (CTAS).

3.3 Development Policy: The Information Technology Committee is charged with the authority and task of developing this website, recommending disclosure policy and tiers of security for classification of public records, overseeing and maintaining the website, and safeguarding public records. The Information Technology Committee is also charged with coordinating this effort with elected officials and department heads, the public, and any consultant groups as they deem appropriate with budget and expenditure approval required by the County Commission.

4. Development Timetable:

4.1. This website development plan will be discussed in the December 2002 Information Technology Committee meeting, and pending the deliberation and concurrence of that

body would seek authorization from the Blount County Commission in the form of an enabling resolution at the next regular Commission Meeting. Should the Commission desire to proceed, a resolution will be proposed that would call for identification of pertinent records and services, establishment of a budget, and design consultation plans by the next fiscal year.

MUTUAL AID AGREEMENT

This agreement entered into this _____ day of _____, _____, by and among the City of Townsend, Tennessee, and Blount County, Tennessee, as follows:

WITNESSETH:

THAT WHEREAS, *Tennessee Code Annotated* Sections 12-9-101 et. seq., known as the Tennessee Interlocal Cooperation Act, authorizes public agencies of this state to enter into Interlocal agreements for mutual assistance; and

WHEREAS, parties hereto by this agreement avail themselves of the authority conferred by the said *Tennessee Code Annotated* Sections 12-9-101 et. seq. and Section 6-54-307; and

WHEREAS, it is the intention of the parties hereto to provide each of the parties by mutual assistance commitments with a predetermined plan by which each might render aid to the other in case of emergency which demands law enforcement services to a degree beyond the existing capabilities of each party; and

WHEREAS, it is deemed in the public interest for the parties hereto to enter into said agreement for mutual assistance in law enforcement to assure each party of adequate protection.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants contained herein, the parties hereto agree as follows:

1. The parties will respond to calls for law enforcement assistance only upon request for such assistance made by the senior police officer on duty for the requesting party, or his designee. All requests for emergency law enforcement assistance shall be directed only to the senior officer on duty at the time for the party from which aid is requested.
2. Upon review of circumstances involved in a request for assistance and when determined to render assistance is made, each party's response to such call for assistance, will, at a minimum, be one patrol car with one officer and, at a maximum, fifty percent of available personnel and resources. In dire circumstances, the CEO of each responding agency may authorize additional personnel and resources as deemed necessary. While assisting a requesting agency, personnel from each party shall at all times maintain radio contact with their respective agency.
3. During emergency situations, typical law enforcement services required may include mass processing of arrested persons, transporting prisoners, and operating temporary detention facilities. In such instances, the Blount County Sheriff's Department shall be responsible for providing said services and will be assisted by each participating agency as outlined in paragraph 2.
4. If the senior police officer on duty for the responding party reasonably determines that the responding party cannot comply with the request for assistance without endangering life or incurring significant property damage in his own jurisdiction, he may chose to use all equipment and personnel in his own jurisdiction and decline the request for assistance. In such event, that officer of the responding party shall inform the senior officer on duty of the requesting party of his decision.
5. In the event that two or more requests for mutual assistance are directed to the responding party at the same time, thereby making compliance with the requirements of

this agreement impossible for the responding party, the senior officer on duty of the responding party shall determine, based upon a reasonable appraisal of the respective emergencies of the requesting jurisdictions, how best to respond and in what manner to respond to the requests. The senior officer of the responding party may determine to send all available resources under this agreement to the jurisdiction with the most dire emergency, or he may send some resources to each requesting jurisdiction, the said senior officer of the responding party shall promptly inform the requesting officer or officers of the requesting parties of his decision.

6. In the situations described in paragraphs 4 and 5 herein, where it reasonably appears to the senior officer on duty for the responding party that full compliance with the provisions of this agreement is not possible, then and in that event it is agreed between the parties that the requesting party or parties will not demand literal compliance with the provisions of this agreement, but will expect only a reasonable response to the emergencies involved.
7. The Conduct and actions of personnel for the responding law enforcement agency shall be the responsibility of the party sending assistance, and personnel for the responding agency shall at all times be considered as employees for the responding agency.
8. The party responding to the request for mutual assistance under the terms of this agreement shall be liable and responsible for the damage to its own apparatus and/or equipment. The responding party shall also be liable and responsible for the damage caused by its own apparatus and/or negligence of its own personnel while en route to or returning from a specific location.
9. The responding party under the terms of this agreement shall assume no responsibility or liability for damage to property or injury to person which may occur at the actual scene of an emergency due to actions which are required in responding under this agreement; said liability and responsibility shall rest solely with the party requesting such aid and within whose boundaries the property exists or the incident occurs.
10. The parties will pay no compensation under this agreement for said mutual assistance rendered.
11. The parties hereto agree that no claim for compensation will be made by any party against another party for loss, damage, or personal injury which may occur in consequence of mutual assistance rendered under this agreement, and all such rights or claims are hereby expressly waived.
12. At all times officers of the responding agency shall be considered to be employees of the responding agency and to be acting within the course and scope of their employment for purposes under the Governmental Tort Liability Act or Worker's Compensation Law of the State of Tennessee.
13. The senior law enforcement officer of the requesting party shall in all instances be in command of the emergency as to strategy, tactics, and overall direction of the operations. All orders or directions regarding the operations of the responding party shall be relayed to the senior officer of the responding party.
14. All law enforcement personnel employed by the parties to this agreement shall, during such time that said personnel are actually providing aid outside the jurisdictional limits of the employing party in accordance with this agreement pursuant to the provisions of *Tennessee Code Annotated* Section 12-9-104, have the same powers, duties, rights,

privileges, and immunities as if said personnel were performing their duties within the political subdivision in which they are normally employed.

15. The party having financial responsibilities for the law enforcement agency providing services, personnel, equipment, or facilities pursuant to the provisions of this agreement shall bear any loss or damage to the same and shall pay any and all expenses incurred in the maintenance and operation of the same.
16. The party financial responsibilities for the law enforcement agency providing aid pursuant to this agreement shall compensate all its employees rendering aid pursuant to this agreement during the time of the rendering of such aid and shall defray the actual travel and maintenance expenses of such employees while they are rendering such aid. Such compensation shall include any amounts paid or due for compensation due to personal injury or death while such employees are engaged in rendering such aid, if such amounts would be due if the aforesaid personal injury or death had occurred within the normal jurisdiction of that party. Such compensation shall also include all benefits normally due to such employees.
17. All exemption from ordinance and rules, and all pension, insurance, relief, disability, worker's compensation, salary, death, and other benefits which apply to the activity of such officers, agents, or employees of any party when performing their respective functions within the territorial limits of their respective party's jurisdiction shall apply to them to the same degree, manner, and extent while engaged in the performance of any of their functions and duties extraterritorially under the provisions of the Mutual Aid Agreement. A provision of this agreement shall apply with the equal effect to paid and auxiliary employees.
18. This agreement may be canceled at the discretion of any party upon giving sixty (60) days written notice to all other parties.
19. This agreement shall take effect upon execution by the authorized representatives of each party after approval of the governing body for each party, and shall remain in full force and effect until canceled as provided herein.
20. This agreement shall replace the previous agreement of _____ among _____ and _____.

Fair Housing

Enclosed are folders that include information related to Fair Housing. The following is a summary of the information included in each file of the folder:

- a.) Fair Housing Laws – file includes information related to the Fair Housing Act
- b.) Analysis of Impediments – HUD required that counties receiving a Community Development Block Grant analyze any impediments to fair housing. Each County within the East Tennessee Development District has completed an analysis of impediments and actions to be taken. This document is included in the folder.
- c.) Complaint File – includes a complaint form
- d.) Activities File – includes a list of suggested fair housing activities.
- e.) Publications file – press releases, newspaper articles, media related to fair housing should be kept in this file

The contents of this folder should be presented and explained at a County Commission / City Council meeting. After the folder has been presented and explained, a copy of the minutes from the County Commission / City Council meeting should be included in the activity folder as evidence of fulfilling a fair housing activity.

The following information should be covered at a presentation of fair housing at a County Commission / City Council meeting. The individual presenting this information may read this verbatim or summarize.

Brief Explanation of Fair Housing:

The Fair Housing Act was originally enacted as Title VIII of the Civil Rights Act of 1968 and was amended by the Fair Housing Amendments Act of 1988. It prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, familial status, and disability in the sale or rental of housing and in other real estate transactions, with certain limited exceptions. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) is the federal agency with primary responsibility for enforcing the Fair Housing Act.

Prohibited activities:

In the sale & rental of housing: No one may take any of the following actions based on race, color, national origin, religion, sex, familial status, or handicap:

- refuse to rent or sell housing
- refuse to negotiate for housing
- make housing unavailable
- deny a dwelling
- set different terms, conditions or privileges for sale or rental of a dwelling
- provide different housing services or facilities
- falsely deny that housing is available for inspection, sale, or rental

- for profit, persuade owners to sell or rent (blockbusting) or
- Deny anyone access to or membership in a facility or service (such as a multiple listing service) related to the sale or rental of housing.

In Mortgage Lending: No one may take any of the following actions based on race, color, national origin, religion, sex, familial status, or handicap (disability):

- Refuse to make a mortgage loan
- Refuse to provide information regarding loans
- Impose different terms or conditions on a loan, such as different interest rates, points, or fees
- Discriminate in appraising property
- Refuse to purchase a loan or
- Set different terms or conditions for purchasing a loan.

In addition: It is illegal for anyone to:


- Threaten, coerce, intimidate, or interfere with anyone exercising a fair housing right or assisting others who exercise that right
- Advertise or make any statement that indicates a limitation or preference based on race, color, national origin, religion, sex, familial status, or handicap. This prohibition against discriminatory advertising applies to single-family and owner-occupied housing that is otherwise exempt from the Fair Housing Act.

If you feel that your rights have been violated, a Housing Discrimination Complaint Form is available from the City or County. The completed form may be sent to the HUD office or to the fair housing agency where the alleged act of discrimination occurred. You may also choose to report a violation to the HUD office at 1-800-440-8091.

The Fair Housing Act

The Fair Housing Act prohibits discrimination in housing because of:

- Race or color
 - National origin
 - Religion
 - Sex
 - Familial status (including children under the age of 18 living with parents or legal custodians; pregnant women and people securing custody of children under 18)
 - Handicap (Disability)
-

What Housing Is Covered?

The Fair Housing Act covers most housing. In some circumstances, the Act exempts owner-occupied buildings with no more than four units, single-family housing sold or rented without the use of a broker and housing operated by organizations and private clubs that limit occupancy to members.

What Is Prohibited?

In the Sale and Rental of Housing: No one may take any of the following actions based on race, color, national origin, religion, sex, familial status or handicap (disability):


- Refuse to rent or sell housing
- Refuse to negotiate for housing
- Make housing unavailable
- Deny a dwelling
- Set different terms, conditions or privileges for sale or rental of a dwelling
- Provide different housing services or facilities
- Falsely deny that housing is available for inspection, sale or rental
- For profit, persuade owners to sell or rent (blockbusting) or
- Deny anyone access to or membership in a facility or service (such as a multiple listing service) related to the sale or rental of housing.

In Mortgage Lending: No one may take any of the following actions based on race, color, national origin, religion, sex, familial status or handicap (disability):

- Refuse to make a mortgage loan
- Refuse to provide information regarding loans
- Impose different terms or conditions on a loan, such as different interest rates, points, or fees
- Discriminate in appraising property
- Refuse to purchase a loan or
- Set different terms or conditions for purchasing a loan

In Addition: It is illegal for anyone to:

- Threaten, coerce, intimidate or interfere with anyone exercising a fair housing right or assisting others who exercise that right
 - Advertise or make any statement that indicates a limitation or preference based on race, color, national origin, religion, sex, familial status or handicap (disability). This prohibition against discriminatory advertising applies to single-family and owner-occupied housing that is otherwise exempt from the Fair Housing Act.

Additional Protection If You Have A Disability

If you or someone associated with you:

- Have a physical or mental disability (including hearing, mobility and visual impairments, cancer, chronic mental illness, AIDS, AIDS Related Complex and mental retardation) that substantially limits one or more major life activities
- Have a record of such a disability or
- Are regarded as having such a disability your landlord may not:
 - Refuse to let you make reasonable modifications to your dwelling or common use areas, at your expense, if necessary for the disabled person to use the housing. (Where reasonable, the landlord may permit changes only if you agree to restore the property to its original condition when you move.)
 - Refuse to make reasonable accommodations in rules, policies, practices or services if necessary for the disabled person to use the housing


Example: A building with a "no pets" policy must allow a visually impaired tenant to keep a guide dog.

Example: An apartment complex that offers tenants ample, unassigned parking must honor a request from a mobility-impaired tenant for a reserved space near her apartment if necessary to assure that she can have access to her apartment.

However, housing need not be made available to a person who is a direct threat to the health or safety of others or who currently uses illegal drugs.

Requirements for New Buildings: In buildings that are ready for first occupancy after March 13, 1991, and have an elevator or four or more units:

- Public and common areas must be accessible to persons with disabilities
- Doors and hallways must be wide enough for wheelchairs
- All units must have:
 - An accessible route into and through the unit
 - Accessible light switches, electrical outlets, thermostats and other environmental controls
 - Reinforced bathroom walls to allow later installation of grab bars and
 - Kitchen and bathrooms that can be used by people in wheelchairs



If a building with four or more units has no elevator and will be ready for first occupancy after March 13, 1991, these standards apply to ground floor units.

These requirements for new buildings do not replace any more stringent standards in State or local law.

Housing Opportunities for Families

Unless a building or community qualifies as housing for older persons, it may not discriminate based on familial status. That is, it may not discriminate against families in which one or more children under 18 live with:


- A parent
- A person who has legal custody of the child or children or
- The designee of the parent or legal custodian, with the parent or custodian's written permission.

Familial status protection also applies to pregnant women and anyone securing legal custody of a child under 18.

Exemption: Housing for older persons is exempt from the prohibition against familial status discrimination if:

- The HUD Secretary has determined that it is specifically designed for and occupied by elderly persons under a Federal, State or local government program or
- It is occupied solely by persons who are 62 or older or
- It houses at least one person who is 55 or older in at least 80 percent of the occupied units, and adheres to a policy that demonstrates an intent to house persons who are 55 or older.

A transition period permits residents on or before September 13, 1988 to continue living in the housing, regardless of their age, without interfering with the exemption.



If You Think Your Rights Have Been Violated

HUD is ready to help with any problem of housing discrimination. If you think your rights have been violated, you may write a letter or telephone the HUD office nearest you. You have one year after an alleged violation to file a complaint with HUD, but you should file it as soon as possible.

What to Tell HUD

- Your name and address
- The name and address of the person your complaint is against (the respondent)
- The address or other identification of the housing involved
- A short description of the alleged violation (the event that caused you to believe your rights were violated)
- The date(s) of the alleged violation

Where to Write or Call: Send a letter to the fair housing office nearest you, or if you wish, you may call that office directly. (The direct dial and TTY numbers for the deaf/hard of hearing users are not toll free.)


What Happens When You File A Complaint?

HUD will notify you when it receives your complaint. Normally, HUD also will:


- Notify the alleged violator of your complaint and permit that person to submit an answer
- Investigate your complaint and determine whether there is reasonable cause to believe the Fair Housing Act has been violated
- Notify you if it cannot complete an investigation within 100 days of receiving your complaint

Conciliation: HUD will try to reach an agreement with the person your complaint is against (the respondent). A conciliation agreement must protect both you and the public interest. If an agreement is signed, HUD will take no further action on your complaint. However, if HUD has reasonable cause to believe that a conciliation agreement is breached, HUD will recommend that the Attorney General file suit.

Complaint Referrals: If HUD has determined that your State or local agency has the same fair housing powers as HUD, HUD will refer your complaint to that agency for investigation and notify you of the referral. That agency must begin work on your complaint within 30 days or HUD may take it back.

If you need immediate help to stop a serious problem that is being caused by a Fair Housing Act violation, HUD may be able to assist you as soon as you file a complaint. HUD may authorize the United States Attorney General to go to court to seek temporary or preliminary relief, pending the outcome of your complaint, if:

- Irreparable harm is likely to occur without HUD's intervention
- There is substantial evidence that a violation of the Fair Housing Act occurred

Example: A builder agrees to sell a house but, after learning the buyer is black, fails to keep the agreement. The buyer files a complaint with HUD. HUD may authorize the Attorney General to go to court to prevent a sale to any other buyer until HUD investigates the complaint.


What Happens After A Complaint Investigation?

If, after investigating your complaint, HUD finds reasonable cause to believe that discrimination occurred, it will inform you. Your case will be heard in an administrative hearing within 120 days, unless you or the respondent want the case to be heard in Federal district court. Either way, there is no cost to you.

The Administrative Hearing: If your case goes to an administrative hearing HUD attorneys will litigate the case on your behalf. You may intervene in the case and be represented by your own attorney if you wish. An Administrative Law Judge (ALJ) will consider evidence from you and the respondent. If the ALJ decides that discrimination occurred, the respondent can be ordered:

- To compensate you for actual damages, including humiliation, pain and suffering.
- To provide injunctive or other equitable relief, for example, to make the housing available to you.
- To pay the Federal Government a civil penalty to vindicate the public interest. The maximum penalties are \$11,000 for a first violation, \$27,500 for a previous violation within the preceding five year period and \$55,000 for two or more previous violations within the preceding seven years.
- To pay reasonable attorney's fees and costs.

Federal District Court: If you or the respondent choose to have your case decided in Federal District Court, the Attorney General will file a suit and litigate it on your behalf. Like the ALJ, the District Court can order relief, and award actual damages, attorney's fees and costs. In addition, the court can award punitive damages.




In Addition

You May File Suit: You may file suit, at your expense, in Federal District Court or State Court within two years of an alleged violation. If you cannot afford an attorney, the court may appoint one for you. You may bring suit even after filing a complaint, if you have not signed a conciliation agreement and an Administrative Law Judge has not started a hearing. A court may award actual and punitive damages and attorney's fees and costs.

Other Tools to Combat Housing Discrimination:

- If there is noncompliance with the order of an Administrative Law Judge, HUD may seek temporary relief, enforcement of the order or a restraining order in a United States Court of Appeals.
- The Attorney General may file a suit in Federal District Court if there is reasonable cause to believe a pattern or practice of housing discrimination is occurring.

FAIR HOUSING LAWS

CIVIL RIGHTS ACT of 1866

This act provides that all citizens of the United States shall have the right, in every state and territory, as is enjoyed by white citizens thereof to inherit, purchase, lease, sell, hold and convey real and personal property.

EXECUTIVE ORDER 11063 (issued November 20, 1962 by President Kennedy)

This order prohibits discrimination based on race, color, creed, or national origin with respect to the sale, leasing, rental or other disposition of residential property and related facilities if the property or facility is owned or operated by the federal government, provided in whole or in part with loans, advances, grants or contributions made by the federal government. It also prohibits discrimination by lending institutions when such practices relate to loans insured or guaranteed by the federal government. Enforcement is dispersed throughout government.

TITLE VI of the CIVIL RIGHTS ACT of 1964

This section provides that no person shall, because of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, denied the benefits of, or subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving federal financial assistance (including housing).

TITLE VIII of the CIVIL RIGHTS ACT of 1968

This section makes illegal any discrimination in the sale, lease, or rental of real property on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, or national origin. This law requires that people be treated equally with no difference in the terms and conditions of sale, purchase, lease, or rental, and with no denial of equal housing opportunity based on the characteristics listed above.

THE FAIR HOUSING AMENDMENTS ACT of 1988

The Fair Housing Amendments Act of 1988, amends Title VIII of the Civil Rights Act of 1968, which prohibits discrimination in the sale, rental, or financing of housing on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, or national origin. The 1988 Amendments expanded the protections to persons with disabilities and families with children.

HUD regulation (Federal Register Vol. 54, No. 13 effective March 12, 1989)

Issued its regulation including provisions regarding modification of premises, reasonable accommodation in policies and practices and design and construction requirements for new multifamily housing.

STATE of TENNESSEE (T.C.A.4-21-601, 1994 Supplement)
Part 6 - DISCRIMINATION IN HOUSING AND FINANCING

4-21-601. Discriminatory housing practices generally. - (a) It is a discriminatory practice for any person because of race, color, creed, religion, sex, handicap, familial status or national origin, to:

(1) Refuse to sell or rent after the making of a bona fide offer, or refuse to negotiate for the sale or rental of, or otherwise make unavailable or deny, real property or a housing accommodation to a person;

(2) Discriminate against any person in the terms, conditions, or privileges of sales or rental of real property or a housing accommodation, or in the provision of services or facilities in connection therewith;

(3) Refuse to receive or transmit a bona fide offer to purchase, rent or lease real property or a housing accommodation from a person;

(4) Represent to a person that real property or a housing accommodation is not available for inspection, sale, rental or lease when in fact it is so available, or to refuse to permit a person to inspect real property or a housing accommodation;

(5) Make, print, publish, circulate, post or mail or cause to be made, printed, published, circulated, posted or mailed a notice, statement, advertisement or sign, or use a form of application for the purchase, rental or lease of real property or a housing accommodation for the purchase, rental or lease of real property or housing accommodation, or make a record of inquiry in connection with the prospective purchase, rental or lease of real property or a housing accommodation, which indicates, directly or indirectly, a limitation, specification or discrimination as to race, color, creed, religion, sex, handicap, familial status or national origin or intent to make such a limitation, specification or discrimination;

(6) Offer, solicit, accept, use or retain a listing of real property or a housing accommodation for sale, rental or lease with the understanding that a person may be discriminated against in the sale, rental or lease of that real property or housing accommodation or in the furnishing of facilities or services in connection therewith; or

(7) Deny any person access to, or membership or participation in, any multiple-listing services, real estate brokers' organization or other service, organization or facility relating to the business of selling or renting dwellings, or to discriminate against such person in the terms or conditions of such access, membership or participation.

(b)(1) It is a discriminatory practice for any person to:

(A) Discriminate in the sale or rental of, or otherwise make unavailable or deny, a dwelling to any buyer or renter because of a handicap of:

(i) The buyer or renter;

(ii) A person residing in or intending to reside in the dwelling after it is so sold, rented or made available; or

(iii) Any person associated with the buyer or renter; or

(B) Discriminate against any person in the terms, conditions or privileges of sales or rental of a dwelling, or in the provision of services or facilities in connection with such dwelling, because of a handicap of:

- (i) The person;
- (ii) A person residing in or intending to reside in the dwelling after it is so sold, rented or made available; or
- (iii) Any person associated with the person.

(2) For purposes of this subsection, "discrimination" includes:

(A) A refusal to permit, at the expense of the handicapped person, reasonable modifications of existing premises occupied or to be occupied by such person if such modifications may be necessary to afford such a person full enjoyment of the premises; except that, in the case of a rental, no modification need be permitted unless the renter first agrees to restore the interior of the premises to the condition that existed before the modification, reasonable wear and tear excepted, unless previously negotiated with the landlord;

(B) A refusal to make reasonable accommodations in rules, policies, practices or services, when such accommodations may be necessary to afford such person equal opportunity to use and enjoy a dwelling; or

(C) In connection with the design and construction of covered multifamily dwellings for first occupancy after March 13, 1991, a failure to design and construct those dwellings in such a manner that:

(i) The dwellings have at least one (1) building entrance on an accessible route, unless it is impractical to do so because of terrain or unusual site characteristics; or

(ii) With respect to dwellings with a building entrance on an accessible route:

(a) The public use and common use portions of such dwellings are readily accessible to and usable by handicapped persons;

(b) All the doors designed to allow passage into and within all premises within such dwellings are sufficiently wide to allow passage by handicapped persons in wheelchairs; and

(c) All premises within such dwellings contain the following features of adaptive design:

(1) An accessible route into and through the dwelling;

(2) Light switches, electrical outlets, thermostats and other environmental controls in accessible locations;

(3) Reinforcements in bathroom walls to allow later installation of grab bars; and

(4) Usable kitchens and bathrooms, such that an individual in a wheelchair can maneuver about the space.

(3) Compliance with the appropriate requirements of the American National Standard for buildings and facilities providing accessibility and usability for physically handicapped people (commonly cited as "ANSI A117.1") suffices to satisfy the requirements of subdivision (b)(2)(C)(ii).

(4) As used in this subsection, "covered multifamily dwellings" means:

(A) Buildings consisting of four (4) or more units if such buildings have one (1) or more elevators; and

(B) Ground floor units in other buildings consisting of four (4) or more units.

(5) Nothing in this subsection requires that a dwelling be made available to an individual whose tenancy would constitute a direct threat to the health or safety of other

individuals or whose tenancy would result in substantial physical damage to the property of others.

(c) It is a discriminatory practice for a person in the business of insuring against hazards to refuse to enter into, or discriminate in the terms, conditions, or privileges of, a contract of insurance against hazards to a housing accommodation or real property because of the race, color, creed, religion, sex or national origin of the person owning, or residing in or near the housing accommodations or real property.

(d) It is a discriminatory practice for a person to coerce, intimidate, threaten or interfere with any person in the exercise of enjoyment of, or on account of his or her having exercised or enjoyed, or on account of his or her having aided or encourage any other person in the exercise or enjoyment of, any right granted or protected by the provisions of this chapter.

(e) This section may also be enforced by appropriate civil actions. [Acts 1984, ch. 1007, § 4; T.C.A., § 4-21-127; Acts 1990, ch. 937, §§ 2, 3; 1992, ch. 1027, §§ 10, 11.]

4-21-602. Exemption from housing provisions. - (a) Nothing in § 4-21-601 shall apply to:

(1) The rental of housing accommodations in a building which contains housing accommodations for not more than two (2) families living independently of each other, if the owner or a member of the owner's family resides in one (1) of the housing accommodations;

(2) The rental of one (1) room or one (1) rooming unit in a housing accommodation by an individual if such individual or a member of such individual's family resides therein, or, as regards to sex, rooms or rental units where the tenants would be required to share a common bath;

(3) A religious organization, association, or society, or any nonprofit institution or organization operated, supervised or controlled by or in conjunction with a religious organization, association, or society, which limits the sale, rental or occupancy of dwellings which it owns or operates for other than a commercial purpose to persons of the same religion, or which give preference to such persons, unless membership in such religion is restricted on account of race, color, or national origin;

(4) As regards to sex, the rental of housing accommodations of single-sex dormitory rental properties, including, but not limited to, those dormitories operated by higher educational institutions.

(b) [Deleted by 1992 amendment]

(c) Nothing in this chapter shall require a real estate operator to negotiate with any individual who has not shown evidence of financial ability to consummate the purchase or rental of a housing accommodation.

(d) [Deleted by 1992 amendment]

(e) Nothing in subsections (a) and (b) shall prohibit the use of attorneys, escrow agents, abstractors, title companies and other such professional assistance as necessary to perfect or transfer the title.

(f)(1) Nothing in this part limits the applicability of any reasonable local, state or federal restrictions regarding the maximum number occupants permitted to occupy a dwelling. Nor does any provision in this part regarding familial status apply with respect to

dwellings provided under any state or federal program specifically designed and operated to assist elderly persons, as defined in the state or federal program, or a housing for older persons.

(2) As used in this subsection, "housing for older persons" means housing communities consisting of dwellings:

(A)(i) Intended for, and at least ninety percent (90%) occupied by, at least one (1) person fifty-five (55) years of age or older per unit;

(ii) Providing significant facilities and services specifically designed to meet the physical or social needs of such persons; and

(iii) Publishing and adhering to policies and procedures which demonstrate an intent by the owner or manager to provide housing for persons fifty-five (55) years of age or older;

(B) Intended for and occupied solely by persons sixty-two (62) years of age or older.

(3) Nothing in this part prohibits conduct against a person because such person has been convicted by any court of competent jurisdiction of the illegal manufacture or distribution of a controlled substance as defined in § 102 of the Controlled Substances Act (21 U.S.C. § 802), or as defined in the Tennessee Drug Control Act, compiled in title 39, chapter 17, part 4. [Acts 1984, ch. 1007, § 5; T.C.A., § 4-21-128; Acts 1990, ch. 937, § 4; 1992, ch. 1027, §§ 12-15.]

4-21-603. Blockbusting. - It is a discriminatory practice for a real estate operator, a real estate broker, a real estate salesman, a financial institution, an employee of any of these, or any other person, for the purpose of inducing a real estate transaction from which such person may benefit financially to:

(1) Represent that a change has occurred or will or may occur in the composition with respect to race, color, creed, religion, sex, handicap, familial status or national origin of the owners or occupants in the block, neighborhood or area in which the real property is located; or

(2) Represent that this change will or may result in the lowering of property values, and increase in criminal or antisocial behavior, or a decline in the quality of schools in the block, neighborhood or area in which the real property is located. [Acts 1984, ch. 1007, § 6; T.C.A., § 4-21-129; Acts 1992, ch. 1027, § 16.]

4-21-606. Residential real estate-related transactions. - (a) It is an unlawful practice for any person or other entity whose business includes engaging in residential real estate-related transactions to discriminate against any person in making available such transaction, or in the terms and conditions of such transaction, because of race, color, creed, religion, sex, handicap, familial status or national origin.

(b) As used in this section, "residential real estate-related transaction" means:

(1) The making or purchasing of loans or providing financial assistance:

(A) For purchasing, constructing, improving, repairing, or maintaining a dwelling;

(B) Where the security is residential real estate; or

(2) The selling, brokering, or appraising of residential real estate. [Acts 1984, ch. 1007, § 9; T.C.A., § 4-21-132; Acts 1992, ch. 1027, § 17.]

THE EQUAL CREDIT OPPORTUNITY ACT

This act makes it unlawful for creditors to discriminate against any applicant with respect to any aspect of a credit transaction, including any mortgage transaction, on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, marital status, age (provided the applicant has the capability to contract), or because all or part of the applicant's income derives from any public assistance programs. It covers many of the same violations which are covered under Title VIII.

SECTION 109 of the HOUSING and COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT ACT of 1974

This prohibits discrimination in programs and activities funded under Title I of the act establishing the Community Development Block Grant programs administered by HUD based on race, color, national origin, or sex.

FAIR HOUSING LAW

1. Prohibit discrimination in housing on the basis of:
 - ☆ Disability
 - ☆ Familial Status
2. Strengthen the administrative enforcement provisions of Title VIII.
3. Provide for the award of monetary damages where discriminatory housing practices are found.

The following actions are considered to be discriminatory under the Fair Housing Law:

- ☆ **Refusing to sell, rent, deal, or negotiate with any person.**
- ☆ **Discriminating in terms or conditions for buying or renting.**
- ☆ **Advertising that housing is available only to persons of a certain race, color, religion, sex, national origin, or of a specific family size.**
- ☆ **Denying that housing is available for inspection, sale or rent when it really is available.**
- ☆ **"Blockbusting" - persuading owners to sell or rent housing by telling them that minority groups are moving into the neighborhood.**
- ☆ **Denying or making different terms or conditions for home loans by commercial lenders, such as banks, savings and loans, and insurance companies.**
- ☆ **Denying to anyone the use of or participation in any real estate services, such as broker organizations, multiple-listing services or other facilities related to the selling and renting of housing.**
- ☆ **Refusing to allow reasonable accommodation to be made for a person with disabilities.**

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Analysis of Impediments for Blount County

1. INTRODUCTION/GENERAL SUMMARY OF ANALYSIS

Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1968 prohibits discrimination in the sale, rental and financing of dwellings based on color, religion, sex or national origin. The Fair Housing Amendments Act of 1988, which became effective March 12, 1989, expands the coverage of Title VIII to 1) prohibit discrimination in housing on the basis of disability or familial status, 2) strengthen the administrative enforcement provisions of Title VIII and 3) provide for the award of monetary damages where discriminatory housing practices are found.

Blount County and the City of Townsend, as recipients of Community Development Block Grant funds, are required to affirmatively further fair housing. For this reason, a Fair Housing Plan including an Analysis of Impediments has been conducted encompassing the entire County and its municipalities. The goal of the Analysis is to identify any actions, or decisions by individuals that were discriminatory or may be construed as discriminatory as defined above.

Included in the Analysis is the methodology used, funding sources, findings and conclusions. Representatives of Blount County, the City of Townsend, special interests groups, realtors, bankers, and County residents were all contacted and given an opportunity to respond through a public meeting and a County-wide survey. A large portion of the information in this study was generated from census data, the public meeting and interest group surveys.

The evaluation indicates that Blount County has an open and fair housing market. Persons with similar income levels appear to have available to them the same housing choices regardless of race, color, religion, sex handicap, national origin, or familial status.

A. **Who conducted/Methodology Used**

This study was conducted by the project administrators of the Blount County 2000 CDBG Project - the East Tennessee Development District and the project administrators of the City of Townsend 2000 CDBG Project - Barge, Waggoner, Sumner and Cannon, Inc., . Assistance was provided by the Honorable Sandra Headrick, Mayor of the City of Townsend, the Honorable Bill Crisp, Blount County Executive, County Executive and the Mayors of Alcoa, Friendsville, Louisville, Maryville, and Rockford. A questionnaire, public meeting notice and a copy of the Title VI of the 1964 Civil Rights Act was mailed to twenty-six realty offices, twelve financial institutions, thirty-one insurance agencies and one housing authority within Blount County. Each recipient was asked to display the information in a publically visible location. Additionally, the public meeting notice was published in the Daily

Times which serves all of Blount County.

B. How Funded

The City of Townsend and Blount County were both awarded CDBG funds by the State of Tennessee in program year 2000. The administration funds which were approved within the two project budgets were utilized to fund expenses incurred in the preparation of this Analysis of Impediments.

C. Findings

There were no findings revealed during the review of the Fair Housing practices in Blount County. The Tennessee Human Rights Commission does not have complains on file for anyone in Blount County. Please refer to Exhibit A. All City and County officials have reviewed the Analysis of Impediments and are in concurrence with the document's findings. In the area of fair housing there is minimal communication between the County and its municipalities in the area of fair housing policy. The communities within the County are only marginally aware of the efforts of their neighbors and are not joined in the effort to further fair housing opportunities. A County-wide plan should be formulated.

D. Conclusions, a short summary

There were no impediments to Fair Housing identified in Blount County. No Fair Housing complaints were brought forward and restrictive zoning and discriminatory policies and practices appear to be absent. Each City, Town or County elected official represented in this analysis has reviewed the issues associated with potential impediments as they relate to fair housing. Additionally, all City, Town and County-wide data has been discussed with elected officials. Each is dedicated to continuing practice of Fair Housing within their communities. A Fair Housing Activity will be conducted by the City of Townsend and Blount County as required by the CDBG program.

Transportation Profile

Blount County is located in middle Eastern Tennessee at the foothills of the Great Smoky Mountains National Park. Blount County is served by a number of U.S. Highways (U.S. 312, U.S. 411, U.S. 129) and is approximately 8 miles away from Interstate 40 and 15 miles away from Interstate 75. The regional airport that serves middle East Tennessee, the McGhee Tyson Airport, is located in Blount County. There are two major roadways utilized for getting to the airport. For this reason, it is easily accessible. The County is bordered by Sevier County, Knox County, Loudon County, Monroe County, and the North Carolina state line.

The CSX Railroad runs in a Northeastern direction in the County. Other major transportation routes in Blount County are the Tennessee and Little Tennessee Rivers. Both of these rivers are controlled through the TVA lock system giving Blount County an advantage most communities in Tennessee do not possess in the transportation of industrial cargo.

3. EVALUATION OF JURISDICTION'S CURRENT FAIR HOUSING PROFILE

A. Have any fair housing complaints been filed with any local, state or federal agency? If yes, what is the present status of the complaint?

No fair housing complaints have been filed with any local, state, or federal agency with the Blount County Jurisdiction. The Tennessee Human Rights Commission is the state agency which monitors all fair housing submitted. When the Agency was contacted, a memo from their staff was returned stating no fair housing complaints had been filed against Blount County or any municipalities within the County. This memo is located in Exhibit B.

B. Identification of other fair housing concerns or problems.

There were nine responses to the Analysis of Impediments survey that was mailed to organizations/groups that are involved with the sale or rental of housing in Blount County. Most of the responses stated that there were no

fair housing concerns or problems in Blount County. However, some responses did contain comments about neighborhood safety issues or the cost of rental/owner occupied housing. The concerns listed were:

Maryville Housing Authority units not well patrolled by police;
Rental rates increase whenever Social Security cost of living increases are given;
Building codes increase cost of housing;
Credit scoring limits the ability of lower income residents to acquire a loan.

Despite the concerns listed above, it can be concluded that there are no impediments to fair housing in Blount County or the municipalities located in Blount County, and that fair housing opportunities are just and equitable throughout Blount County.

4. IDENTIFICATION OF IMPEDIMENTS TO FAIR HOUSING CHOICE

A. In the sale or rental of housing

1. All local realtors are providing service in accordance with the real estate principals and Civil Rights Laws that prohibit discriminatory practices. Each licensed Realtor is affiliated with the State Board of Realtors and have adopted the HUD Affirmative Marketing Agreement. Therefore, as indicated, there appears to be no evidence of unlawful practices related to steering or block busting within the area in which these Realtors serve.
2. Are there any deed restriction, trust or lease provisions that would prohibit fair housing choices for anyone of a protected class?

According to Blount County Registrar of Deeds, Ms. Beverley Woodruff, there are no deed restrictions which would prohibit the Fair Housing choices available to the citizens of Blount County whether in a protected class or not. Local realtors feel the contracts, lease agreements and all other documents used in their field do not restrict fair housing choices to the areas residents.

3. Do any of the property management firms participate in "occupancy quotes"?

All property management firms in Blount County were contacted including the housing authority. None participate in occupancy quotas. All units were occupied by residents with varying demographic characteristics. There are units in the County designated specifically for elderly and 32 units are reserved specifically for the disabled.

B. Provision of Housing Brokerage Services

1. **Are any real estate firms excluding minority brokers from participation in multiple listing service or the real estate broker's association?**

All responding real estate firms in Blount County feel that the firms in the County provide open access to multiple listing services and the real estate brokers association.

2. **Is there any restricted use of privileges, services or facilities by all brokers?**

There were no restricted services or facilities revealed.

3. **Are any assignments of brokers and areas being made by racial/ethnic composition of census tracts?**

There are no assignments of brokers to areas in regard to racial/ethnic composition of census tracts according to the responses of the brokers in Blount County.

C. Provision of Financing Assistance for Dwellings

1. **What steps are taken by lending institutions to insure there are no discriminatory lending patterns, practices and disclosures?**

The lending institutions of Blount County have adopted and enforce fair lending standards as required by the Home Mortgage Disclosure Act. The Uniform Residential Loan Application is used by all mortgage lenders. All lending institutions in Blount County make information public that is related to lending patterns. If an applicant is denied the institution must disclose the reason. In the investigation of lending institutions performed for this study, no discriminatory lending patterns were discovered.

2. **What steps are taken to insure there are no discriminatory appraisal and underwriting practices?**

All appraisers for lending institutions must be licensed. They are required to comply with the Uniform State Appraisal Regulations. These regulations prohibit discriminatory and unfair appraisal services. Underwriters must also follow these regulations which prohibits discrimination in the lending market.

3. What steps are taken to insure that disinvestment, redlining, facial credit steering are not being used?

All financial institutions in Blount County are regulated by the Financial Institutions Examination Council. This body regulates all lending patterns for banks and mortgage companies. All lending institutions have adopted policies of non-discrimination.

D. Public Policies and Actions Affecting the Approval of Sites and Other Building Requirements used in the Approval Process for the Construction of Publicly Assisted Housing

1. Are municipal services provided equally to all areas? Identify any areas in need of service repair or upgrade.

Municipal services are provided equally to all areas. The City of Maryville and the City of Alcoa provide utility, fire, police, ambulance and solid waste collections services to all areas of their jurisdictions. The Cities of Townsend, Friendsville, Rockford and Louisville, as well as the unincorporated areas of Blount County are served by a variety of utility districts, volunteer fire departments, and solid waste collection services. The Blount County Sheriff's Department provides police protection to the smaller communities and the unincorporated areas. Townsend, Friendsville, Rockford, Louisville and most unincorporated areas of Blount County do not have sewer service. Sewer service is simply too expensive to install in these areas and most communities cannot afford the construction costs.

Parks, ballfields, walking trails and greenbelt areas are distributed throughout Blount County and its municipalities.

2. What are the local zoning laws and policies?

Zoning laws are in effect for all areas of Blount County, including all of the municipalities. The planning commissions that serve the six municipalities and the Blount County Regional Planning Commission meet on a monthly basis and review all residential, commercial and industrial development proposals. Specific zoning classifications have been established for all property within Blount County. Zoning sector plans are available to the general public.

3. Explain any land use policies, exclusionary zoning and displacement plan.

Land use policies are detailed in the Blount County Zoning Ordinance and zoning ordinances that are in effect for each of the six municipalities within Blount County. There are no exclusionary zoning policies in effect in Blount County. There are rental units, and residents of all racial groups, with a wide range of incomes, in all areas and municipalities within Blount County.

From time to time, the Greater Knoxville Metropolitan Airport Authority, which is located in Blount County, has a need to expand its facilities. In the case of runway lengthening or the construction of a new runway, residents may be displaced. Because the funds that finance runway construction or improvement originate at the federal level, the Airport Authority is required to adhere to the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Act of 1970.

4. Review sites for subsidized housing by comparing census tracts to racial concentrations.

There is one area with a minority concentrations in Blount County. The area is located in the northern end of the City of Alcoa and is known as the Springbrook neighborhood. The area is primarily composed of owner occupied, single family detached housing. There is not a concentration of public housing in the area.

5. Explain the makeup of planning and zoning boards, (who is on the boards, how a person gets on a board, are all protected classes represented on the boards, etc.)

There are six incorporated municipalities within Blount County. Positions on planning/zoning commissions are appointed by the Mayor of each jurisdiction. The Blount County Executive appoints members of the Blount County Regional Planning Commission. Blount County, the City of Maryville, and the City of Alcoa have staff planning positions as well. Persons are hired for these positions based on experience and educational qualifications. These persons are employed by the jurisdictions that they serve. To the greatest extent feasible, the planning and zoning boards are reflective of the racial and social composition of the populations that they serve.

E. The Administrative Policies Concerning Community Development and Housing Activities, such as Urban Homesteading, Multi-family Rehabilitation, and Activities Causing Displacement, which Affect Opportunities of Minority Households to Select Housing Inside and Outside Areas of Minority Concentration.

1. **What is the displacement plan for your jurisdiction?**

Blount County and its municipalities utilize the Uniform Real Property Acquisition and Relocation Act as a guide when relocation is necessary within their perspective communities. All housing rehabilitation projects are performed on an individual basis.

2. **How is the priority list for revitalization of neighborhoods determined?**

There are no priority lists for revitalization of neighborhoods in Blount County. Each municipality within the County is concerned with downtown and neighborhood revitalization efforts. In recent years Blount County and its municipalities have not been competitive within the ranking system for Tennessee Housing Development Agency (THDA) HOME funds for housing rehabilitation. However, several agencies within Blount County been very active in THDA's HOUSE Demonstration Grant program. Blount County received a 1993 HOUSE Demonstration Grant, the local Community Action Committee has received HOUSE Demonstration Grants in 1995 through 1999, the local chapter of Habitat for Humanity has received HOUSE Demonstration grant funding in 1993 through 1999 and also received a THDA Great Place grant in 2000. The Blount County Child and Family Services office also received a HOUSE Demonstration grant in 1993.

3. **How is your community utilizing HOME investment Trust funds?**

As stated previously, Blount County and its municipalities are not generally competitive within the ranking system for HOME funds. However, several agencies that serve Blount County have been extremely active within THDA's HOUSE Demonstration Grant program. Demonstration grant funds are typically used for rehabilitation or home ownership assistance for low to moderate income persons.

4. **Do you have a program of revolving loan funds set-up for property repairs? What is the criteria for participation?**

Neither Blount County nor any municipality within the County has a program of revolving loan funds set-up for property repairs.

5. **What is the administration's policy on increases in property tax?**

Blount County property taxes are levied uniformly throughout the county.

Property in the county is reappraised at four year intervals following state standards. Appraisals aim at 100% of market value and are related to comparable sales whenever possible. Assessments of residential property are established at 25% of appraised value in conformance with State law. Blount County and its municipalities make every effort to keep property tax as low as possible. All property tax increases are reviewed each fiscal year and are only increased on an as needed basis. Blount County has been successful in limiting property tax increases to approximately 2% per year.

6. What is the present plan for demolition of subsidized housing?

Neither Blount County nor its municipalities have a plan for demolition of subsidized housing. It is not anticipated that demolition of subsidized housing will occur in the foreseeable future.

- F. Where there is a determination of unlawful segregation or other housing discrimination by a court of a finding of noncompliance by HUD regarding assisted housing within a recipient's jurisdiction, an analysis of the actions which could be taken by the recipient to help remedy the discriminatory condition, including actions involving the expenditure of funds made available under this part.**

Describe the plan that will be developed and implemented as a fair housing program for municipal officials and employees having duties relating to fair housing, zoning, planning, assisted housing, and community and economic development.

There is no determination of unlawful segregation or housing discrimination within the HUD jurisdiction or any federal, state, or local government body. The jurisdiction has adopted and enforces a policy of non-discrimination in all programs and services.

5. ASSESSMENT OF CURRENT PUBLIC AND PRIVATE FAIR HOUSING PROGRAM/ACTIVITIES IN YOUR JURISDICTION

- A. Identification and Description of Existing Programs, Services and Activities**

- 1. Church, civic, and community groups as well as local government.**

County and municipal staff members periodically attend in-house briefings, professional conference sessions, or formal courses on State planning and

zoning laws, fair housing laws, the Americans with Disabilities Act, environmental regulations and related matters. Informational sessions or meeting are typically sponsored by the University of Tennessee, MTAS, CTAS, the East Tennessee Development District, THDA or HUD. The local chapter of Habitat for Humanity is very active and has an annual work program that is supported by a variety of civic, religious and private organizations.

2. **Fair Housing groups, housing groups, commissions representing persons with disabilities, and civil rights organizations.**

The fair housing programs and activities in Blount County are the result of federal programs in the County. There are no special interest groups in the County that are pro-active in fair housing. Most of these groups are reactive to problems. However, no complaints or problems have been identified.

6. **CONCLUSIONS**

Blount County has a population of 105,823 persons (2000 Census). Approximately 67% of the county's population resides in the unincorporated areas of the County. The six incorporated areas within the County's boundaries each have a diverse economy and housing stock. The County is comprised of a large population of families with children and elderly individuals. The median family income of Blount County according to 1990 census data was \$30,277.

The majority of homes in the County fall within the \$25,000 to \$99,999 range. This is representative of the income of residents of Blount County. The housing costs correlate to the income and employment patterns of the County. There are 36,532 housing units in Blount County. Of this number, 33,624 are occupied and 2,908 are vacant.

As previously mentioned, in this study no finding of a fair housing impediment which would have resulted from the initiation of policies, practices or attitudes in the County. The County and its municipalities are aware of the fair housing law and are dedicated to upholding it.

7. **ACTIONS TO OVERCOME IDENTIFIED IMPEDIMENTS**

A. Development of a Schedule of Specific Actions

1. Short term and long term goals;

Fair housing and equal access to housing currently exists in Blount County. For this reason, there is no immediate action required to abolish identified impediments. The long term and short term goals of the County and each of its municipalities are to enforce fair housing practices. These practices include fairness and enhanced housing choices. There will be continued commitments to the furtherance of Fair Housing and the Fair Housing objectives by all governmental entities. Coordination throughout the County has been established as a goal to further Fair Housing programs. All municipalities and the County will adopt resolutions to reestablish their commitment to Fair Housing. Over the next several years, additional activities will be implemented to remind the community of the Fair Housing law. These activities may include; running notices in the local papers and on the local radio stations, public recognition of April as Fair Housing Month, placing copies of the law in mass mailings such utility bills, telephone bills etc., promoting fair housing poster contests in area schools and displaying the fair housing message on billboards and or banners throughout the County. It is a goal of the County and its municipalities to incorporate special interest and civic groups into the planning and implementation of future Fair Housing programs and activities.

2. A financial plan for accomplishment of these goals.

Fair housing activities conducted in response to Federally funded projects will be funded through the project. However, if a project is locally funded, necessary funding will be made available through the County or municipality.

3. A mechanism for updates;

A review of past Fair Housing Activities will be conducted to assure that activities are not duplicated. All efforts will be reviewed and coordinated across the County.

4. Insurance that the schedule of actions will be implemented regardless of any changes in the locality's administration; and has been and will be continued through the continuation of fair housing programs.

Blount County and the municipalities within the County have a policy of non-discrimination and have demonstrated a commitment to this study and the goals and conclusions contained within it. This commitment will continue

regardless of changes in the count/municipal administration.


LOCATION MAP



BLOUNT COUNTY


MAJOR INDUSTRIAL AND COMMERCIAL AREAS






ACTIONS TO AFFIRMATIVELY FURTHER FAIR HOUSING

The following are actions which might be appropriate in overcoming some identified impediments to fair housing choice in _____ communities. Fair housing actions, however, are not limited to those on this list.

- ☆ Promote efforts to enact substantially equivalent fair housing laws;
- ☆ Undertake fair housing enforcement, i.e., complaint processing activity;
- ☆ Provide funds to enforce local fair housing laws;
- ☆ Through letters signed by the chief elected official, encourage those in the business of renting, selling or financing of housing to adhere fully to the Federal Fair Housing Act and HUD's Advertising Guidelines;
- ☆ ~~Participate in voluntary partnerships developed with public and private~~ organizations to help achieve the goal of fair housing choice;
- ☆ ~~Contract with private organizations to bring about increased awareness of~~ fair housing issues or otherwise address impediments to fair housing choice;
- ☆ Fund activities that assist in remedying segregation in the recipient's jurisdiction;
- ☆ Encourage real estate industry groups to participate in the Voluntary Affirmative Marketing Agreement Program;
- ☆ Sponsor fair housing poster contests, speech contests, and writing contests, in schools during April - National Fair Housing month;
- ☆ Display fair housing exhibits at local shopping malls, fairs, exhibitions, etc.;
- ☆ Provide _____ financial and technical support to help create private fair housing groups in those localities where such agencies do not exist;
- ☆ Work actively with existing entities (public or private nonprofit) whose goal is to further fair housing;
- ☆ Develop a local government-wide list of both public and private housing - accessible to persons with disabilities;
- ☆ Set aside funds to be used specifically for fair housing purposes;
- ☆ Provide counseling services to persons seeking housing in locations outside areas of minority and low-income concentration;
- ☆ Provide minorities the opportunity to occupy assisted housing outside areas of minority and low-income concentration;

- ☆ Fund or sponsor administrative activities designed to further fair housing;
- ☆ Fund or sponsor education and outreach programs designed to inform citizens about housing opportunities throughout the community;
- ☆ Encourage the local housing provider groups to participate in voluntary affirmative marketing programs;
- ☆ Develop local compliance and monitoring processes to insure that builders and developers who are securing building permits affirmatively market housing;
- ☆ Advertise the benefits of an open community;
- ☆ Those activities associated with providing housing, housing services or housing related facilities, are as follows:
 1. A housing loan/grant program where affirmative measures are taken to provide housing opportunities for minorities outside areas of minority concentration, thereby providing housing choice;
 2. ~~Displaying of Fair Housing Posters in the office(s) taking the housing loan/grant applications;~~
 3. Advertising the housing loan/grant program in accordance with HUD's fair housing advertising guideline regulations;
 4. Locating assisted units in a broad range of locations and not concentrating them in minority neighborhoods;
 5. ~~Illustrating minority occupancy of assisted housing inside and outside areas of minority concentration;~~
 6. Providing marketing, legal planning, counseling or other administrative actions funded or sponsored by the grantee to further, or have the effect of furthering, fair housing; and
 7. Using community development funds for fair housing activities or allocating community development funds to fair housing organizations.

What You Should Know About Your Housing Rights

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) enforces the Fair Housing Act, which protects you against violations of your housing rights. The Fair Housing Act prohibits discrimination in housing because of:

- Race or color
- National origin
- Religion
- Sex
- Familial status (including children under the age of 18 living with parents or legal custodians; pregnant women and people securing custody of children under 18)
- Handicap

The Fair Housing Act covers most housing with very few exceptions. It prohibits discrimination in the sale and rental of housing and in mortgage lending.

What Is Prohibited

No one may take any of the following actions based on race, color, national origin, religion, sex, familial status, or handicap:

- Refuse to rent or sell housing
- Refuse to negotiate for housing
- Make housing unavailable
- Deny a dwelling
- Set different terms, conditions, or privileges for sale or rental of a dwelling
- Provide different housing services or facilities
- Falsely deny that housing is available for inspection, sale, or rental
- For profit, persuade owners to sell or rent (blockbusting)
- Deny anyone access to or membership in a facility or service (such as a multiple listing service) related to the sale or rental of housing
- Refuse to make a mortgage loan
- Refuse to provide information regarding loans
- Impose different terms or conditions on a loan
- Discriminate in appraising property
- Refuse to purchase a loan
- Set different terms or conditions for purchasing a loan
- Refuse to let you make reasonable modifications to your dwelling or common use areas, at your expense, if necessary for a person with a disability to use the housing. (Where reasonable, the landlord may permit changes only if you agree to restore the property to its original condition when you move.)
- Refuse to make reasonable accommodations in rules, policies, practices, or services if necessary for a person with a disability to use the housing.

If You Think Your Rights Have Been Violated

HUD is ready to help with any problem of housing discrimination. If you think your rights have been violated, you may fill out a Housing Discrimination Complaint Form, write HUD a letter, or telephone the HUD Discrimination Hotline at 1-800-669-9777 (voice) or 1-800-927-9275 (TTY).




Persuading home owners to sell or rent housing by telling them that minority groups, (persons of **color**,) are moving into the neighborhood is called "blockbusting" and is illegal.




Fair Housing Laws apply to everyone, including you

Refusing to sell, rent, making different terms or conditions for family with children is considered to be discriminatory and is not legal under the protected classification of **familial status**.



Denying or making different terms or conditions for home loans by commercial lenders, such as banks, savings and loans, and insurance companies because of **sex**, color, nation origin, religion, disability, or familial status is against the law.



We can make a difference.



No one with a legally defined condition that has weakened or destroyed the normal physical or mental abilities necessary to perform daily living skills can not be told that housing is not available for inspection, sale or rent when it really is available. Also a landlord must allow reasonable accommodation to be made to a house or apartment for a person with a **disability**.

The Fair Housing Act assures the ability of persons, regardless of color, religion, sex, national origin, disability or family size, who are of similar income levels have the same housing choices available to them as anyone else.





Construction:

Ron Ogle, Director of Public Building Authority, gave a report on the schools. Mr. Ogle stated everything was on schedule. There was no action taken in this matter.

Financial:

A financial report was given by Troy Logan. Mr. Logan stated the there was a deficit of \$200,000.00. Property Taxes are 95 % collected and they may come in with a little shortage at this time. Water and sewer accounts could be up to \$50,000 - \$60,000 over budget. There was a water leak at William Blount Middle. There are about \$230,000.00 encumbered in different accounts. A shortfall in revenues in the amount of \$600,00.00 is expected. There was no action taken in this matter.

There was further discussion concerning a water bill from South Blount Utility District for William Blount Middle School, which included a sewer bill from Maryville Utilities. Kenneth Melton made a motion, which was seconded by John Keeble, to appeal the payment of the bill at South Blount Utility District, as well as to Maryville Utilities. The motion was unanimously approved with verbal ayes.

Dave Bennett reported the budget process would begin in January. He expected a positive impact regarding property tax revenues and 65% of the amount collected will go to the schools. Mr. Bennett stated the final figures for property taxes are not received until August. Mr. Bennett also explained estimates for April and May are used and how they are determined. There was no

action taken in this matter.

Heritage Gas Line

Discussion regarding changes in the Heritage Gas Line continued. The estimated cost to change the burners would be about \$80,000. Mr. Ogle informed the committee that these types of issues would be addressed in a maintenance improvement program for Blount County Schools in the future. There was no action taken in this matter.

Property Sale

Kenneth Melton informed the committee this item had been tabled and to just leave it tabled at this time. There was no action taken in this matter.

County Wide Maintenance

Ron Ogle gave an update regarding county wide maintenance for all schools. Mr. Ogle stated estimated the total costs of \$975,100.00 for Phase I was approved in the last school board meeting. There had been a meeting for centralized maintenance county wide. There will be a report regarding issues and recommendations with background information given in the future. Mr. Hargis asked what is the hold up on the maintenance building. Mr. Ogle stated Terry Best had some difficulties getting a contractor due to some problems.

The committee discussed six or seven acres behind Hubbard School that could be used. These issues could be put on the next agenda for discussion.

Lanier Gym Floor

Mr. Landers expressed appreciation for assistance in fixing the floor and explained needs for further repairs. Approximately \$70,000.00 would be needed to fund these repairs. If there were savings from PBA work at Heritage and William Blount, they possibly could be used. John Keeble made a motion, which was seconded by Bob Evans, for a new appraisal for repairing the floor. The motion was approved.

School Board Issues Related To County Commission

The Education Committee discussed other issues such as: building of a new elementary school at Carpenters, some school enrollments, and long term budget planning. There was no action taken in these matters.
