

I am requesting that you approve a new position for the bookkeeping department in my office. With the increase in caseload and the approval of a new judge, we will be in great need of extra assistance in the bookkeeping department. Because of the new judge, cases will be adjudicated in a more timely manner creating an increased workload in the bookkeeping department.

As the report shows, our caseload is already up by 10%. Our revenue is up by 19%, or \$175,000, in this period.



I'm asking for your help with this matter. Please vote yes to the request for a new bookkeeper in the Circuit Court Clerk's Office.


GENERAL SESSIONS COUNTY REVENUE

4.0 ***SCOPE OF SERVICES REQUIRED***

4.1 As per Proposal 2003-1507 between Robert J. (Bobby) Parks, CBO and the Blount County Purchasing Department the following information and recommendations are required.

4.1.1 What types of Codes and Ordinances should be adopted.

4.1.2 When Codes and Ordinances could be adopted.

4.1.3 Enforcement Powers.

4.2 ***INFRASTRUCTURE***

4.2.1 Location and size of department.

4.1.1 What types of Code and Ordinances should be adopted.

Having numerous conversations between local committees, Commission members, Homebuilders Association, REALTOR Association and the general public the majority of concerns are residential construction, land use and storm water run off.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the 2003 Edition of the International Residential Code (IRC) be adopted as the Code of Reference for Blount County, Tennessee.

This Document applies to the construction, alteration, movement, enlargement, replacement, repair, use and occupancy, location, removal and demolition of detached one-and two family dwellings and multiple single family dwellings (town houses) not more than three stories in height with a separate means of egress and their accessory structures.

The purpose of this Code is to provide minimum requirements to safeguard the public safety, health and general welfare, through affordability, structural strength, means of egress, stability, sanitation, and safety to life and property from fire and other hazards attributed to the built environment.

Land use and storm water run-off are outside the scope of the Building Code, but need to be addressed with adoption of the building codes to insure a complete set of rules and regulations are in place for the construction of new residential homes.

Ordinances for Code adoption, fee schedule, creation of a Department of Building Safety, etc., fall within the responsibility of the Administration and County Attorney.

4.1.2 WHEN CODES AND ORDINANCES SHOULD BE ADOPTED

The Code adoption and creation of Building Safety cannot begin until approved and budgeted by the Blount County Commission.

RECOMMENDATION:

Codes and Ordinances should only be adopted after serious consideration by the Blount County Commission and a budget approved. To have Codes without enforcement would defeat any intentions to improve the as-built environment of Blount County.

4.1.3 ENFORCEMENT POWERS

A Department of Building Safety should be created and the Official in charge thereof shall be known as the Building Official. The Chief Authority with approval of the Commission shall appoint the Building Official.

In accordance with the prescribed procedures of the jurisdictions and with the concurrence of the appointing authority, the Building Official shall have the authority to appoint technical officers, inspectors, plans examiners and support staff.

The Building Official is hereby authorized to enforce the provisions of the Code. The Building Official shall have the authority to render interpretations of the Code and adopt policies and procedures in order to clarify the applications of its' provisions. Such interpretations, policies and procedures shall be in conformance with the intent and purposes of the Code.

It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to erect, construct, alter, extend, repair, move, remove, demolish or occupy any building, or structure regulated by this Code in conflict or in violation of any provisions of this Code.

The Building Official shall be authorized to serve a notice of violation or order on the person responsible for the erection, construction, alteration, extension, repair, moving, removal, demolition, or occupancy of a building or structure in violation of the provisions of the Code, or in violation of a detailed statement or a plan approved there under, or in violation of a permit or certificate issued under provisions of the Code.

If the notice of violation is not complied with in the time prescribed by such notice, the Building Official is authorized to request the Legal Counsel of the jurisdiction to institute appropriate proceedings at law or in equity to restrain, correct or abate such violation, or to require the removal or termination of the unlawful occupancy of the building or structure in violation of provisions of the Code. Any person who violates a provision of this Code or fails to comply with the requirements thereof or who erects, constructs, alters or repairs buildings or structures in violation of the approved construction documents or of a permit issued under provisions of the Code shall be subject to penalties as prescribed by law.

Upon notice from the Building Official that work on any building or structure is being prosecuted contrary to the provisions of the Code or in an unsafe and dangerous manner, such work shall be immediately stopped. The Stop Work Order shall be in writing and shall be given to the owner of the property involved, or to the owner's agent, or to the person doing the work; and shall state the conditions under which the work will be permitted to resume.

Any person who shall continue any work in or about the structure after having been served with a Stop Work Order, except such work as that person is directed to perform to remove a violation of an unsafe condition, shall be subject to the penalties as prescribed by law.

In addition each Code adoption ordinance shall have an enforcement and violation section as determined by the Legal Counsel of Blount County.

4.2 INFRASTRUCTURE

The location of the Building Safety Department should be convenient and accessible to contractors and the general public. Consideration should be given to access and parking for large vehicles and located in close proximity to other county departments. The Department should be large enough to house reception and waiting area, conference room, filing space, area for permitting and individual offices for each staff member.

RECOMMENDATION:

1. Facilities

The codes department will need to consist of approximately 2500 square feet, this includes reception area, storage, conference room and individual offices.

4.2.2 NUMBER OF EMPLOYEES AND JOB DESCRIPTION

The number of employees shall be based upon the Codes being adopted and job descriptions as determined by the Building Official.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Building Official be hired at the onset of the Code adoption and creation of the Department of Building Safety. The Building Official shall have the responsibility to hire support staff and Code Enforcement Officers. The Department would consist of an Administrative Secretary, a Permit Clerk and four Code Enforcement Officers.

This recommendation is supported by data obtained from the Blount County Planning and Health Departments. It is estimated that during the 2005 fiscal year approximately 900 permits will be issued for the construction of new single-family dwellings. When Building Codes are adopted another 1200-1500 permits will be issued for additions, alterations, and accessory structures with each requiring inspections.

Blount County consist of over 400 square miles excluding the National Park, therefore these numbers may be on the conservative side. Four Code Enforcement Officers who's primary job duties will be for inspection of compliance with adopted codes and standards for new construction, additions, and alterations.

4.2.3 START UP COSTS

A Department of Building Safety shall be established with staff as described above and location to be determined by the County Administration. Listed below are items needed for operation of such Department:

4.3 FUNDING OF BUILDING CODES DEPARTMENT

RECOMMENDATION:

The start up cost of the Building Codes Department shall be budgeted by the Blount County Commission, operating cost shall be funded by permit fees.

4.3.1 FEE STRUCTURE

The Blount County Commission has the authority to assess costs and adopt fees to cover operating expenses.

RECOMMENDATION:

An ordinance shall be adopted with a schedule of permit fees based upon square footage of the structure and other fees as shall be determined by the Blount County Commission

4.3.2 TYPES OF FEES

The Blount County Commission shall determine all permit fees relating to construction.

RECOMMENDATION:

Fees shall be charged for building, plumbing, access, land use and any permit issued by the Department of Building Safety.

4.3.2 IMPLEMENTATION

The County is currently charging for building permits (land use permits).

RECOMMENDATION:

A new fee schedule shall be adopted when the Code Adoption and inspection process begin. The fee schedule shall be based upon square footage of new construction and estimated cost on remodeling.

4.2.3 Start-up Cost- Building Codes Department

Facility Cost:

A minimum of twenty five hundred (2500) square feet of office space will be needed to house the Building Codes Department, this includes space for reception area, storage, file, conference and offices. *This estimated cost is:* **\$200,000.00**

Salaries:

A staff of seven will be needed to operate the Building Codes Department. This includes a Building Official, Four (4) inspectors, secretary and permit clerk. *The estimated cost including benefit package is:* **\$321,827.00**

Operating Cost:

The operating cost of the Building Codes Department, including furniture, stationary, forms, code books, memberships, uniforms and other operating expense. *The estimated cost is:* **\$20,000.00**

Equipment:

Equipment needed to operate the Building Codes Department, including vehicles, copier, computers phones Etc. *The estimated cost is:* **\$116,000.00**

Summary:

The total estimated start-up cost of the Building Codes Department is **\$657,827.00.**

The annual operating cost of the Building Codes Department is **\$21,550.00** plus salaries and facility cost as assessed by the Blount County Purchasing Department.

4.3.1 Estimated Revenue from Building Permit Fees:

900 new single family average cost of permit \$700.00. This includes access, plumbing, grading, and land use. Fee is estimated on a \$.30-.35 cents per square foot with associated fees.

1000 addition and alteration permits. This includes a \$.50 cents per square foot for additions and a fee based upon the estimated cost of construction for alterations, and accessory structures. Average permit fee, \$80.00.

\$80,000.00

1000 miscellaneous permits. Average permit fee, \$25.00.

Total Revenue:

\$735,000.00

Summary:

It is estimated that the annual budget for a Building codes Department is approximately **\$340,000**. Estimated revenue **\$735,000.00**. The above figures indicate that it is possible to operate a Building Codes Department, that is only not self-funding, but could add up 200,000 dollars operating budget.

The above information is based upon averages of other municipalities and the Blount County Purchasing Department. The cost and revenues are an estimate only, and may be deemed reliable but subject to change.

A RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE BLOUNT COUNTY SENATOR AND REPRESENTATIVES TO SPONSOR THE ENACTMENT OF A PRIVATE ACT BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF TENNESSEE AUTHORIZING BLOUNT COUNTY TO LEVY AND COLLECT A PRIVILEGE TAX ON NEW RESIDENTIAL AND NONRESIDENTIAL LAND DEVELOPMENT IN THE COUNTY.

WHEREAS, Blount County, Tennessee, has been growing at an accelerated rate over the past several years, having been impacted by the location of new industry in the county and by rapid growth in the standard metropolitan area of Knoxville; and

WHEREAS, projected nonresidential development and the availability of jobs in the county is anticipated to stimulate a significant demand for new dwelling units; and

WHEREAS, projected growth and land use development will cause an increased demand for county-provided public services and facilities; and

WHEREAS, Blount County is committed, for the benefit of both present and future county residents, to maintaining a level of public services and facilities commensurate with those presently provided; and

WHEREAS, Blount County is prepared to impose a fair, equitable and reasonable share of the cost of providing necessary public services and facilities on existing county residents and taxpayers; and

WHEREAS, Blount County's present population, employment base, tax base and budget cannot alone support the additional revenues needed to provide public services and facilities to serve new growth without a substantial increase in the property tax rate on existing development; and

WHEREAS, due to these circumstances, it is necessary and appropriate that Blount County be given authorization to extend its taxing power to enable the county to impose a fair and reasonable share of the cost of public services and facilities necessitated by new development on that development so as not to create an unfair and inequitable burden on existing county residents and taxpayers; and

WHEREAS, the most logical and effective mechanism to accomplish the intended result would be to authorize Blount County to levy a privilege tax on new residential and nonresidential land development in Blount County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of County Commissioners of Blount County, Tennessee, that the Blount County Senator and Representatives are hereby requested to sponsor the enactment of a private act in the General Assembly of the State of Tennessee authorizing Blount County to levy and collect a privilege tax on new residential and nonresidential land development in the county and that such private act include the following provisions, to wit:

SECTION 1. The tax authorized by the private act shall be known as the "Blount County Adequate Facilities Tax."

SECTION 2. The intent and purpose of the private act is to authorize Blount County to levy and collect a privilege tax (the "tax") on new land development in the county payable at the time of issuance of a building permit or certificate of occupancy so as to ensure and require that the persons responsible for new development share in the burden of growth by paying their fair share for the costs of new and expanded public services and facilities made necessary by such development.

SECTION 3. The private act shall declare that the act of land development within Blount County is a privilege upon which Blount County may, by resolution of its legislative body, levy a tax in an amount not to exceed the rates set forth herein.

SECTION 4. The private act shall authorize the county's legislative body to levy the tax by resolution after adopting a capital improvements program indicating the need for new and expanded public services and facilities anticipated to be funded, in part, by the tax and after finding that the need for such public services and facilities is reasonably related to new land development in the county. The resolution of the county's legislative body levying this tax shall state the rate (s) of the tax on new residential and nonresidential land development. The county's legislative body shall, by resolution, adopt administrative guidelines, procedures, regulations and forms necessary to properly implement, administer and enforce the provisions of the private act.

SECTION 5. For the exercise of the privilege described in section 3 above, the private act shall authorize Blount County to levy a tax on new land development: not to exceed

(a) _____ per gross square foot of new residential development, and

(b) _____ per gross square foot of new non-residential development.

- a) % of value of new residential development
- b) % of value of new ⁻²⁻ non-residential development

The county may develop a tax rate schedule by which residential and nonresidential uses are classified by type for the purpose of imposition of the tax authorized by the private act.

SECTION 6. The tax established by the private act shall be due and collected at the time of application for a building permit for new development as defined in the act or, if a building permit is not required, at the time of application for a certificate of occupancy to the county or city official duly authorized to issue building permits or certificates of occupancy. If the building permit is issued by the county, then the county building commissioner or other responsible official shall receive payment in full in cash or negotiable instrument as specified by resolution of the county's legislative body and as approved by the county attorney. If the building permit is issued by one of the incorporated cities of Blount County, the city shall, before issuance of the building permit, require evidence by a valid certificate executed by the county building commissioner or other responsibility official that the full amount of tax due the county has been paid or a negotiable instrument has been received and accepted. No building permit for residential or nonresidential land development as defined in the private act shall be issued in any incorporated or unincorporated area of Blount County unless the tax has been paid in full to the county or a negotiable instrument as specified by the county's legislative body and as approved by the county attorney has been received and accepted. The issuance of a building permit by any city official without a certificate from the county that the tax has been paid or a negotiable instrument has been received and accepted shall render the city liable to the county for the sum or sums that would have been collected by the county had such certificate been required by the city.

The private act shall declare that the tax is a lien against the real property upon which the new development has occurred until paid and shall be superior to all other liens on such property except for property tax liens. Interest of _____ percent per month and a penalty of _____ percent per month shall be added to the tax due if not paid when first due, unless the taxpayer successfully contests the applicability of such tax by appeal as provided in the private act. Notice of such lien may be, but is not required to be, recorded in the office of the register of deeds. Such lien may be enforced by civil action instituted in the chancery court of Blount County or any other court of appropriate equitable jurisdiction in the county for sale of the real property to enforce this lien.

SECTION 7. The private act shall provide that proceeds from the tax shall be used to provide new and expanded county public services and facilities and to reduce debt incurred therefor and shall be deposited into the county's general and debt service funds for such purposes.

SECTION 8. The private act shall provide that the authority to levy the tax on new development in Blount County is in addition to all other authority to levy or impose taxes, fees, assessments or other revenue raising or land development regulatory measures granted either by public or private acts of the State of Tennessee and that the levy of such tax, in addition to any other authorized tax, fee, assessment or charge, shall not be deemed to constitute double taxation.

SECTION 9. The provisions of the private act shall in no manner repeal, modify or interfere with the authority granted by any other public or private law applicable to Blount County. The private act shall be deemed to create an additional or alternative method for Blount County to levy and collect taxes for the purpose of the county providing public services and facilities made necessary by new development in the county.

SECTION 10. The private act shall have no effect unless it is approved by two-thirds (2/3) vote of the county's legislative body. Its approval or nonapproval shall be proclaimed by the presiding officer of the county's legislative body and certified by the presiding officer to the Tennessee Secretary of State.

RESOLUTION TO LEVY A COUNTY-WIDE MOTOR VEHICLE TAX

WHEREAS, Tennessee Code Annotated, Section 5-8-102, authorizes counties to levy a motor vehicle privilege tax as a condition precedent to the operation of a motor vehicle within a county; and,

WHEREAS, the need for new revenue sources to fund road improvements is great in Blount County;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Blount County legislative body that;

SECTION 1. For the privilege of using the public roads and highways, in Blount County, Tennessee, there is levied upon motor-driven vehicles, and upon the privilege of the operation thereof, except motorcycles, motor-driven bicycles and scooters, farm tractors, self-propelled farm machines not usually used for operation upon public highways or roads, and motor-driven vehicles owned by any governmental agency or governmental instrumentality and except for other exemptions provided by general law, a special privilege tax for the benefit of such county, which tax shall be in the amount of ten dollars (\$10.00) for each such motor-driven vehicle, the owner of which resides within said county.

This tax applies to, is a levy upon, and shall be paid on each motor-driven vehicle, the owner of which resides within said county.

SECTION 2. The tax herein levied shall be paid to and collected by the County Clerk of Blount County, who is authorized by Tennessee Code Annotated, Section 67-4-103, to collect such privilege taxes. The County Clerk shall collect this tax at the same time he or she collects the state privilege tax levied upon the operation of a motor-driven vehicle over the public highways of this state. The County Clerk shall deduct a fee of five percent (5%) as authorized in Tennessee Code Annotated, Section 8-21-701(55), from the amount of taxes collected and paid over to the County Trustee.

SECTION 3. The tax herein levied shall be deposited entirely into the Highway Public Works Fund minus the County Clerk fee.

SECTION 4. Payment of the privilege tax imposed hereunder shall be evidenced by the State of Tennessee form and receipt used to account for decals and by a decal issued by the County Clerk, which shall be displayed by affixing the decal on and to the lower right corner of the license plate in the space provided for such decal. The design of the decal shall be determined by the County Clerk and shall be the same size as the state renewal decal. The expense incident to the purchase of such decals herein required, as well as the expense of obtaining proper receipts and other records necessary for the performance of the duties herein incumbent upon the County Clerk, shall be paid from the general fund of the county.

SECTION 5. The privilege tax or wheel tax herein levied, when paid together with full, complete, and explicit performance of and compliance with all provisions of this Resolution, by the owner, shall entitle the owner of the motor-driven vehicle for which said tax was paid and on which the decal or emblem has been affixed as herein provided, to operate or allow to be operated such vehicle over the streets, roads, and highways of the county for a period of one year which will run concurrently with the period established for the state registration fees by Tennessee Code Annotated, Section 55-4-104.

In the event the wheel tax decal is sold by the Clerk for a period of more or less than a calendar year, the tax imposed shall be proportionate to the annual tax fixed for the vehicle and modified in no other manner, except that the proportional tax shall be rounded off to the nearest quarter of a dollar.

SECTION 6. In the event any motor-driven vehicle, for which the wheel tax has been paid and the emblem or decal issued and placed thereon, becomes unusable or is destroyed or damaged to the extent that it can no longer be operated over the public roads, streets or highways of said county; or in the event that the owner transfers the title to such vehicle, or completely removes therefrom and destroys the decal or emblem issued for and placed thereon, and the owner makes proper application to the Clerk for the issuance of a duplicate decal or emblem to be used by such owner on another vehicle for the unexpired term for which the original decal or emblem was issued, and the Clerk is satisfied that the applicant is entitled to the issuance of such a duplicate decal or emblem and the owner pays into the hands of the Clerk the sum of five dollars (\$5.00), the Clerk will then issue to such owner a duplicate receipt, canceling the original receipt delivered to the Clerk by the owner, and will deliver to the owner a duplicate decal or emblem, which shall be affixed to the motor-driven vehicle for which it is issued, as herein provided, and such duplicate decal or emblem shall entitle the owner to operate or allow to be operated the vehicle upon the streets , roads, and highways of said county for the remainder of the period for which the original decal or emblem was issued. Likewise, in the event a decal or emblem becomes obliterated, erased, or defaced, or is destroyed under the provisions of this resolution, and is therefore illegible and unusable by the owner, upon proper application made by the owner and filed with the Clerk, showing such circumstances and facts to be true, then the Clerk, upon receipt from the owner of five dollars (\$5.00) may issue and deliver to the owner, a duplicate decal or emblem.

SECTION 7. The effective date of collection for the aforementioned privilege tax or wheel tax will be _____, _____ as determined by the Board of Commissioners of Blount County this 21st day of October 2004.



Over the past couple of years we have changed the way we do business, but we have not changed the mission of the Blount County Children's Home. Our residential program has gone away because of several changes made by the State of Tennessee mode of operation. However, we feel that we must be

prepared at all times to be able to start a new residential program if called upon by the State of Tennessee or Blount County.

Our Operation Success Program is being called very successful because we are helping many more children than ever. It is documented we have an 80% success rate in 2003 keeping children together with their families. Gardner Place is our newest program at the Children's Home, and it too has started off strong with this program helping families have a supervised visitation & peaceful exchange system between parents and children. We look forward in the New Year to start several other new programs at the Blount County Children's Home to further assist additional children and young adults.




A RESOLUTION ADOPTING REGULATIONS TO PROTECT WATER QUALITY IN THE UNINCORPORATED AREAS OF BLOUNT COUNTY BY PROHIBITING, SUPPRESSING AND PREVENTING THE CONTAMINATION OF STORM WATER BY GRADING, EROSION, AND SEDIMENTATION.

WHEREAS, Tenn. Code Ann. § 5-1-118(c) authorizes counties, by adoption of a resolution by two-thirds (2/3) vote of their respective legislative bodies, to exercise those powers granted to all or certain municipalities by Tenn. Code Ann. § 6-2-201(22) and (23), with specified exceptions; and

WHEREAS, on September 21, 2000, the Board of County Commissioners of Blount County, Tennessee, by a vote of 20 in favor, 0 opposed and 1 absent adopted Resolution No. 00-09-01 authorizing Blount County to exercise said powers granted to all or certain municipalities; and

WHEREAS, upon the adoption of said Resolution No. 00-09-01 and pursuant to Tenn. Code Ann. § 6-2-201(22), Blount County became authorized to define, prohibit, abate, suppress, prevent and regulate all acts, practices, conduct, businesses, occupations, callings, trades, uses of property and all other things whatsoever detrimental, or liable to be detrimental, to the health, morals, comfort, safety, convenience or welfare of the inhabitants of the unincorporated areas of the county and to exercise general police powers; and

WHEREAS, Tenn. Code Ann. § § 68-221-1101-1106 authorizes counties to adopt regulations for storm water discharges and contaminates in order to protect water quality in their respective unincorporated areas; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the authority of Tenn. Code Ann. § § 5-1-118(c), 6-2-201(22) and 68-221-1101-1106 and Resolution No. 00-09-01, Blount County desires to adopt the regulations hereinafter set forth to protect water quality in the unincorporated areas of Blount County by prohibiting, suppressing and preventing the contamination of storm water by grading, erosion and sedimentation.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED the Board of County Commissioners of Blount County, Tennessee, meeting in regular session assembled this 16th day of December, 2004, that the following regulations to protect water quality in the unincorporated areas of Blount County by prohibiting, suppressing and preventing the contamination of storm water by grading, erosion and sedimentation are hereby adopted, to wit:

Section 1. Rules applying to resolution. For the purpose of this resolution, certain rules of construction shall apply as follows:

- A. Words used in the present tense shall include the future tense, and the singular includes the plural, unless otherwise indicated in the text.
- B. The terms "shall" and "must" are always mandatory and not discretionary; the words "may" and "should" are permissive.
- C. Except as herein provided, all words used in this resolution shall have their common dictionary definition.

Section 2. Definitions.

- A. "Blount County Board of Zoning Appeals." The body which has the authority to hear appeals by any person (see *infra* definition V) or permit holder who has been assessed a civil penalty under the provisions of this resolution, or by any person who has been denied a grading permit under the provisions of this resolution, or by any person who has been aggrieved by any decision or interpretation of the provisions of this resolution by the Inspector.
- B. "County." Blount County, Tennessee.
- C. "Cut." Portion of land surface or area from which earth has been removed or will be removed by excavation; the depth below original ground surface to the excavated surface.
- D. "Developer." The person (see *infra* definition V) authorized to carry out the development of land.
- E. "Development." The process of grading, clearing, filling, quarrying, construction, or reconstruction to improved or unimproved land or other similar activities when not excepted by this resolution.
- F. "Drainage structure." A device composed of a virtually non-erodible material such as concrete, steel, plastic, or other such material that conveys water from one place to another by intercepting the flow and carrying it to a release point of storm water management drainage control, or flood control purposes.
- G. "Erosion." The wearing away of land by action of wind, water, ice, or gravity.
- H. "Erosion and sediment control plan." A plan for the control of erosion and sediment resulting from land-disturbing activity (see *infra* definition S) which may be a sketch plan or a formal plan. The plan shall be reviewed and approved before a grading permit may be issued. See "final plan," *infra* definition M. The plan may be included as part of a preliminary plan required by any county resolution or regulation, including zoning and subdivision regulations, or a separate plan following the specifications set out in this resolution.
- I. "Excavation." See "cut," *supra* definition C.

- J. "Existing grade." The slope or elevation of existing land surface prior to cutting or filling.
- K. "Fill." Portion of surface or area of land to which soil, rock or other materials have been or will be added; height above original land surface after the material has been or will be added.
- L. "Final grade." The final slope or elevation of land surface after cutting or filling and conforming to the final plan (*see infra* definition M).
- M. "Final plan." The approved erosion and sediment control plan which may be a sketch plan or a formal plan. The final plan may differ from the submitted erosion and sediment control plan if adjustments or amendments are required by the Inspector.
- N. "Finished grade." *See* "final grade," *supra* definition L.
- O. "Formal plan." An erosion and sediment control plan required for land-disturbing activity on any site equal to or greater than one (1) acre in size.
- P. "Grading." Any operation or occurrence by which the existing elevations of land are changed by cutting, filling, borrowing, stock piling, or where any ground cover, natural or man-made, is removed, or any buildings or other structures are removed or any water course or body of water, either natural or man-made, is relocated thereby creating an unprotected area. "Grading" shall be synonymous with "land-disturbing activity" (*see infra* definition S).
- Q. "Grading permit." A permit issued by the Inspector to authorize grading (*see supra* definition P) to be performed under the provisions of this resolution.
- R. "Inspector." The person designated by the County Mayor as the Storm Water Administrator, or his designee, who shall issue grading permits and carry out inspections as provided hereunder.
- S. "Land-disturbing activity." Any activity on land that may result in soil erosion and/or movement of sediment into state waters or onto other land in the county, including but not limited to, clearing, grading, excavating, demolition of structures, landscaping, transporting and filling.
- T. "Mulching." The application of plant or other suitable materials on the soil surface to conserve moisture, reduce erosion, and aid in establishing plant cover.
- U. "Owner." The legal owner of land at the time of application for a grading permit. The person ultimately responsible for adhering to the provisions of this resolution.
- V. "Person." Any and all persons, natural or artificial, including any individual, firm, partnership or association, and any municipal or private corporation organized or existing under the laws of this or any other state.

- W. "Project." The entire proposed development regardless of the size of the area of land to be disturbed.
- X. "Responsible person." A specific individual designated to be responsible for erosion and sediment control practices and maintenance of same on each site where land-disturbing activity takes place.
- Y. "Sediment." Eroded material transported and deposited by the action of water, wind, ice, or gravity.
- Z. "Sedimentation." The process by which eroded material is transported and deposited by the action of water, wind, ice or gravity.
- AA. "Sediment basin, trap, barrier or perimeter dike." A barrier or dam built across a waterway or water course, or at other locations, to retain sediment.
- BB. "Sketch plan." An erosion and sediment control plan required for land-disturbing activity on any site equal to or greater than one-tenth (0.1) acre and less than one (1) acre in size.
- CC. "Slope." The degree of deviation of a surface from the horizontal, usually expressed in percent or degrees.
- DD. "Soil stabilization." Measures which protect soil from erosion.
- EE. "Stabilizing slopes." The utilization of adequate structural and/or vegetative erosion and sediment control practices (see *infra* definitions HH and LL) for preventing erosion from occurring on an incline.
- FF. "State waters." Any and all rivers, streams, creeks, branches, lakes, reservoirs, ponds, drainage systems, springs, wells, and other bodies of surface water, natural or artificial, lying within or forming a part of the boundaries of the state which are not entirely confined and retained completely upon a single tract or parcel of property.
- GG. "Stripping." Any activity which removes or significantly disturbs the vegetative surface cover including de-sodding, clearing and grubbing operations.
- HH. "Structural erosion and sediment control practices." Measures for the stabilization of erodible or sediment producing areas by utilizing the mechanical properties of matter for the purpose of either changing the surface of land or storing, regulating or disposing of runoff to prevent excess sediment loss. Examples are structural diversions, grade stabilization structures, sediments traps and land grading, etc. Such measures can be found in the publication Tennessee Erosion and Sediment Control Handbook, latest edition.
- II. "Unstable." The tendency for land surface to change due to lack of structural and/or vegetative erosion and sediment control (see *infra* definitions HH and LL) support.

JJ. "Variance." A grant of relief from the requirements of this resolution that permits construction or activity in a manner otherwise prohibited by this resolution where strict enforcement would result in unnecessary hardship.

KK. "Vegetative buffer." The area of land adjacent to state waters in a state of vegetation which facilitates the protection of water quality and aquatic habitat.

LL "Vegetative erosion and sediment control practices." Measures for the stabilization of erodible or sediment producing areas by covering the soil with:

1. Permanent seeding, sprigging or planting, producing long-term vegetative cover;
2. Temporary seeding, producing short-term vegetative cover; or
3. Sodding, covering areas with turf of perennial sod-forming grass.

MM. "Watercourse." Any natural or artificial watercourse, stream, river, creek, channel, ditch, canal, conduit, culvert, drain, waterway, gully, ravine or wash in which water flows either continuously or intermittently and which has a defined channel, bed and banks, and including any area adjacent thereto subject to inundation by reason of overflow or floodwater.

Section 3. Existing eroding areas. Upon written notification from the Inspector, the owner of land which exhibits unstable or eroding soil conditions shall correct such conditions within thirty (30) calendar days. The Inspector may extend this period upon request if conditions warrant. Minimum correction measures shall include stabilizing slopes and vegetating all exposed soil surfaces. Before commencing corrective measures, the owner shall consult with the Inspector to determine an acceptable method of correction.

Section 4. Grading permit required. Except as provided in section 5, no person shall engage in any land-disturbing activity within the unincorporated areas of Blount County without obtaining a grading permit issued by the Inspector in accordance with the requirements set forth below:

A. Land-disturbing activity on any site equal to or greater than one-tenth (0.1) acre and less than one (1) acre in size requires:

1. Application with one copy of a sketch plan
2. Appropriate fee
3. Review of plan to check for basic compliance
4. Site inspection
5. Grading permit
6. Ongoing and final inspections

B. Land-disturbing activity on any site equal to or greater than one (1) acre in size requires:

1. Application with three (3) copies of legible engineering drawings of a formal plan

2. Appropriate fee
3. Engineering review by County Engineer
4. Site inspection
5. Grading permit
6. Ongoing and final inspections
7. After final inspection, certificate of completion from the Inspector.

All development activities which require right-of-way cuts or excavation within the development site and shown on a sketch or a formal plan shall be subject to all applicable fees. Grading activities which involve no construction or right-of-way cuts shall be subject to the grading permit fee schedule only.

All exceptions to this resolution which are outlined in section 5 will be required to use, maintain and follow the minimum requirements for controlling erosion and sediment set forth in section 9. If unstable or eroding soil conditions exist during the construction of those structures excepted in section 5, then section 3 shall prevail.

Section 5. Exceptions. Grading permits shall not be required for the following types of land-disturbing activity:

- A. Any project involving a site less than one-tenth (0.1) acre in size, unless the land disturbing activity is within two-hundred (200) feet of the bank of any state waters, in which event a grading permit is not required, but the owner or developer must prevent sediment from moving beyond the property boundaries of the site on which such project is located.
- B. Installation, maintenance and repair of any underground public utility line when such activity occurs on an existing right of way, and a cut or excavation permit has been obtained from the Blount County Road Superintendent, unless the activity is within fifty (50) feet of any state waters, in which event a grading permit is required.
- C. Any project carried out under the technical supervision of the Natural Resources Conservation Service of the United States Department of Agriculture
- D. Agricultural practices.
- E. Emergency work to protect life or property. Upon completion of emergency work, the disturbed area shall be shaped and stabilized in accordance with this resolution. The Inspector must be notified of the incident within seventy-two (72) hours thereof.

The owner or developer whose land-disturbing activity has been exempted from the requirements for a grading permit shall nevertheless be responsible for otherwise conducting such activity in accordance with the provisions of this resolution and other applicable laws including responsibility for controlling erosion and sedimentation.

Section 6. Application and plan review. No grading permit shall be issued until either a sketch or a formal plan has been approved by the Inspector. Such

plan shall comply, at a minimum, with the requirements set forth in section 9 of this resolution.

All applications for grading permits shall be filed with the Inspector at least ten (10) days prior to the commencement of the proposed land-disturbing activity. All applications shall include either a sketch plan or a formal plan.

A. Sketch plan. No person shall initiate land-disturbing activity on any site equal to or greater than one-tenth (0.1) acre and less than one (1) acre in size unless a sketch erosion and sediment control plan for such activity is filed with and approved by the Inspector.

The sketch plan shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

1. Property boundaries
2. Existing and proposed buildings
3. Streets and drives
4. General slope of the land
5. Location of existing trees
6. Trees to be removed
7. All structural and/or vegetative erosion and sediment control practices proposed to be installed
8. Scale and/or property dimensions
9. Existing and proposed watercourses
10. Name, address, and telephone number of the owner or developer of the land
11. Brief project description
12. Location of the land

B. Formal plan. No person shall initiate land-disturbing activity on any site equal to or greater than one (1) acre in size unless a formal erosion and sediment control plan for such activity is filed with and approved by the Inspector. Any formal plan may require a pre-construction conference.

The formal plan shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

1. Property boundaries
2. Two (2) ft. topographic contours – existing and proposed for slopes greater than fifteen percent (15%) or five (5) ft. intervals may be allowed
3. Site conditions prior to development and as they will be upon completion of the development
4. Proposed final groundcover within disturbed areas
5. All structural and/or vegetative erosion and sediment control practices proposed to be installed.
6. Finished elevations of buildings, streets, roads, drives, storm water utilities, sanitary sewer utilities and other related appurtenances within the proposed development
7. Volumetric and velocity rates of storm water runoff
8. Watercourses, sinkholes, bodies of water and other similar features affecting runoff on or adjacent to the proposed development
9. Stream designated as impaired by the state's 303d report

10. Indication of fill material used or deposited and where it is located
11. Name, address and telephone number of the owner or developer of the land
12. Brief project description
13. Clearing and grading limits
14. Location of existing trees
15. Trees to be removed
16. Location of site relevant to highways, municipalities, or other prominent landmarks

All formal plans shall be prepared by a licensed, qualified professional engineer and shall include a time schedule for completion and periodic maintenance after completion, details of structural and/or vegetative erosion and sediment control practices, daily clean-up and site control practices and any other information needed to accurately depict erosion and sediment control practices unique to the development.

The Inspector shall review all sketch and formal plans with necessary staff and make a determination with respect to the sufficiency thereof within ten (10) working days from submittal of the plan. If a plan is determined insufficient, the Inspector shall inform the owner or developer of the plan's deficiencies by written notification. The applicant shall then revise the plan to comply with this resolution and submit a revised plan to the Inspector, or the applicant may submit documentation to substantiate the validity of the original plan. If the Inspector finds corrections and additions to the plan in compliance, the Inspector will then notify the applicant of approval and a grading permit shall be issued. Grading permits shall expire one (1) year from the date of issuance unless extended by the Inspector.

If the land is to be developed in phases, then a separate grading permit shall be required for each phase.

A grading permit issued by the Inspector may specify any condition under which the land-disturbing activity shall be undertaken. The issuance of a grading permit does not relieve the permit holder of any obligation or responsibility of complying with the provisions of any other law or rules and regulations of any federal, state or additional local authority.

Section 7. Inspection and enforcement.

A. After the grading permit is issued, the Inspector shall inspect the site to determine whether structural and/or vegetative erosion and sediment control practices have been installed according to the sketch or formal plan submitted, and whether the practices are adequate for erosion and sediment control and are otherwise in compliance with this resolution.

1. For applications submitted with a sketch plan, if the site inspection indicates the structural and/or vegetative erosion and sediment control practices have been installed according to the plan submitted and are in compliance with this resolution, the Inspector shall allow work to commence.

2. For applications submitted with a formal plan, if the site inspection indicates the structural and/or vegetative erosion and sediment control practices have been installed according to the plan submitted and if the technical review of the plan by the Inspector indicates compliance with this resolution, the Inspector shall allow work to commence.

B. The requirements of this resolution shall be enforced by the Inspector, who shall inspect the work, grading or construction involved. If the Inspector finds any person has engaged in land disturbing activity without having obtained a required grading permit, the following shall occur:

1. First offense - A stop work order and a notice of violation shall be issued by the Inspector.
2. If work continues - Assessment of a civil penalty by the Inspector for each day work continues without a permit.

C. If the Inspector finds that the grading permit holder has failed to properly install, maintain or use proper structural and/or vegetative erosion and sediment controls practices as specified in the final plan, the following shall occur:

1. First offense - Written warning issued by the Inspector (maximum of two (2) days for compliance); if conditions warrant, a stop work order shall be issued immediately by the Inspector.
2. Second offense - Notice of violation issued, issuance of stop work order by the Inspector, and notification of Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation ("TDEC") of violation.
3. Third offense - Assessment of a civil penalty by the Inspector for each day work continues.
4. Each additional offense - Assessment of a civil penalty by the Inspector for each day work continues and suspension of the issuance of subsequent grading permits.
5. Failure to clean up site - Permit holder liable for three (3) times the cost of clean-up starting with the first offense (see *infra* subsection G).

D. If the Inspector determines that significant erosion and/or sedimentation is occurring on a graded site despite approved structural and/or vegetative erosion and sediment control practices, he shall require the permit holder to take additional corrective action to protect the adversely affected area. The additional corrective action required shall be part of an amended erosion and sediment control plan.

E. All stop work orders shall be effective immediately upon issuance and shall be in effect until the necessary corrective action or mitigation has occurred. Notice of a stop work order shall be in writing and shall be given by the Inspector to the owner or developer of the land, an agent of the owner or developer or the responsible person or shall be conspicuously posted by the Inspector at the project, and shall state the necessary corrective action with a completion date before other activity can resume. Notice given to the owner or developer, an agent of the owner or developer or the

responsible person may be given by first class U. S. Mail mailed to the address shown on the application for the grading permit, or if there is no application, to any address known by the Inspector for such owner or developer, agent of the owner or developer or responsible person, and it will be presumed that the notice is received by the addressee if it is not returned to the Inspector by the U. S. Postal Service.

F. All persons conducting land-disturbing activity which requires a grading permit shall keep a copy of the final plan on file at the site.

G. If, upon inspection, the Inspector finds that a person engaged in land-disturbing activity has failed to comply with a final plan and/or this resolution, the Inspector shall serve a written notice to comply upon that person in the same manner as provided in subsection E of this section. The notice shall set forth the corrective action necessary to achieve compliance and shall state the time within which such corrective action must be complete. If the person engaged in the land-disturbing activity fails to comply within the time specified, he shall be deemed in violation of this resolution and, in addition to other penalties, shall forfeit any security provided under the provisions of section 8 of this resolution. The County may use the proceeds of the security to employ a contractor to stabilize the site of the land-disturbing activity, including clean-up of the site, and bring the site into compliance with this resolution.

H. Any responsible person who receives three (3) related written notices under subsection G of this section will be required to retake the Level I - Fundamentals of Erosion Prevention and Sediment Control Workshop sponsored by TDEC or an approved equivalent course. If after completing the course, the same person receives another written notice under subsection G of this section within three (3) years of completing the course, subsequent requests for grading permits shall be denied to that person. Such person may appeal the denial of a grading permit to the Blount County Board of Zoning Appeals by requesting a hearing within thirty (30) days of the denial.

I. Any uncovered area existing on the effective date of this resolution which resulted from land-disturbing activity and which is subject to continued accelerated erosion and which is causing off-site damage from sedimentation, shall be provided with structural and/or vegetative erosion and sediment control practices to prevent erosion and control off-site sedimentation.

1. The Inspector shall give a written notice to comply to the owner or developer of land where any such uncovered area existed on the effective date of this resolution in the same manner as provided in subsection E of this section. The notice will set forth the corrective action necessary to achieve compliance with this resolution and shall state the time within which such corrective action must be completed. In determining the structural and/or vegetative erosion and sediment control practices required and the time allowed for compliance, the Inspector shall take into consideration the economic feasibility, technology and quantity of work required and shall set reasonable and attainable time limits for compliance.

2. An erosion and sediment control plan may be required by the Inspector where extensive structural and/or vegetative erosion and sediment control practices are necessary.

Section 8. Security requirements and fees. A. Prior to the issuance of a grading permit, the owner or developer may be required to provide security in the form of a cash deposit, letter of credit or other acceptable form of security for the work to be completed or any portion thereof pursuant to the final plan. When reviewing any application for a grading permit, the Inspector shall consider the past record of the applicant in complying with any previous permits and/or this resolution. The Inspector may require the applicant to provide acceptable security in a minimum amount of three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) per acre or fraction thereof for the proposed land-disturbing activity prior to issuing the permit. If an applicant has had three (3) or more violations of previous permits or this resolution within three (3) years prior to the date of filing the application under consideration, the Inspector shall require security. If the owner or developer does not comply with this resolution or with the conditions of the permit after issuance, the security shall be forfeited, and the County may use the proceeds of the security to employ a contractor to stabilize the site of the land-disturbing activity and bring the site into compliance with this resolution.

B. Security in the form of a cash deposit, letter of credit or other acceptable form of security must be provided for the following conditions:

1. Rough grading, site development, large residential development or commercial development when there is land-disturbing activity of an area equal to or greater than five (5) acres.
2. A potential for runoff, erosion and/or sedimentation to adversely impact public rights of ways, other property or state waters.
3. When a site drains into sinkholes or when the site is used for a borrow pit or waste area.

C. With regard to potential runoff, erosion and/or sedimentation which would adversely impact public rights of way, the actual amount of the security shall be based on a remediation and completion estimate for the disturbed area as determined by the Blount County Road Superintendent, with a minimum amount of three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) per acre or fraction thereof of land-disturbing activity. The road superintendent may refuse any proffered security based upon past performance, ratings of the offeror and/or surety of the security or other appropriate sources of reference information.

D. Within sixty (60) days of the completion and acceptance of all requirements of the final plan, the security shall be refunded or terminated.

E. The Board of County Commissioners of Blount County, Tennessee, shall set fees for obtaining grading permits by resolution.

Section 9. General criteria. The following General Criteria are minimum requirements for controlling erosion and sedimentation from land-disturbing activity and shall be incorporated into all erosion and sediment control plans as determined by the Inspector and/or County Engineer. All erosion and sediment control practices

shall conform to the requirements of this resolution. The practices shall apply to all features of the site including street and utility installations, drainage facilities and other temporary and permanent improvements. Practices shall be implemented to prevent or control erosion and sedimentation during all stages of any land-disturbing activity. No grading permit issued using the following General Criteria is intended to restrict the use of other innovative practices or modifications to the specified practices if such practices are thoroughly described and detailed and approved as part of or a supplement to the final plan prior to installation.

A. Minimum requirements for land disturbing activity. The minimum requirements for controlling erosion and sedimentation from land disturbing activity shall be as set forth in the Tennessee Erosion and Sediment Control Handbook, latest edition.

B. Stabilization of disturbed areas and soil stockpiles. Permanent or temporary soil stabilization must be applied to areas subject to land-disturbing activity when and where deemed necessary by the Inspector for the purpose of good soil stabilization practices. Soil stabilization refers to measures which protect soil from the erosive forces of wind, raindrop impact and flowing water, and include, but are not necessarily limited to, the growing of vegetative cover, sod, application of straw, mulching, fabric mats and early application of gravel base on areas to be paved. Soil stabilization measures should be selected to be appropriate for the time of year, site conditions, and estimated duration of use.

Stabilization measures shall be initiated as soon as practicable in portions of the site where construction activities have temporarily or permanently ceased, but in no case more than seven (7) days after the construction activity in that portion of the site has temporarily or permanently ceased, except in the following two situations: 1. where the initiation of stabilization measures by the seventh day is precluded by snow cover or frozen ground conditions, stabilization measures shall be initiated as soon as practicable; or 2. where construction activity on a portion of the site has temporarily ceased and land-disturbing activity will be resumed within fifteen (15) days, temporary stabilization measures do not have to be initiated on that portion of the site. Soil stockpiles not stabilized by vegetation must be stabilized or protected with sediment trapping measures to prevent soil loss.

C. Establishment of permanent vegetation. A permanent vegetative cover shall be established on areas subject to land-disturbing activity not otherwise permanently stabilized. Permanent vegetation shall not be considered established until a ground cover is achieved which, in the opinion of the Inspector, is mature enough to control soil erosion satisfactorily and to survive seasonal weather conditions.

D. Protection of adjacent properties. Properties adjacent to the site of land-disturbing activity shall be protected from sedimentation. This may be accomplished by preserving a well-vegetated buffer strip around the lower perimeter of the land-disturbing activity, by installing perimeter controls such as sediment barriers, filters, or dikes or sediment basins or by a combination of such measures.

Vegetated buffer strips may be used alone only where runoff in sheet flow is expected. Vegetated buffer strips shall be at least twenty (20) feet in width. If at any

time it is found that a vegetated buffer strip alone is ineffective in stopping sediment movement onto adjacent property, additional perimeter controls must be provided.

E. Timing and stabilization of sediment trapping measures. Sediment basins and traps, perimeter dikes, sediment barriers, and other measures intended to trap sediment on site must be constructed as a first step in grading and be made functional before upslope land-disturbing activity takes place. Earthen structures such as dams, dikes, and diversions must be seeded and mulched within seven (7) days of installation. These measures must be maintained in good working order and must remain in place until such time as the Inspector finds that the area is stabilized.

F. Sediment basins. Stormwater runoff from drainage areas with five (5) acres or greater of area subject to land-disturbing activity must pass through a sediment basin or other suitable sediment trapping facility with equivalent or greater storage capacity as specified in the Tennessee Erosion and Sediment Control Handbook, latest edition. Sediment basins or traps for smaller areas subject to land-disturbing activity may be required where deemed necessary. The sediment basin requirement may also be waived by the Inspector if site conditions do not warrant its construction.

G. Sodding detention ponds, ditches and drainage swales. Sod shall be used on detention ponds, ditches and drainage swales or if velocities warrant stabilization by other means as approved by the County Engineer. The owner or developer shall maintain sodded areas until they become established.

H. Cut and fill slopes. Cut and fill slopes must be designed and constructed in a manner which will minimize erosion. Consideration must be given to the length and steepness of the slope, the soil type, upslope drainage area, groundwater conditions and other applicable factors. Slopes which are found to be eroding excessively within one (1) year of project completion must be provided with additional slope stabilizing measures until the erosion is corrected. The following guidelines are provided to aid in developing an adequate design for slopes.

1. Topsoil for the area should be stockpiled and then used for replacement on the graded area.
2. Roughened soil surfaces are generally preferred to smooth surfaces on slopes.
3. Diversions should be constructed at the top of long steep slopes which have significant drainage areas above the slope. Diversions or terraces may also be used to reduce slope length.
4. Concentrated storm water should not be allowed to flow down cut or fill slopes unless contained within an adequate temporary or permanent channel, flume or slope drain structure.
5. Wherever a slope face crosses a water seepage plane which endangers the stability of the slope, adequate drainage or other protection should be provided.

I. Protection of storm sewer inlets. All existing storm sewer inlets and/or inlets which are made operable during construction shall be protected so that sediment-laden water will not enter the conveyance system without first being filtered or otherwise treated to remove sediment. All new storm sewer inlets should be properly

manufactured with precast warnings as to not allow any draining of chemicals, toxic, or hazardous substances due to draining to the river.

J. Working in or crossing watercourses. Construction vehicles shall be kept out of watercourses except when performing necessary work therein or when crossing during construction. The channel (including bed and banks) must always be stabilized immediately after in-channel work is completed. Where a live (wet) watercourse must be crossed by construction vehicles regularly during construction, a temporary stream crossing must be provided, the design of which must be approved by the Inspector.

K. Underground utility construction. The construction of underground utility lines shall be subject to the following criteria:

1. No more than five hundred (500) feet of open trench will be allowed at one time without a grading permit.
2. Where consistent with safety and space considerations, excavated material shall be placed on the uphill side of trenches.
3. Trench dewatering devices shall discharge in a manner which will not adversely affect flowing streams, drainage systems or off-site property.

L. Temporary stone construction entrance. Wherever construction access routes intersect paved public roads, provisions must be made to minimize the transport of sediment (e.g., mud) by runoff or vehicle tracking onto the paved surface by clearing the area at the entrance of all vegetation, roots and other objectionable material and placing a two-thirds (2/3rds) inch diameter stone layer at least six (6) inches thick underlain with filter fabric for a minimum of fifty (50) feet from the edge of the hard surface public road. This entrance shall be a minimum of twenty (20) feet in width and shall be maintained for the duration of the project or until a permanent access drive is constructed. Where sediment is transported onto a public road surface, the roads shall be cleaned thoroughly at the end of each day or more often if deemed necessary. Sediment shall be removed from roads by shoveling or sweeping and be transported to a sediment-controlled disposal area. Street washing shall be allowed only after sediment is removed in this manner.

M. Disposition of temporary practices. All temporary erosion and sediment control practices shall be disposed of within 30 days after final site stabilization is achieved or after the temporary practices are no longer needed, unless otherwise directed by the Inspector. Trapped sediment and other disturbed soft areas resulting from the disposition of temporary practices shall be properly disposed of and/or permanently stabilized to prevent further erosion and sedimentation.

N. Maintenance. All temporary and permanent erosion and sediment control practices shall be maintained and repaired as needed by owners and/or developers to insure continued performance of their intended function, as determined by the Inspector.

O. Erosion control before grading begins. Erosion and sediment control practices shall be in place and functional before land-disturbing activity begins and shall be constructed and maintained during the entire construction period. Temporary

measures may be removed at the beginning of the work day, but must be replaced at the end of the work day.

P. Responsible person. A specific individual shall be designated to be responsible for erosion and sediment control on each site. This individual shall have a minimum training of the Level I - Fundamentals of Erosion Prevention and Sediment Control Workshop sponsored by TDEC or an approved equivalent course. The responsible person must possess a valid certificate of completion.

Q. Inspections. The permit holder shall perform inspections of erosion and sediment control practices weekly in dry periods, before anticipated storm events (or a series of storm events as intermittent showers over one (1) or more days) and within twenty-four (24) hours after any rainfall of one-half (1/2) inch or greater within a twenty-four (24) hour period. During prolonged rainfall, daily inspections are shall be performed. Erosion and sediment control shall be repaired as necessary. The permit holder shall maintain a record of such inspections and repairs.

R. Storm water discharge. There shall be no distinctly visible floating scum, oil, or other matter contained in the storm water discharge. The storm water discharge must not cause the receiving stream to change color.

S. Vegetative buffer. An undisturbed vegetative buffer of a minimum of twenty-five (25) feet (as measured from the top-of-bank) shall be maintained adjacent to all free-flowing state waters. For bodies of water such as ponds, lakes, etc., an undisturbed vegetative barrier of at least twenty-five (25) feet shall be maintained. Except where the County Engineer allows a variance with mitigation that is at least as protective of natural resources and the environment, where otherwise allowed by the Inspector, or where drainage structure or road crossings must be constructed, the following requirements shall apply to any such buffer:

1. No land disturbing activity shall be conducted within the buffer, and the buffer shall remain in its undisturbed state of vegetation until all land-disturbing activity on the site is complete and all disturbed areas on the site are stabilized.
2. Nothing contained in this section shall prevent the County from adopting rules and regulations or resolutions that contain requirements that exceed the minimum requirements in this section.

T. Miscellaneous. Stripping of vegetation, grading, and other development activities shall be conducted so as to minimize erosion. Clearing and grubbing must be held to a minimum necessary for grading and equipment operation. Preconstruction vegetative cover shall not be destroyed, removed or disturbed more than ten (10) calendar days prior to grading or earth moving. Construction must be sequenced to minimize the exposure time of cleared surface areas.

Section 10. Variances. The Inspector may waive or modify any of the General Criteria which are deemed inappropriate or too restrictive for site conditions by granting a variance. Variances may be granted in writing under the following conditions:

A. At the time of plan submission, an applicant may request a variance(s) to become part of the final plan. The applicant must set forth the reasons for requesting a variance(s) in writing. Specific variance(s) must be documented on the final plan.

B. During construction, the permit holder may request amendments to the final plan. The amended plan shall be reviewed pursuant to the procedures set forth in section 6. Until such time as the amended plan is approved by the Inspector, the land-disturbing activity shall not proceed except in accordance with the original final plan. A response in writing or plan review approving or disapproving such request shall be given within five (5) working days. Without written approval, no amendment shall be considered valid.

Section 11. Final inspection and certification of completion. Upon completion of the work specified in the final plan, the permit holder shall request a final inspection. Final inspection shall occur within five (5) working days of the request. If upon final inspection, the Inspector finds that the permit holder has complied with the requirements of the final plan and that the project has been completed, the Inspector shall issue a certificate of completion and close the grading permit. Should the Inspector find that there has not been compliance, the Inspector shall notify the permit holder and the reason(s) therefor in writing. The permit holder shall then correct any deficiency(ies) and request a final inspection and issuance of a certificate of completion, or the permit holder shall submit security in the form of a cash deposit, letter of credit or other acceptable form of security guaranteeing completion of the work by a date certain. If the permit holder does not comply with the requirements of the final plan and complete the project, such security shall be forfeited, and the County may use the proceeds of the security to employ a contractor to bring the site into compliance with the requirements of the final plan. Should the Inspector conduct three (3) requested final inspections for the same permit without a certificate of completion being issued, the permit holder shall pay to the county a fee of fifty dollars (\$50.00) for each additional inspection conducted by the Inspector thereafter.

Section 12. Appeals. Any applicant or permit holder may appeal any decisions or interpretation of the provisions of this resolution by the Inspector to the Blount County Board of Zoning Appeals by filing a petition for review with the board within thirty (30) days of such decision or interpretation. Any person aggrieved by a final decision of the board may seek review by a court of competent jurisdiction.

Section 13. Civil penalty.

A. Any person or permit holder who violates any provisions of this resolution or any permit condition or limitation or who fails to comply with any order issued by the Inspector shall be liable for a civil penalty of not less than fifty dollars (\$50.00) or more than two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) per violation and/or failure

to comply. Each day during which the violation and/or failure to comply continues shall constitute a separate offense.

B. The following minimum penalties shall apply to land-disturbing activity which violates any provision of this resolution or any permit condition or limitation:

1. There shall be a minimum penalty of fifty dollars (\$50.00) per day for each violation involving residential construction; and
2. There shall be a minimum penalty of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250.00) per day for each violation involving land-disturbing activity other than provided in sub-subsection 1. of this subsection B.

C. The Inspector is authorized and empowered to assess a civil penalty against any person or permit holder who violates any provision of this resolution or any permit condition or limitation or who fails to comply with any order issued by the Inspector. Notice of such assessment shall be served upon the person or permit holder incurring the civil penalty in any manner authorized by law.

D. Any person or permit holder incurring a civil penalty may seek review thereof by filing a petition for review with the Blount County Board of Zoning Appeals. If a petition for review of a civil penalty is not filed within thirty (30) days after notice of the civil penalty is served upon the person or permit holder incurring the civil penalty in any manner authorized by law, such person or permit holder shall be deemed to have consented to the civil penalty, and it shall become final. A decision of the Blount County Board of Zoning Appeals may be appealed pursuant to the provisions of title 27, chapter 8 of the Tennessee Code Annotated. *See* Tenn. Code Ann. § 68-22-1106(d).

E. Whenever any civil penalty has become final, the county may apply to the chancery court for the county for a judgment and seek execution on such judgment. Failure to seek review of and/or to appeal a civil penalty shall be treated as a confession of judgment. *See* Tenn. Code Ann. § 68-22-1106(e).

F. In assessing a civil penalty, the Inspector may consider the following factors.

1. The harm done to the public health or the environment;
2. Whether the civil penalty imposed will be a substantial economic deterrent to the prohibited activity;
3. The amount of effort put forth by the person or permit holder incurring the civil penalty to remedy the violation;
4. Any unusual or extraordinary enforcement costs incurred by the County;
5. The amount of penalty established by resolution for specific categories of violations;

6. Any equities of the situation which outweigh the benefit of imposing any civil penalty; and
7. The economic benefit gained by the person or permit holder incurring the civil penalty.

See Tenn. Code Ann. § 68-22-1106(b).

G. Any civil penalty incurred by a person or permit holder pursuant to this resolution shall be in addition to any civil penalty assessed by the Commissioner of Environment and Conservation for violations of Tenn. Code Ann. §69-3-115 and/or any court-issued fines.

Section 14. Judicial proceedings.

A. The Inspector may institute injunction, mandamus, abatement or any other appropriate judicial action, actions, proceeding or proceedings to prevent, enjoin or abate the violation of any provision of this resolution or the provisions of any permit condition or limitation.

B. The County may prosecute violations of this resolution in the General Sessions Court for Blount County, Tennessee, in accordance with Tenn. Code Ann. § 5-1-123. Upon a finding that a person or permit holder has violated a provision of this resolution, the violator shall be subject to a fine not to exceed fifty dollars (\$50.00), and such fine shall be in addition to any civil penalty incurred under the provisions of this resolution. Each day during which a provision of this resolution is violated shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 15. Effective Date. This resolution shall take effect upon its adoption, the public welfare requiring it.

The County Commission is requested to approve the resolution necessary for the County's compliance with the EPA Phase II Stormwater regulations:

1. Soil Erosion & Sediment Control Resolution

Recall that this and other regulatory requirements promulgated under the Phase II regulations were first reviewed by the County's Phase II Stormwater Citizen Advisory Committee, a seven-member board. This committee met in 2002 and 2003 to determine the various facets of the County's Phase II program. Several presentations were presented to the County Commission by John Lamb and Lamar Dunn & Associates, Inc. describing the Phase II program and its federal mandates. Since the hiring of Justin Teague, the County Stormwater Coordinator, County staff has been meeting with representatives from Maryville and Alcoa to develop the specific requirements – such as this resolution – and to make it as similar as possible between the three local governments. In addition to extensive review by the County Attorney, the resolution was also distributed to the Stormwater Advisory Committee for their review. This resolution was developed from models provided by the State of Tennessee, UT-MTAS and such organizations. Comparisons were also made to other cities with similar programs.

As supplement to the full-text resolution, a summary is provided below.

Soil Erosion & Sediment Control Resolution

- Create a County grading permit system.
 - Requires an engineering plan for grading of sites of one acre or more. This will primarily effect subdivision development. It will not affect single-family residential dwellings unless the disturbed area of the site is one acre or more. A registered professional engineer must prepare these plans.
 - Allows anyone disturbing between 0.1 and 1 acre to simply submit a sketch plan depicting the proposed work. A homeowner, contractor, etc. may prepare these plans.
 - Allows the requirements to be strengthened if the work is within 200 feet of a stream.
 - Exemptions are included for work that is being performed under the requirements of the Natural Resources Conservation Service of the United States Department of Agriculture (formerly the Soil Conservation Service) and all agriculture practices.
 - Provides the authority for the County to require an acceptable form of security.
- Includes provisions for inspection and enforcement.

As noted in the resolution, such penalties must be based on factors such as damage to the environment, cost incurred by the County, costs avoided by the violator, etc.
 - Allows for issuance of "Stop Work Orders" in certain situations.

- Provides authority for the County Commission to establish fees for permits, etc. related to this resolution.
- Lists minimum requirements for grading operations (crushed stone access drives, etc.).
- Utilizes the Board of Zoning Appeals to hear matters related to this resolution and other stormwater issues.

The following five rezoning requests were recommended by the Planning Commission at their November 25, 2003 meeting, in order of consideration. Also included is background and staff analysis for information. All items come for setting of public hearing prior to vote.


1. Rezoning from R-1 Rural District 1 to RAC - Rural Arterial Commercial for part of property (to 750 feet of depth) located at Tax Map 100, Parcel 8 address 5223 Hwy 411 South.

Vote to recommend: nine for recommendation – Commissioners Gene Brown, Bob Kidd, Bruce McClellan, Kenneth Melton, Dan Neubert, Bill Proffitt, Ricky Rigsby, Ed Stucky and Darrell Tipton; two against recommendation – Steve Gray and Carl McDonald; Bob Arwood was absent.

Background: See map on next page for location of the proposed rezoning. This property was subject of a previous rezoning request for 1000 feet of depth off of Hwy 411 right-of-way. The previous request was recommended for approval by the Planning Commission, but denied by the County Commission. The present request, with depth reduced to 750 feet, comes as a new request.

Analysis: Parcel 8 contains three commercial buildings and uses at present, all fronting directly onto Hwy 411 to a depth of about 300 feet. The remainder of the parcel to a depth of about 2000 additional feet is open field.

Surrounding property shows mixed use. Adjacent parcel 7 is a large tract in agricultural use, split by Henry Lane about 600 feet to the west. To the north, approximately 1600 feet away from the land proposed for rezoning is parcel 4.02 in agriculture with a residential house. Across Henry Lane is Parcel 4.01 in agriculture, with an historic house approximately 1800 feet distance from the proposed rezoning. The distance of the residential and historical uses provides minimal use conflict.



Adjacent parcel 12.06 has a convenience store in an RAC zone (from previous rezoning). Parcels 12.06 and 12.04 are subject of RAC rezoning requests to 750 feet of depth and parcels 12.01 and 12.03 are subject of rezoning requests for the entire parcels (see below items 3, 4, and 5.) Thus, potential use conflict should be considered as minimal.

Across Hwy 411 is a mix of commercial and residential uses, including Foothills Mobile Home sales and A-1 Portable Building sales.

The land under consideration for rezoning has direct access to Hwy 411, a major arterial road. The request is consistent with the land use plan which envisions commercial use along arterial roads. The particulars of the land use plan in the area as expressed in the RAC zone text is subject to consideration for amendment (see separate memo on RAC zone text amendment). The proposal is also consistent with the intent of the RAC zone, and the 1101 Growth Plan allowing for low to medium intensity commercial use in the Rural Area.


The depth of the rezoning should be considered. The depth of rezoning was an issue with the previous request. The present request falls within the distance that many of the commercial uses and commercial zones show in the county. The depth of the rezoning falls within the range of options under present discussions on amending the RAC zone text.

2. Rezoning from S-Suburbanizing District to C - Commercial for property located at Tax Map 90, Parcel 19.02 address 3748 Hwy 411 South, with condition that any site plan for the property address drainage.

Vote to recommend: six for recommendation – Commissioners Gene Brown, Bob Kidd, Dan Neubert, Ricky Rigsby, Ed Stucky and Darrell Tipton; five against recommendation – Steve Gray, Bruce McClellan, Carl McDonald, Kenneth Melton, and Bill Proffitt; Bob Arwood was absent.

Background: See map on next page for location of the proposed rezoning. Note that this rezoning is within the Maryville planning region and will need to be forwarded to the Maryville Regional Planning Commission for review and recommendation prior to vote.

Analysis: Parcel 19.02, subject of this rezoning proposal, contains about four acres and is vacant. The depth of the property off of the highway right-of-way is about 1000 feet, with a width of about 200 feet. The property slopes severely off of 411, down to a wide drainage swale. Consequently, probable structure location on the lot will probably be set back more than the minimum 60 feet.



Surrounding property shows predominantly residential use mixed with open field. Adjacent parcel 19.01 is open field, and parcel 19 is residential with two houses. Adjacent to parcel 19 is the entrance to Polly's Meadow subdivision, a residential use which stretches from Hwy 411 to Old Niles Ferry. Adjacent parcel 18 is greenbelt agriculture with one residential structure. Parcel 34 to the rear over the hill from the proposed rezoning and fronting on Old Niles Ferry is in greenbelt agriculture. The nearest commercial use on the south side of Hwy 411 is about 1900 feet distant and is the area zoned C-Commercial at the intersection of Calderwood Hwy. Across Hwy 411, parcels 17.01 and 17.02 (the lots coming to a point at the seam of the map just below the "S") is presently in residential use, but was rezoned to C-Commercial several months back. Just to the north of this is a set of commercial uses not zoned C-Commercial, and about 1200 feet away from the proposed rezoning. Parcel 17.04 is residential use. Parcel 17 (including parcel 17.03) is greenbelt agriculture with a residential structure

fronting Hwy 411. Parcel 16 is in residential use across from the entrance to Polly's Meadow subdivision.

The land under consideration for rezoning has direct access to Hwy 411, a major arterial road. Hwy 411 right-of-way is already zoned C-Commercial, showing intent for commercial zoning and use along the highway. The request is consistent with the land use plan which envisions commercial use along arterial roads, and specifically commercial use in this area. The parcel is within the Maryville urban growth boundary and planning region, and the proposal is also consistent with the 1101 Growth Plan allowing for high intensity commercial use in the urban growth boundary.

The depth of the rezoning should be considered. The depth of commercial use has been an issue in several past rezonings. The present request falls at the extreme of distance that existing commercial uses and commercial zones show in the county. It could lead to a major extension of commercial use into a present agricultural setting.


3. Rezoning property from R-1 to RAC Rural Arterial Commercial for property located at Tax Map 100, Parcel 12.01 address 5141 Hwy 411 South and adjoining part of property (to 500 feet of depth) located at Tax Map 100, Parcel 12.04.

Vote to recommend: eleven for recommendation – Commissioners Gene Brown, Steve Gray Bob Kidd, Bruce McClellan, Carl McDonald, Kenneth Melton, Dan Neubert, Bill Proffitt, Ricky Rigsby, Ed Stucky and Darrell Tipton; none against; Bob Arwood was absent.

Background: See map on next page for location of the proposed rezoning. This property was subject of a previous rezoning request for 1000 feet of depth off of Hwy 411 right-of-way. The previous request was recommended for approval by the Planning Commission, but denied by the County Commission. The present request, with depth reduced to 500 feet, comes as a new request. Staff notes that the land has recently been redivided into a different configuration, but that the present request may be considered independent of that redivision.

Analysis: Note that the frontage of parcel 12.04 to a depth of 250 feet already has RAC zoning from a previous rezoning approval. The remainder of the parcel is presently zoned R-1 – Rural District 1. Parcel 12.04 contains

a metal building recently permitted as an accessory to residential use outside the present RAC zone, but with probable commercial use potential. The remainder of parcel 12.04 not subject of rezoning request is open field. The applicant previously maintained residence on Parcel 12,01 along with an adjacent commercial auto sales established prior to zoning.



Surrounding property shows mixed use. Adjacent parcel 12.06 has a convenience store in an RAC zone (from previous rezoning). Parcel 8 has three structures with commercial use fronting the highway. Adjacent parcel 12.03 is a residence with same ownership as the convenience store on 12.06. Note that Parcel 12.03 was also part of a previous request for rezoning to commercial use. Also, the proposed rezoning stops short of the rear of parcel 12.03. Thus, potential use conflict should be considered as minimal.

Parcels 4.02 and 12.05 are in greenbelt agriculture. Parcel 4.02 is at distance of about 1300 feet from the rezoning request and also contains a residence fronting Henry Lane. Staff notes that an historical house exists on parcel 4.01 across Henry Lane, subject of much discussion from the previous

rezoning request. The distance of the residential and historical uses provides minimal use conflict.



The depth of the rezoning, about 250 feet, is consistent with previous rezoning in the area.

CONCERNING THE ESTABLISHMENT
OF AN AD HOC FUGITIVE TASK FORCE

PURPOSE

The purpose of this Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) is to establish and outline the joint mission of the United States Marshals Service - Eastern District of Tennessee (USMS) and Blount County, Tennessee, acting through the elected Sheriff of Blount County, Tennessee (BCSO). For purposes of this MOU and Ad Hoc Task Fugitive Team is defined as a joint agency investigative effort concentrating on a specific fugitive case(s) which terminates with the apprehension of the fugitive(s). The task force will periodically organize apprehension teams consisting of members from the participating law enforcement agencies to apprehend individuals wanted on state and/or federal warrants. The policy, program involvement, and direction of the task force shall be the joint responsibility of the member agencies. Representatives from all agencies shall meet and confer on matters as necessary.

MISSION

The primary mission of the task force is to seek out and arrest, in a joint and coordinated manner, persons who have outstanding state and/or federal warrants for their arrest. The intent of this joint effort will be to increase public safety through the location and apprehension of state and federal fugitives.

The participating agencies will determine the outstanding warrants to be worked by the task force, the frequency with which apprehension teams will be organized, and the duration of the mission for each apprehension team. These decisions will be made consistent with availability of agency resources, availability of appropriate state and federal fugitive cases for the task force, and whether a joint task force effort is the most efficient and effective method to investigate and execute the warrant. The task force will primarily target fugitives wanted for, or having a criminal history including, violent crimes, weapon offenses, and/or drug offenses.

SUPERVISION

Operational supervision of the Ad Hoc Task Force will be the responsibility of the USMS representative designated as Coordinator, Ad Hoc Task Force. The operations supervisor will recommend federal warrant cases to be worked by the task force, confer with a supervisor(s) from all other participating agencies concerning recommended state warrant cases to be worked by the task force, ensure equal load assignment and proper staffing of apprehension teams, and coordinate day-to-day efforts of the apprehension teams.

Supervision of the personnel assigned to the task force apprehension teams(s) will be the responsibility of the supervisors of all the participating agencies. Responsibility for the conduct of the task force members will remain with the respective agency heads. The local ranking supervisor will, for administrative purposes, report directly to his/her commanding officer. The USMS coordinator will report directly to the Supervisory Deputy United States Marshal (SDUSM).

Operational problems will be mutually addressed and resolved by the assigned supervisors, under the guidance of the Operations supervisor. If problems arise which cannot be resolved to the supervisors mutual satisfaction, they should be progressively raised to the next level of supervision within the respective agencies. It is agreed that the resolution of operational problems at the lowest level is in the best interest of the task force.

OPERATIONAL PERSONNEL

Each agency agrees to provide at least one (1) officer, deputy, or agent during task force operations if necessary. State and local personnel assigned to the task force shall be certified law enforcement officers per state requirements.

EQUIPMENT

When apprehension teams are formed, each agency will, if possible, furnish required vehicles and radio equipment capable of transmitting and receiving messages on their local and/or state police radio network. Each agency will be responsible for the expenses incurred in the use of its respective vehicles and radios.

RECORDS AND REPORTS

All task force warrants, investigative reports, and arrest reports will be maintained by the agency responsible for the investigation. Leads sent out of the district will be forwarded to the USMS task force in the receiving area or the USMS district warrant squad.

APPREHENSION TEAMS

Apprehension team members will be employees from the participating agencies who will be dedicated, during the activation of a particular apprehension team, to the investigation and execution of the outstanding state and/or federal warrant(s). Each agency will be responsible for its own members' overtime pay or compensation in accordance with each agency's policies. Apprehension team members for local, State, or county law enforcement agencies should be officers who have received a Special Deputy United States Marshal appointment to be in force only while that person is assigned to an apprehension team and performing task force duties. All cases will be jointly investigated whenever possible during activation of an apprehension team. Teams will consist of personnel from different agencies whenever possible.

PROSECUTION

Fugitives will generally be prosecuted in the State or Federal court that issued the warrant. New charges (charges which are not the basis of the warrant upon which the fugitive was arrested) will be prosecuted in the appropriate state or federal court.

When a fugitive with outstanding state and federal warrants is arrested, a determination will be made on a case-by-case basis about the order in which prosecution will occur. The criteria for the decision will be based on which level of prosecution there would be the greatest benefit to the overall objectives of the task force. In all cases, immediate notification shall be made to the prosecutor concerned.

INFORMANTS

It is agreed that funds for informants relating to the execution of State and Federal warrants will be supplied by the agency with warrant jurisdiction according to their standard procedures.

USE OF FIREARMS

It is agreed that all members of the task force shall comply with their agency's guidelines concerning the use of firearms and deadly force. In the event of a shooting incident, it will be investigated by the appropriate agency or agencies. Copies of deadly force and/or firearms policies of the member agencies will be provided to each participating agency head.

ARREST ATTEMPTS

If necessary, when an attempt is being made to arrest a subject, a request for a marked unit and uniformed officer may be made to assist in the arrest. The on-scene task force members will exercise their discretion with the highest regard to the safety of the task force members, the general populace, and the targeted subject.

HOSTAGE AND BARRICADE SITUATION

Upon the first indication of a hostage or barricade situation, the operations coordinator will be notified and he/she will request a tactical unit from the appropriate local, state, or county agency. Upon arrival of the tactical unit, the Tactical Unit Commander will assume command of the situation. The Tactical Unit Commander will make the tactical decisions on the decided course of action, consistent with the policies of the agency that is responsible for investigation of the warrant.

PRESS/MEDIA RELEASES

Inquiries will be referred to the United States Marshal (USM) for the Eastern District of Tennessee. Press releases will be made only after participating agency heads agree that a release should be made. Thereafter, a joint press release or conference will be made. All press releases will exclusively make reference to the task force.

RELEASE OF LIABILITY

Each agency shall be responsible for the acts or omissions of its assigned personnel. Participating agencies or officers shall not be considered as the agent of any other participating agency. Nothing herein is intended to waive or limit sovereign immunity under federal or state statutory or constitutional law.

DURATION

This MOU is intended to be indefinite. Participating agencies may withdraw their participation at any time after a thirty-day notice to all parties signing this document. This agreement may be modified at any time by written consent of the involved agencies. The member agencies agree to review this MOU annually, and to made changes as necessary.

A RESOLUTION TO ALLOW BLOUNT COUNTY GOVERNMENT TO ENTER INTO AN AGREEMENT WITH FOOTHILLS COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION TO PROVIDE AFFORDABLE HOUSING FOR LOW-TO-MODERATE INCOME HOME BUYERS IN BLOUNT COUNTY, TENNESSEE

Whereas, in an effort to expand its partnership with local governments in helping to foster housing opportunities for low-to-moderate income families and address specific community needs, the department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has instituted the “\$1 Homes to Local Governments” program (designed to facilitate the sale of aged HUD inventory of single family homes to local governments for ONE DOLLAR (\$1.00), plus closing costs), and

Whereas, HUD allows the local government to purchase the property and convey it to a nonprofit organization for rehabilitation and resale to first time homebuyers, low-to-moderate income buyers, or some other public purpose as part of its disposition strategy, and

Whereas, Foothills Community Development Corporation (hereinafter FCDC) is a 501C-3 not-for-profit housing developer serving Blount County, Tennessee with the mission and wherewithal to rehabilitate and resell homes for low-to-moderate income home buyers and agrees to:

1. Identify the intended disposition strategy and clear public purpose goals and objectives it will pursue with properties purchased through this program;
2. Affirm that all profits/proceeds of sales of HUD homes will go to support local housing/community development initiatives;
3. Identify what specific programs or uses these profits/proceeds will support; and
4. Provide HUD’s Homeownership Center (HOC) Program Support Staff Director with an annual report on all properties purchased under this program. The report must include information on the ultimate property purchaser, the amount of profit realized on the final sale and where the profit was put back into local housing/community development; as per HUD’s eligibility requirements.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED FCDC requests that Blount County, Tennessee designate FCDC as Blount County’s agent and authorized signatory for the sole purpose of purchasing “\$1 Homes for Local Government” and subsequently facilitate such purchases directly to FCDC under HUD guidelines for the purpose of creating affordable housing.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this resolution be made a part of the official records of the Board of County Commissioners of Blount County, Tennessee.

HUD \$1 Homes Presentation

Introduction: My name is Kay Bowers and I serve as Executive Director of Foothills Development Corporation and Blount County Habitat for Humanity---2 organizations with the same purpose: to assist people in gaining decent, safe and affordable housing. At this time we are focusing on helping folks become homeowners. FCDC works with families who with some assistance from us can become qualified for special low-interest loans from traditional lenders and Habitat works more intensely with families at lower income levels to become homeowners utilizing Habitat's revolving loan fund. Tonight, I come to you with a proposal from Foothills Community Development Corporation.

Why am I here: I am seeking the county's partnership in a HUD (housing and urban development) program called " \$1 Homes for local governments". The purpose of this program is to make available HUD owned, foreclosed homes for sale to low and moderate income homebuyers through entities whose purpose is community development.

How does this program work: HUD lists its foreclosed properties on its website for 6 months. If the homes are not sold within the 6 month time frame then they are available exclusively to municipalities for 10 days at a selling price of \$1 as long as they abide by the requirements and intent of the program. The municipality may then convey the property to a non-profit for rehabilitation and resale to low and moderate income buyers. To be eligible to participate in this program, the local government must agree to the following:

1. Identify a disposition strategy with public purpose goals and objectives
2. Affirm that all profits from the resale will support local housing and community development
3. Identify what specific programs or uses these profits will support
4. Provide an annual report to HUD for all properties, purchasers, profits and profit utilization associated with this program.

How will the partnership work: Foothills Community Development Corporation wishes to partner with Blount County to take advantage of this opportunity to help more families acquire decent, affordable homes. As the county's representative and authorized signatory we will accept the responsibility for preparing and submitting to HUD the required documentation and reports referred to above. We will monitor the advertisements to ensure timely submission of bids for the county. We will enter into a contract with HUD to purchase the property for the county. We will provide the \$1 to purchase the property and pay for closing costs associated with the purchase from HUD. A double closing will occur using HUD's Title agent transferring the property from

HUD to the county and then immediately to FCDC which will minimize liability for the county.

Additional Information: Buster Goodwin with Knoxville's HUD field office has educated us about the program, tells us that it has been around for sometime and is currently being successfully utilized in Knox, Anderson, Loudon, Roane and Jefferson counties in our area. We have also explained the program to Dave Bennett who has given us his support and says he sees this as a "no brainer" that can be done.

SUBJECT: Referral of items from the Planning Commission.

1. Request of the Public Services Committee for consideration of measures to delete the 60 day time limit for BZA decisions on special exceptions, and either (1) place a moratorium on commercial special exceptions along Hwy 411 and Hwy 321 in the county until the Hunter Interests growth strategy plan is done, or (2) delete commercial special exception provisions from the zoning regulations for Hwy 411 and Hwy 321 until the Hunter Interests growth strategy plan is done.

This item was referred to the Planning Commission for consideration and recommendation. The Planning Commission declined to take action or make recommendation on this item. The following is excerpt of staff report on the item for reference.

The issue of the 60 day limit on decisions of the Board of Zoning Appeals for special exceptions was considered in the past by the Planning Commission. The following is the subject zoning regulation text Section 11.5 E:

E. The Board shall act on the application within 60 days of the hearing, unless the applicant requests an extension of time. Upon hearing, any party or parties in interest may appear in person or by agent or attorney.

The purpose of the 60 day limit is to prevent undue delay or dilatory inaction in decisions. The information needed on a matter should be complete by the time of hearing, and 60 days after hearing was considered a reasonable time to gather any new information or allow consideration needed for a decision. If the BZA feels that information is not complete or is not accurate, or does not support the special exception, they have the discretion and authority to deny the application. This is appropriate planning and regulatory administration practice. Staff does not support deleting the requirement for 60 day decision limit. This matter has been referred also to Norman Newton for review and opinion.

The issue of moratorium on commercial special exceptions along Hwy 411 and 321 is a policy consideration in relation to the on-going Hunter Interests growth plan. This matter has also been referred to Norman Newton for review and opinion. Staff cautions that commercial special exceptions apply to not only Hwy 411 and 321, but also to other arterial and collector status roads in the County. There may then be another issue of equal application in placing a moratorium.

The issue of deleting provisions for commercial special exceptions along Hwy 411 and 321 is a policy consideration in relation to the on-going Hunter Interests growth plan. This would have the same effect as a moratorium. This matter has also been referred to Norman Newton for review and opinion. Staff cautions that commercial special exceptions apply to not only Hwy 411 and 321, but also to other arterial and collector status roads in the County. There may then be another issue of equal application in deleting provisions only for Hwy 411 and 321.

Staff also handed out a supplemental analysis at the August regular meeting (of the Planning Commission). The supplemental analysis was in response to comments sent to several Planning Commission members. The following is the body of supplemental staff analysis edited for reference.

1. Justin Evans, Planner with the Local Planning Assistance Office, notes that the status of other county and city regulations does not preclude setting time limits on decisions. Staff notes that the only default in favor of the applicant would be allowing the applicant to demand that a decision be made. This could be pursued through the courts if all else fails. The time limit on decision does not automatically default to approval of the application after 60 days.
2. Bart Hose, Regional Director of the Local Planning Assistance Office, notes that state statutes do not preclude setting time limits on decisions, and that such time limits are at the discretion of the local government.

3. Maryville does not have the same provisions for time limits, but it is a matter of discretion, and staff would advocate that Maryville consider our 60 day time limit as reflecting a more appropriate standard for administering regulations.

4. Much has been made of the assertion that no other county or city in the region or the state has such provisions. You do not have to look far to find an exception to that assertion. Loudon County has a 60 day time limit, and Lenoir City has a 45 day time limit.

If you pursue the logic of the argument that we should fall in line with the majority of other counties in the state, it would follow that we should not have zoning at all since the majority of counties in the state do not have zoning (55.8%), and such an argument could be extended to other regulations such as building codes (71.6% of counties do not have building codes). The argument for an action based on number and percentages of counties having or not having a regulation is spurious. What we need to do is ask: Is an action consistent with good planning and regulatory administration, and is it good for Blount County?

Staff contends that placing time limits on decisions is good planning and regulatory administration. This is supported in the Growing Smart Legislative Guidebook published by the American Planning Association.

Such limits will forestall any attempts at delays intended to frustrate the proper administration of regulations. If an applicant meets requirements of the regulations, the application should be approved expeditiously. If not, the application should be denied expeditiously. Determination of requirements should be a straightforward process of evidence and interpretation of regulations, and the Board of Zoning Appeals should be able to accomplish such in a specified period of time. Keep in mind that the BZA has wide discretionary authority to deny an application if it determines that the application is deficient in content, does not meet standards of the regulations, or would have an adverse impact.

2. Recommendation regarding legality of zoning regulations Section 6.2 that allows expansion of non-conforming uses onto new property.

The Planning Commission recommends that Section 6.2 of the zoning regulations be deleted in its entirety. The vote was unanimous. This item will require setting of public hearing with at least 15 days notice in the newspaper prior to action. The following is excerpted and edited staff report for reference.

SUBJECT: Section 6.2, as amended, of the Zoning Resolution

The planning commission has requested my opinion on the appropriateness of section 6.2, as amended, of the county's Zoning Resolution. Section 6.2 currently provides:

Section 6.2. Expansion of an existing non-conforming industry or business onto newly acquired adjacent land. A non-conforming industry or business in existence and in operation at the effective date of this Resolution, which subsequently acquires adjacent land for the purpose of expansion of the non-conforming use, may be allowed to expand onto the newly acquired land if approved as a special exception by the Board of Zoning Appeals under provisions of Section 11.5 of this Resolution.

Reference is made to my December 19, 2000, memorandum to John Lamb. In that memorandum, I reviewed certain principles which are set forth in the *421 Corp.* case referred to in the July 2004 staff memorandum and in the case of *Dickson County v. Jennette*, 2000 W. L. 1121550 (Tenn. Ct. App.). After reviewing these principles, I concluded that the pre-existing non-conforming use provisions of Tenn. Code Ann. § 13-7-208(b)-(d) constitute vested rights which must be followed and which cannot be altered, expanded or restricted by local governments.

Section 6.1 of the Zoning Resolution is consistent with Tenn. Code Ann. § 13-7-208(b)-(d) and sets forth vested rights which the county must recognize. However, these vested rights apply only to land owned and in use by the affected industrial, commercial or business establishment and do not operate to permit expansion of an existing industry or business through the acquisition of additional land. See Tenn. Code Ann. § 13-7-208(e). Accordingly, under the state statute, the vested rights set forth in section 6.1 cannot be extended to adjacent land.

Section 6.2 purports to recognize that the Board of Zoning Appeals has the discretion to allow a non-conforming industry or business to expand onto newly acquired land if approved as a special exception. This is the result that is expressly prohibited by Tenn. Code Ann. § 13-7-208(e). The real question is whether a local government can allow by special exception a result that is expressly prohibited by state law. Based on legislative history discussed in the *421 Corp.* case, I do not believe that it can. *421 Corp.*, p. 477. However, I acknowledge that this question has not been directly addressed by any Tennessee appellate court decision that I can find in my research. Accordingly, my analysis may be incorrect.

I recommend that Article 6 address only the vested rights provided Tenn. Code Ann. § 13-7-208(b)-(d), and that section 6.2 be deleted therefrom. I note that section 6.2 is surplusage to section 11.5, which provides for and governs the granting of special exceptions. If I am wrong in my analysis, section 11.5 is still available if a landowner wants to try to obtain a special exception to expand onto newly acquired land.

Staff notes that in the next to last paragraph of Mr. Newton's memo, his assumption that special exception provisions in Section 11.5 are available to expand a non-conforming use onto newly acquired land is not correct. Section 11.5 is general provision for special exceptions. Specifics of special exceptions are contained in separate sections relating to particular uses. Given the analysis of Mr. Newton, staff recommends amending the zoning regulations to delete Section 6.2 in its entirety. If the Planning Commission so decides, appropriate action would be recommendation to the County Commission to delete Section 6.2. Amendment of the regulations would then go through a process of public notice, public hearing and consideration for action by the County Commission.

3. Recommendation to amend the zoning regulations concerning length of cessation of operation of commercial and industrial businesses.

The Planning Commission recommends amending the zoning regulations to reflect newly enacted state statutes regarding length of cessation of operation of commercial and industrial businesses as non-conforming uses under zoning. The vote was unanimous. This item will require setting of public hearing with at least 15 days notice in the newspaper prior to action. The subject state legislation is attached to this memo for reference. The appropriate wording of amendment is as follows:

That Section 5.3 be amended by deletion of the wording "two (2) years" and placing therein "thirty (30) months".

AN ACT to amend Tennessee Code Annotated, Section 13-7-208, relative to the continuation of uses and structures not in conformance with local government zoning.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF TENNESSEE:

SECTION 1. Tennessee Code Annotated, Section 13-7-208, is amended by adding the following language as new subsections:

(g) The provisions of subsections (b)-(d) shall not apply if an industrial, commercial, or other business establishment ceases to operate for a period of thirty (30) continuous months and the industrial, commercial, or other business use of the property did not conform with the land use classification as denoted in the existing zoning regulations for the zoning district in which it is located. Anytime after the thirty (30) month cessation, any use proposed to be established on the site, including any existing or proposed on-site sign, must conform to the provisions of the existing zoning regulations. For the purposes of this subsection, the thirty (30) month period of continuous ceased operation shall be tolled by:

(1) The period in which an industrial, commercial, or other business establishment is party to any action in a court of competent jurisdiction regarding the use of the property until such time that a final settlement, order, decree, or judgment has been rendered;

(2) Any period in which a facility is being constructed, reconstructed, renovated, or refurbished, provided that all necessary building permits were obtained within thirty (30) months of cessation of continuous use;

(3) The filing of an application for a building permit for the alteration, renovation or reconstruction of a structure which is non-conforming or of a structure in which or out of which a non-conforming industrial, commercial or other business use operates or is located; or

(4) The reactivation of the non-conforming use any time prior to the end of the thirty (30) month period.

Provided, however, the restrictions of subsections (g) and (i) shall only apply if the property owner intentionally and voluntarily abandons the nonconforming use of the property. In any contested matter on the use of such property, the government has the burden of proving an overt act of abandonment in such matter.

(h) The provisions of subsections (b)-(d) shall apply to an off-site sign, which, for the purposes of this section means any sign that advertises or gives direction to any business, product, service, attraction, or any other purpose or interest, other than the industrial, commercial or other business establishment located on the site where the sign is located; provided, however, that any expansion shall be limited as follows:

(1) Any off-site sign smaller than a standard 8-sheet poster, which, for the purposes of this subsection means an off-site sign with overall dimensions of at least five feet four inches (5' 4") to six feet two inches (6' 2") in height and eleven feet four inches (11' 4") to twelve feet two inches (12' 2") in width shall not be expanded to a size greater than a standard 8-sheet poster;

(2) Any standard 8-sheet poster shall not be expanded to a size greater than a 30-sheet poster, which, for the purposes of this subsection means an off-site sign with overall dimensions of twelve feet three inches (12' 3") in height and twenty-four feet six inches (24' 6") in width;

(3) Any standard 30-sheet poster shall not be expanded to a size greater than any standard bulletin, which, for the purposes of this subsection means any off-site sign with overall dimensions of ten feet (10') to fourteen feet (14') in height and thirty-six feet (36') to forty-eight feet (48') in width;

(4) Any standard bulletin shall not be expanded to a size greater than any super bulletin, which, for the purposes of this subsection means any off-site sign with overall dimensions of sixteen feet (16') to twenty feet (20') in height and sixty feet (60') in width;

(5) Any super bulletin shall not be expanded; or

(6) Any off-site sign with height larger than standard 8-sheet poster height or width larger than standard 8-sheet poster width but not meeting the definition of a standard 8-sheet poster, a standard 30-sheet poster, a standard bulletin, or a standard super bulletin shall not be expanded by more than one hundred percent (100%) of its surface area.

(i) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (d), any structure rebuilt on the site must conform to the provisions of the existing zoning regulations as to setbacks, height, bulk, or requirements as to the physical location of a structure upon the site, provided that this subsection shall not apply to off-site signs.

(j) The provisions of subsections (g), (h) and (i) do not apply to any home rule municipality, however, subject to the approval of the local legislative body, a home rule municipality may opt into the provisions of these subsections.

(k) Notwithstanding the foregoing, subsection (g) shall not apply to any industrial establishment location where twenty-five percent (25%) or more of the gross annual sales from such location are derived from sales to or contracts with local, state or federal governments or as a subcontractor to contracts with the same, or to any industrial establishment location where seventy-five percent (75%) or more of the gross annual sales from the location are made to agriculture or construction businesses.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon becoming a law, the public welfare requiring it.

SECTION 1. The Blount County Senator and Representatives are requested to sponsor legislation in the General Assembly which would amend the general law of the State of Tennessee, viz., Tenn. Code Ann. 10-7-408

SECTION 2. Tennessee Code Annotated Section 10-7-408 is amended by designating the existing language as subsection (a) and adding the following language as a new subsection (b):

(b) The county legislative body of any county which creates a county records commission has the power to establish and collect, through all county offices as referred to in section 10-7-403, an archives and record management fee not to exceed \$2.00 per document filed, such fee to be used exclusively for duplicating, storing, and/or maintaining any records required by law to be permanently kept to include any county with the population of 105,800 to 105,900 according to the 2000 census.

SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect immediately, the public welfare requiring it.

Dear Members of the Blount County Commission:

The membership of the Blount County Museum Board, charged by several commissions with studying the feasibility of there being a museum in Blount County to discover and celebrate the history of this historic county, has determined that such a museum should be created. The museum board now has both **plan** and **purpose**: we need, with your help, to add **place** to the objectives. Board members will be coming to you on the 16th of the month to ask for the place to house our museum—the building many still refer to as the “old” library.

Many of you have already been approached on an individual basis, and at your next meeting will be asked collectively to allow the people of Blount County to continue using the former library (now the municipal building) for the pride, education, and historical benefit of all Blount County citizens. The history of each settlement, each community, each historic school district, and each sports team deserves to be displayed and recounted in an interesting, lively way.

The story of commerce for the district—from its growth from an agrarian pioneer settlement to the county’s thriving manufacturing and service-oriented economic base of today needs to be related. Featured displays and stories about the oldest continually operating manufacturing plant in the state (in Rockford) will awaken pride in the community. Hearing and seeing the story of the formation and growth and history of the Aluminum Company of America (Alcoa), will cause prickles of pride to run up and proudly straighten Blount County spines. The world changes that have brought Denso here will remind Blount County citizens that they have gone from a farm community where families struggled to raise enough food to a county that supplies the need for certain goods for the entire world.

Tales of county transportation, too, and the many routes that have brought people and their hand-made and farm-grown goods and later manufactured goods up and down our rivers, roads, rails, and runways will be featured. A transportation section of the museum, important not only because it will create historic links for mental travel, will also allow us to apply for certain grants available for set-up and display purposes.

The stories of “ordinary” sons and daughters of the county, stories of the native peoples of the area, stories of fame, fortune and even failure, stories of strife overcome and triumph over struggle—all can and should be told. You can provide the venue—the place—for all of these stories to be told, for artifacts to be displayed, for diaries and other historical accounts to be read. Your affirmative vote will allow the Museum Board to follow its plan of turning a county building with an uncertain future into one that links the people of Blount County to their wonderful past.

The Blount County Museum Board expects to raise monies to turn the building into a museum and will raise maintenance, staffing, and display money from strong fund-raising efforts. From the commission, we need only a win/win catalyst: permission to keep a public building available to the public. Although there are buildings such as the recently deserted Labor and Workforce building across from the court house, the size is more suitable for court house offices than for meeting the historical display and record needs of the county. However, a Blount County museum would be a logical place to store county archival material. That would free space in the court house for other needs, too. The county cannot hope to raise—by the sale of the building at public auction—the amount of money the building is truly worth: the amount it would cost Blount County to replace the building. If the museum board can stop worrying about erecting a building and stick to raising only the building’s conversion, operating, and maintenance costs, its task will be reduced from monumental to manageable.

If the commission will be good enough to allow us to have the building on the 16th of December, we will begin on the 17th to raise the needed funds for making the dream of a Blount County Museum into a reality. Thank you for considering our request. A delegation from our board will be at your meeting on December 16.



The Blount County Planning Commission met in regular session on Thursday September 23, 2004, at the Courthouse. Staff was represented by: John Lamb, Director of Planning; Douglas Hancock, Planner; Roger Fields, Building Commissioner; and Gaye Hasty, administrative assistant.

Commissioners Present: Chairman, Gene Brown, Steve Gray, Bob Kidd, Bruce McClellan, Carl McDonald, Kenneth Melton, Ed Stucky, and Darrell Tipton.
Commissioners Absent: Bill Proffitt and Rick Rigsby.

The minutes of the August 26, 2004 regular monthly meeting were approved. Prior to the meeting, these were mailed to members for review.

Long Range Planning & Zoning:

Commissioner Gray made the motion to move item number seven regarding adult entertainment businesses to the beginning of the agenda. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Kidd and received unanimous approval.

Discussion of and possible action on avenues to address issues of adult entertainment businesses in the county.

Mr. Lamb explained that the basic principles of regulating adult entertainment involve protection of First Amendment freedom of speech and expression of rights. Staff investigated and found that you can have reasonable content neutral regulation of adult entertainment. Adult entertainment stores are a legal business use. You can regulate time, place and manner. The manner of operation is regulated by Tennessee Code Annotated 7-51-1101 and following sections. The time is regulated by TCA 7-51-1401. The place can be regulated by zoning. A board has been appointed for the county that will regulate adult entertainment businesses in the county by the licensing procedure. Mr. Norman Newton, attorney for the County Mayor, found that "...the county's zoning resolution can address the location, configuration, and site plan requirements, etc., of such premises." The Planning Commission must first consider state statutes enabling the county to adopt zoning regulations. The separation of structures, businesses and so forth is allowed under state statute. The main points to glean from state statutes are that zoning addresses defined aspects of land use, allows for control of land use and the effects of land use on surrounding uses, must be equally applied for like uses, and must be related to the purpose of the police power which is to protect the public health, safety and welfare.

Given the wide range of adult oriented business types, a single one-size-fits-all regulation approach may not be appropriate. In addition, zoning can only address issues of land use, and not issues of criminal activities or issues of internal operation. Law enforcement authorities should address criminal activities, and licensing procedures with associated inspections should address internal operation issues.

For lawful adult oriented businesses, there are two ways of approaching regulation. For operations or internal management issues, licensing is the most appropriate avenue of regulation.

Kelly and Cooper Planning Advisory Service Report Number 495/496 entitled "everything you always wanted to know about regulating sex businesses xxx" find that "Regulating sex businesses is complex. Zoning is an essential but inadequate tool to regulate sexually oriented businesses." Zoning can not stand on its own and regulate very effectively.

There are major legal issues in regulating adult oriented land uses through zoning, in addition to all other legal issues of zoning regulation. Most important is the application of First Amendment principles of freedom of expression. Adult entertainment is a legal, free expression and is protected by the constitution.

Adult oriented media, and the showing of such media, has broad constitutional protection under freedom of expression. In general, you cannot directly regulate the content of such media or expression. However, you can address by regulation the secondary effects of the land use, i.e., the adult oriented business as a land use category.

In summary, Kelly and Cooper cite several studies that support findings that adult oriented businesses have negative land use effects that may be addressed through land use regulations in zoning. The negative effects can justify content neutral regulations based on separation distance from protected uses, and separation distances from like uses to control concentration.

Recommendations of interest to zoning include separation requirements, conditional use, and signage. Of the three, separation requirements have the most validity and least legal problems. Kelly and Cooper recommend that separation distances be based on pedestrian or driving distance, i.e. by sidewalk or road distance, and not as the crow flies. However, separation requirements must be reasonable to be defensible, and "There must be actual sites available for uses protected by the First Amendment." In other words, the intent and effect of regulations should not be to zone adult oriented businesses out of existence.

Kelly and Cooper recommend that adult oriented land uses be restricted to commercial and industrial zones. They caution again that "uses protected by the First Amendment must be allowed by right somewhere."

Concerning conditional uses, termed special exceptions in relation to county regulations, Kelly and Cooper find that such special exception provision and process is probably unconstitutional as applied to most adult oriented establishments due to issues of prior restraint of protected expression. They recommend that it be a use by right with specific regulation. In other words, specific criteria for establishment.

Concerning signage, Kelly and Cooper caution that there is a double First Amendment issue, applying to the products associated with the use and again applying to the message on the signs. To remain content neutral as much as possible, they suggest that signage issues be studied in much more depth by legal counsel before pursuing specific regulation.

Staff reviewed the county zoning regulations, with the following findings and recommendations:

1. Operation issues are addressed by the recently adopted state statutes in TCA 7-51-11-1 et seq., and 7-51-1401 et seq., for licensing adult oriented businesses, and zoning need not address such operation issues.
2. Statutory definition of "adult oriented establishment" may be incorporated by reference from TCA 7-51-1102 as a definition of land use for zoning regulation purposes and for consistency with the adopted licensing provisions.
3. The regulation of separation is allowed under state statutes on zoning, and is appropriate for application to adult oriented establishments.
4. The appropriate separation of adult oriented establishments from each other can be 1,000 feet.
5. 1,000 feet is also an appropriate separation of adult oriented establishments from the following land uses: any residential uses; houses of worship; public or licensed educational institutions that serve persons younger than 18 years old; day care centers; public parks, recreation areas or playgrounds; libraries, museums, and other public buildings that cater in whole or in part to persons younger than 18 years old.
6. Adult oriented establishment should be a use of right in the C-Commercial zone, with objective condition of separation from other adult oriented establishments, and from uses identified in 5 immediately above.
7. Any regulation of signage for adult oriented establishments should undergo rigorous legal review and advice before action by the county, and should be considered in the context of review of sign regulations in general.
8. There may be other avenues for regulating adult oriented establishments under county zoning, but such avenues should undergo rigorous legal review and advice before action by the county.

9. Staff recommends for immediate consideration the following amendments to the county zoning regulations, subject to legal review by the attorney for the County Mayor:

That a new Section 7.12 be added under General Provisions as follows:

Section 7.12 Adult Oriented Establishments. In addition to all other requirements for commercial uses, the following shall be requirements for adult oriented establishments as defined in TCA 7-51-1101 et seq.:

- A. any adult oriented establishment shall be located no nearer than 500 measured from nearest lot line to nearest lot line in any direction to lots containing protected uses delineated in subsection C below; and
- B. any adult oriented establishment shall be located no nearer than 1,000 feet measured from nearest lot line of lot containing adult oriented establishment along any street, road, easement of access or other way, to nearest lot line of lots containing protected uses delineated in subsection C below;
- C. protected uses shall be any residential use, place or house of worship including church or temple, public or licensed educational institution that serves persons younger than 18 years old, day care center, public park, public or private recreation area or playground, library, museum, or other public building that caters to or serves in whole or in part persons younger than 18 years old;
- D. any adult oriented establishment shall be located no nearer than 1,000 feet measured from nearest lot line to nearest lot line in any direction to a lot containing an adult oriented establishment.

That Section 9.4A (C-Commercial District Permitted Uses) be amended by addition of the wording "adult oriented establishment as defined in TCA 7-51-1101 et seq, subject to requirements in Section 7.12"

That Section 9.10 A (RAC-Rural Arterial Commercial District Permitted Uses) be amended by addition of the wording "adult oriented establishment as defined in TCA 7-51-1101 et seq, subject to requirements in Section 7.12"

That Sections 9,1D, 9.2D, 9.3D (S-Suburbanizing, R-1 – Rural District 1, R-2 – Rural District 2 Uses Prohibited) be amended by addition at the end of the respective sections of wording "and adult oriented establishments as defined in TCA 7-51-1101 et seq."

Mr. Lamb explained that state law does not address the issue of recommended number of feet as a separation. In the resources used by staff, the limit is 1,500 feet. Kelly and Cooper do not recommend 1,500 feet in the planning report. They were more comfortable with 1,000 feet.

Discussion was held in regards to the beer ordinance requiring 2,000 feet separation distances. Mr. Lamb stated that beer board issues are a retail use. Adult entertainment addresses First Amendment issues.

Commissioner Gray made the motion to recommend amendment to the zoning regulations and to approve the staffs' recommendation, but to not allow the use in the RAC zone, and to change the separation distance to be 1,000 feet as the crow flies, and to require the applicant to provide proof of separation distance. Commissioner McDonald seconded the motion which received unanimous approval. The recommendation will now go to the County Commission for public hearing and action.

Possible action on Resolution of the Blount County Planning Commission amending Section 6.1(2) of the Subdivision Regulations regarding adequacy of school infrastructure.

The Planning Commission held public hearing on this item at the last regular meeting of August 26, 2004. This item was for possible action to amend the Subdivision Regulations.

Commissioner Kidd stated that he would like to hear from the newly elected school board members and the new school board chairman regarding this item.

Commissioner Tipton pointed out that the City of Maryville decided not to take action on this matter until the Hunter Interests study is completed.

Commissioner McDonald stated that the schools were even more overcrowded this year than they were last year. He reminded the Commission that they made the motion in June that the schools would be an issue for plats after August.

Commissioner McDonald made the motion to adopt the proposal made by staff, seconded by Commissioner Stucky.

Commissioner Kidd made the motion to table the motion until the September meeting to give the new School Board an opportunity to state their current position on this issue. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Tipton and received unanimous approval.

Possible action to recommend on proposed rezoning from S-Suburbanizing to C-Commercial for land described as Blount County Tax Map 56 parcel 114.01 at 1532 William Blount Drive and parcel 115.00 at 2238 Big Springs Road corner William Blount Drive.

The Planning Commission held public hearing on this item at the regular meeting on August 26, 2004. Commissioner Stucky made the motion to approve the rezoning for recommendation to the County Commission with the elimination of the access to William Blount Drive. Commissioner Tipton seconded the motion.

Commissioner Gray stated that he had received calls regarding commercial rezonings until the zoning is in place restricting adult oriented businesses. Commissioner Gray made the motion to defer until the zoning is in place to restrict adult oriented establishments. Commissioner Kidd seconded the motion. The motion to defer received unanimous approval.

Consideration of legality of zoning regulations Section 6.2 that allows expansion of non-conforming uses onto new property.

This item was deferred from the last two meetings, with referral to Norman Newton for review and opinion. Given the analysis of Mr. Newton, staff recommended amending the zoning regulations to delete Section 6.2 in its entirety. Commissioner McDonald made the motion delete Section 6.2 in its entirety as recommended by staff. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Gray and received unanimous approval. The recommendation will now be forwarded to the County Commission for public hearing and consideration for action.

Request of the Public Services Committee for consideration of measures to delete the 60 day time limit for BZA decisions on special exceptions, and either (1) place a moratorium on commercial special exceptions along Hwy 411 and Hwy 321 in the county until the Hunter Interests growth strategy plan is done, or (2) delete commercial special exception provisions from the zoning regulations for Hwy 411 and Hwy 321 until the Hunter Interests growth strategy plan is done.

The Planning Commission chose to take no action on this request.

Discussion on possibility of adding zoning requirements for fencing around swimming pools.

This item was referred to the committee that is currently studying Building Codes for Blount County.

HEARINGS

Concept Plans:

Howell Concept:

The Howell Concept Plan off Whites Mill Road illustrates 42 lots on a 15.7 acre tract with public utility sewer to be provided by a stand alone processing system. The operations of the stand alone processing system were explained to the Commission by Scott Williams, engineer for IRM Utility, Inc.

The property is now zoned S-Suburbanizing which would allow up to 6.2 units per acre for development and is intended for moderate to high density development. The proposal is for an average of 2.7 units per acre, well within the requirements for the zone. However, the property is also in the Rural Area delineated for the 1101 growth plan. Rural Area is to be reserved for low to moderate density development to be 1.5 units per acre or lower. There is an inconsistency between our present zoning for the area, and the 1101 growth plan. According to state statutes, we must conform our land use decisions to the 1101 growth plan, which may be interpreted to require a lower density than that proposed on the concept plan for Howell property. To be consistent with the 1101 growth plan, this should actually be zoned R-1. Mr. Lamb stated that the density is not appropriate for the 1101 growth plan.

Commissioner McDonald explained that the Planning Commission is bound by law to the 1101 growth plan. The state statute states that all decisions with regard to planning, etc. shall abide by the 1101 growth plan. Any changes to the 1101 growth plan would have to be appealed to the Coordinating Committee. Any governmental member can bring that plan up for reconsideration after three years.

Mr. John King, attorney for the developers suggested that there was no inconsistency in the growth plan and in the development of this property as proposed by the concept plan.

Discussion was held regarding the density that would be allowed and whether or not this would be considered to be medium or high density. The proposal is for an average of 2.7 units per acre that are within the density requirements for this zone. Because this property is in the Rural Area designated for the 1101 growth plan, it is reserved for low to moderate density. Staff defines low to moderate density to be 1.5 units per acre or lower. No action was taken on this concept plan.

Kirby Quarry Hollow Road Subdivision Concept:

This concept plan is for a proposed five lot subdivision off of Quarry Hollow Road. The plan shows five lots, with four lots exclusively off of a common driveway easement. There are two issues involved with the proposal. First is whether or not the plat is in fact a major plat of five lots. The second concerns the adequacy of Quarry Hollow Road. Mr. Kirby purchased the property as two lots, one lot that was pre-existing by deed and the other as the remainder of the previously undivided tract. Lot 1 was previously deeded as a separate lot without plat approval. If the Planning Commission accepts the deeded Lot 1 as previously existing, the proposal is a minor plat with 4 new lots being proposed. If the Planning Commission does not recognize Lot 1 as a pre-existing lot, then it would be considered a major plat of five lots. After discussion the Planning Commission determined that it would be considered a major plat and would therefore have to meet the requirements as such. No action was taken on this concept plan.

Site Plans: (moved ahead on the agenda):

Richard Blair at 3703 U S Highway 411 South:

Mr. Blair re-submitted the site plan from the August 26, 2004 meeting to gain approval for two driveway connections onto Highway 411 South. The Planning Commission only approved one driveway connection. The Planning Commission took no action on this request. Mr. Blair was not present at the meeting.

Addition to the Agenda:

Commissioner Kidd made the motion to add two additional site plans to the agenda. Commissioner Gray seconded the motion which received unanimous approval.

Jerry Tipton at 5903 Old Niles Ferry Road:

The site plan is for an addition of a 60' x 40' storage unit to an existing mini storage warehouse facility. The addition does meet all setback requirements and is an expansion of an existing use. Commissioner Kidd made the motion to approve the site plan, seconded by Commissioner Melton. The site plan received unanimous approval.

Jerry Tipton at 6504 Howard School Road:

The site plan is for an expansion to a multi-family development. It is for the addition of two units. The property has over ten acres and has a density of 15 units. The addition of the two units brings the total number to 8 units. Staff

recommended for approval of the site plan. Commissioner McDonald made the motion to approve the site plan, seconded by Commissioner Kidd. The site plan received unanimous approval.

Preliminary Plats – Major Subdivisions:

Calderwood Subdivision:

Calderwood Subdivision off Calderwood Highway is a proposed subdivision of 6 large tracts served by a private road easement and common driveway easement. Planning, Engineering, and Environmental Health Department staff recommended for revised preliminary plat approval subject to:

- Two inches of typical base stone application on all prepared roadway and common driveway surfaces. Shale is subject to being pulverized rapidly and two inches of shale may be fine at a later date or incorporated with a stone mix later.
- All erosion control measures must be in place prior to commencing any road construction. Supply copy of SWPPP permit to staff prior to pre-construction meeting with staff. All drainage and erosion control measures must be certified as being built in accordance with the project engineering plans and specifications prior to final plat submittal. Any applicable permits for clearing activities to be supplied prior to any on site construction.
- Any construction or road activity prior to a pre-construction conference on-site with the developer and all contractors are at the risk of the developer.
- Copy of permit or letter from TDOT. This access off of Calderwood Highway must be paved two lanes wide and 30 feet deep with adequate turning area.
- A Property Owner's Association for all common elements including all road easements shown on the plat prior to final plat submittal and a common driveway maintenance agreement.
- Payment of platting fee prior to final plat.

The School Department did express concern regarding all three schools being over capacity located within the district of this subdivision.

Commissioner McClellan made the motion to approve the preliminary plat as recommended by staff. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Kidd. The preliminary plat was approved with Commissioners Gray and McDonald voting no.

Tract 4R of the Dixon Estate:

The division of Tract 4R of the Dixon Estate is a proposed 3 lot subdivision served by a 25' common driveway easement. Planning, Engineering, and

Environmental Health Department staff recommended for preliminary plat approval subject to:

- A high intensity soil map must be supplied to the Environmental Health Department prior to final plat submittal as preliminary soils may require lot lines to be modified.
- All erosion control must be in place prior to any on-site construction. A pre-construction conference with the developer, all contractors and county staff is required prior to any construction. Any construction prior to a pre-construction conference on-site with the developer and all contractors will be at the risk of the developer. Any applicable SWPPP permits shall be supplied to staff.
- A Maintenance Agreement to be supplied prior to final plat for the maintenance of the common driveway.
- Payment of platting fee prior to final plat.

The school department did express concern regarding all three schools being over capacity located within the district of this subdivision.

Commissioner Tipton made the motion to approve the preliminary plat as recommended by staff, seconded by Commissioner Kidd. The preliminary plat was approved with Commissioner McDonald voting no.

Final Plats: Major Subdivisions:

Carriage Crossing:

Carriage Crossing off Disco Loop Road and Frogpond Road is a proposed 10 lot subdivision along existing county roads. Several of the lots will have restricted driveway locations and there will be one shared driveway. The Blount County Highway Superintendent noted that all road improvements required by the Highway Department had been completed. Planning, Engineering, and Environmental Health Department staff recommended for final plat approval subject to:

- Signature plats, including the Environmental Health Department's notes and restrictions. All signatures by the water and electric utility that both utilities have been completed or a surety posted for their completion.
- Driveway restrictions and tile note to be added to final plat.
- Payment of the \$400.00 platting fee.

Commissioner Stucky made the motion to approve the final plat as recommended by staff, seconded by Commissioner Kidd. The final plat was approved with Commissioner McDonald voting no.

Preliminary and Final Plats – Major Subdivisions:

McClanahan Property:

The McClanahan Property off River Ford Road and Pea Ridge Road is a proposed 8 lot subdivision with a remainder greater than five acres along existing county roads. Three lots will have restricted driveway locations. Planning, Engineering, and Environmental Health Department staff recommended for preliminary and final plat approval subject to:

- Final lot line delineation by the Environmental Health Department and any necessary lot restrictions noted on final plat.
- For safety purposes, lots 3, 4, and 5 shall have designated driveway locations noted on the final plat. Additionally, a note shall be added to the final plat for driveway tiles and to contact the Highway Department prior to installing any driveway tiles.
- Signature plats including utilities.
- Payment of the \$320.00 platting fee.

The school department did express concern regarding two of the three schools being over capacity located within the district of this subdivision.

Commissioner Tipton made the motion to approve the preliminary and final plat as recommended by staff. Commissioner Kidd seconded the motion. A roll call vote was taken:

The preliminary and final plat was approved with 5 yes votes and 3 no votes.

Preliminary and Final Plats – Minor Subdivisions:

Chessingham Subdivision, Lot 24:

The re-subdivision of Lot 24 of Chessingham Subdivision contains two lots and a remainder greater than five acres. Planning and Engineering staff recommended for preliminary and final plat approval subject to:

- Signature plats.
- Payment of the \$60.00 platting fee.
- Addendum to the Property Owner’s Association.

Commissioner Kidd made the motion to approve the preliminary and final plat as recommended by staff, seconded by Commissioner McClellan. The motion received unanimous approval.

Re-plat of the Pack Property:

The re-plat of the Pack Property off Cedar Creek Road is a proposed 4 lot subdivision with 2 lots having road frontage and 2 lots served by a 25' easement. Planning and Engineering staff recommended for preliminary and final plat approval subject to:

- Signature plats.
- Maintenance agreement for the common driveway.
- Payment of the \$80.00 platting fee.

Commissioner Stucky made the motion to approve the preliminary and final plat as recommended by staff. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Kidd. The preliminary and final plat received unanimous approval.

Miscellaneous Items:

Gray Meadow Subdivision:

Gray Meadow Subdivision off Sevierville Road was approved at the July 2004 regular meeting as Gregory Place Subdivision. The new owner is requesting the subdivision name and road be changed as shown on the proposed plats. Planning Department staff recommended for final approval of the revised plat with name changes and POA documentation.

Commissioner Kidd made the motion to approve the plat as recommended by staff, seconded by Commissioner Stucky. The motion received unanimous approval.

Letter from Marble Hill Property Owners Association:

The Property Owners Association responded to the action of the Planning Commissions approval of Marble Hill Phase 4. The preliminary plat was approved according to the Subdivision Regulations. The approval was subject to use of the existing private road being used as a public road. The letter from the Property Owners Association stated that they do not want the road dedicated to public road use. The course of action now lies between the Property Owners Association and the developer.

Addition to the Agenda:

Commissioner Melton made the motion to allow Mr. Marty Durand three minutes to address the Commission regarding the adequate facilities tax. Commissioner Gray seconded the motion which was approved unanimously.

Mr. Durand, a teacher at William Blount High School, addressed the Commission regarding the need for an adequate facilities tax. He stated that he was not in favor of the Board of Education saying that you could not approve houses being built because the schools are overcrowded. He expressed that the adequate facilities tax relates to this in a different measure. He stated that the needs of our county schools, roads and law enforcement are not being met by taxes paid and revenues received by all sources. An adequate facilities tax would increase the rate our government is able to catch up with the demands of the public.

Continuation of Long Range Planning:

Discussion on alternatives to address adequacy of infrastructure and roads in the Subdivision Regulations.

This item was deferred and will be put at the first of the agenda for the October meeting.

Discussion of issues relating to development off of private gravel roads and common driveways.

This item was deferred.

Review of Technical Memoranda from Hunter Interests and discussion of growth strategy issues.

This item was deferred.

Discussion of change in state law on non-conforming uses and length of cessation of operation of commercial and industrial businesses.

This item was deferred.

Staff reports.

Staff requested that the Planning Commission call a special meeting for October 11, as part of a joint meeting with the County Commission and the Maryville City Council and Maryville Planning Commission. The meeting will be held at 7:00 P.M., Maryville College Fine Arts Music Auditorium. The subject will be the growth strategy.

Commissioner McDonald made the motion to call the special meeting, seconded by Commissioner Gray. The motion received unanimous approval.

Adjournment.
