49-50-104. County agricultural extension committee. —

(a) All counties cooperating with the University of Tennessee extension by making an appropriation for extension work shall elect an agricultural extension committee composed of seven (7) members. The committee shall be elected by the county legislative body.

(b) Three (3) of such members shall be elected from the membership of the county legislative body. There shall be elected to the committee four (4) members who are not members of the county legislative body. Two (2) shall be farmers and two (2) shall be farm women, residing in different civil districts.

(c) The members shall be elected for terms of two (2) years, except that if there are fewer than four (4) civil districts in a county at least one (1) member shall come from each civil district. Two (2) of the members representing the county legislative body, one (1) farmer and one (1) farm woman, shall be elected in even-numbered years; the other members shall be elected in odd-numbered years. The elections shall be held at the first meeting of the county legislative body of each calendar year. No member may be elected for more than three (3) successive terms. In the event that there is a vacancy on the committee, the county legislative body shall fill such vacancy at its next regular meeting after the vacancy occurs, and the committee member filling the vacancy shall serve during the unexpired term of the member's predecessor.

(d) The functions of the committee shall be to:

(1) Act with duly authorized representatives of the University of Tennessee extension in the employment and/or removal of personnel receiving funds from county extension appropriations;

(2) Act with duly authorized representatives of the state agricultural extension service in formulating the county extension budget, and serve as liaison between the extension service and the county legislative body on financial and other matters relating to the work;

(3) Act in an advisory capacity on county extension program formulation; and

(4) Act in an advisory capacity on activities performed in connection with carrying out the program.

(e) In performing the foregoing functions, the committee shall meet with duly authorized representatives of the University of Tennessee extension on selected dates mutually agreed to by the chair of the committee and the representatives of the University of Tennessee extension during the months of February, May, August and November, and at such other times as may be deemed desirable by a majority of the members of the committee.





(a) The county legislative body may, at its January term each year, appoint three (3) householders or freeholders, residents of the county, of lawful age, to act as jail inspectors for the ensuing year, or the court may appoint inspectors at any other time to act for a shorter period.

(b) The county mayor shall be an ex officio inspector of the jail in each county.

(c) It is the duty of the inspectors appointed to:

(1) Visit and examine the county jail at least once each month;

(2) Make rules and regulations for the preservation of the health and decorum of the prisoners;

(3) Decide all disputes between the jailer and the prisoners;

(4) Provide for the restraint, by ironing or segregation of prisoners who offer violence to fellow prisoners or to the jailer or the jailer's assistants, or for attempting to break jail; and

(5) Make a report, at each meeting of the county legislative body, of the state and condition of the prisoners and the jail.

A RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING A WATER QUALITY BUFFER AND RELATED REGULATION OF STREAMS, RIVERS, WETLANDS, PONDS AND LAKES IN BLOUNT COUNTY.

WHEREAS; the streams and rivers of Blount County supply much of the water required by citizens for drinking and other municipal and industrial uses, and

WHEREAS; the people of Blount County use surface waters for fishing, canoeing and other recreational and economic purposes, and

WHEREAS; the streams and rivers of Blount County are vital to the environmental health of the community and to wildlife and aquatic life that reside in or near said streams; and

WHEREAS; the Blount County Commission finds that the protection of streams and rivers in Blount County is vital to the health, safety, environmental, and economic welfare of its citizens and the community at-large, and

WHEREAS; it is the intent of this Resolution to establish a new WATER QUALITY BUFFER of restricted development and limited land use adjacent to all community waters in the unincorporated areas of Blount County, and

WHEREAS; new development and re-development adjacent to community waters shall include such buffers in their proposed plans, and

WHEREAS; the purposes of the WATER QUALITY BUFFERS are to:

- a. Protect public and private water supplies,
- b. Minimize thermal stream pollution by adding or preserving stream canopy,
- c. Trap sediment, nutrients and other pollutants in surface run-off,
- d. Promote bank stabilization,
- e. Protect wetlands,
- f. Minimize the impact of floods,
- g. Reduce stormwater runoff velocities,
- h. Protect channel bank area from erosion and scour,
- i. Protect wildlife habitat, and
- j. Generally maintain water quality.

WHEREAS; Blount County has applied for, obtained, and shall comply with the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Phase II permit for discharges of stormwater runoff into the waters of the State of Tennessee; and

WHEREAS; Under the authority of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act of 1977 (known as the Clean Water Act), the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is specifically required to develop and oversee the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit program which requires all communities operating a small municipal separate storm sewer system (MS4) to regulate the discharge of pollutants to the waters of the state. Under the authority of the Tennessee Water Quality Control Act of 1977 the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation (TDEC) has interpreted that this mandate includes the regulation of water quality buffers. The permit requires that Blount County “develop and implement a set of requirements to establish, protect and maintain water quality buffers in areas of new development and redevelopment.” In the permit, water quality buffers are defined as “undisturbed vegetation including trees, shrubs, and herbaceous vegetation; enhanced or restored vegetation; or the re-establishment of vegetation bordering streams, ponds, wetlands, reservoirs, or lakes, which exists or is established to protect those water bodies.”

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMISSION OF BLOUNT COUNTY, TENNESSEE, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1 DEFINITIONS

As used in this Document, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise, the following definitions apply:

- a. “Blount County” represents any permitting agency within the county government including but not limited to the following: Stormwater, Building Codes, Planning, Environmental Health, and Zoning.
- b. “Community Waters” include streams, rivers, wetlands, ponds and lakes as defined in this resolution.
- c. “Development” includes any of the following activities:
 1. The improvement of one lot or two or more contiguous lots, tracts or parcels of land for any purpose involving:
 - a. One or more residential or nonresidential buildings, or a single nonresidential building on a lot or lots regardless of the number of occupants or tenure; or,
 - b. The division or allocation of land or space, between or among two or more existing or prospective occupants by means of, or for the purposes of streets, common areas, leaseholds, condominiums, building groups or other features.
 2. A subdivision of land.
 3. The process of grading, clearing, filling, quarrying, construction, or reconstruction to improved or unimproved real estate or other similar activities.
- d. “Existing Land Use” means a land use which, prior to the effective date of this resolution, is either:
 1. Completed; or
 2. Ongoing, as in the case of agricultural activity; or
 3. Under construction; or
 4. Fully approved by the governing authority.
- e. “Floodplain” means any land area susceptible to being inundated by water from any source.
- f. “Impervious Surfaces” shall mean those areas that prevent or impede the infiltration of stormwater into the soil as it entered in natural conditions prior to development. Common impervious areas include, but are not limited to, rooftops, sidewalks, walkways, streets, patio areas, driveways, parking lots, storage areas, compacted gravel and soil surfaces, awnings and other fabric or plastic coverings.
- g. “Land-disturbing Activity” shall mean any activity on private or public land that may result in soil erosion and the movement of sediments. Land disturbing activities include, but are not limited to, development, re-development, demolition, construction, reconstruction, clearing, grading, filling, logging and/or tree chipping operations, haul roads associated with the development, and excavation, etc.

- h. “Native Vegetation” are indigenous plants to East Tennessee or the southeastern United States.
- i. “Pond or Lake” are defined as inland bodies of standing water. Water quality buffers are required for ponds and lakes that are directly connected to a stream. The following criteria must be met:
 - 1. A stream or river must have a direct discharge into the pond or lake; or,
 - 2. The pond or lake discharges directly into a stream, wetland, or river.
- j. “Redevelopment” See “development”
- k. “Stream” or “River” means the following:
 - 1. A linear surface water conveyance that can be characterized as having either perennial or ephemeral base flow and
 - 2. Has a defined floodplain that has been computed as part of a Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA); or
 - 3. Are identified as a blue line on a 7.5-minute USGS quadrangle, unless otherwise designated by Tennessee Department of Environmental Conservation (TDEC); or
 - 4. Are determined to be streams by Blount County, the United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) or TDEC.
- l. “Top of Bank” the uppermost limit of an active stream channel, usually marked by a break in slope.
- m. “Water Quality Buffer” or “WQB” is a defined area that encompasses all land within the areas as described in Section 3. The water quality buffer is intended to mean undisturbed vegetation including trees, shrubs, and herbaceous vegetation; enhanced or restored vegetation; or the re-establishment of vegetation bordering streams, ponds, rivers, wetlands, reservoirs, or lakes, which exists or is established to protect those water bodies.
- n. “Wetlands” shall mean an area that is inundated or saturated by surface water or groundwater at a frequency and duration sufficient to support, and that under normal circumstances does support, a prevalence of vegetation typically adapted for life in saturated soil conditions. Wetlands generally include swamps, marshes, bogs, and similar areas. Wetland determination shall be made by the Army Corps of Engineers and/or Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation (TDEC), or a qualified professional that has been trained in the identification and delineation of wetland areas.

Section 2 APPLICABILITY

The water quality buffer shall apply to all non-residential new developments, modifications to existing developments, and/or redevelopments of any size, or any residential development or redevelopment that will result in a land-disturbing activity that is equal to or greater than one (1) acre and shall establish, protect and maintain water quality buffers along all streams, rivers, lakes, ponds and wetlands that are located in, or portions of which are located in, the

unincorporated areas of Blount County as set forth in this resolution. Any property or portion thereof that lies within the water quality buffer is subject to the requirements for the water quality buffer stated in this resolution.

Section 3 STANDARDS FOR BUFFER WIDTHS

Except as otherwise provided in this resolution, the water quality buffer must be maintained in a vegetated state as defined below. Any property or portion thereof that lies within the WQB is subject to the restrictions of the WQB. The water quality buffer width shall be calculated as follows:

- a. A water quality buffer having a minimum width of sixty (60) feet shall be provided along each side of a stream or river, as measured perpendicular from the top-of-bank of the active channel. For those streams or rivers that do not have a defined top-of-bank, the buffer shall be measured perpendicular from the centerline of the stream or river. The WQB shall be divided into two zones:
 1. Inner Zone: The inner zone of the water quality buffer shall have a minimum width of thirty (30) feet, measured perpendicular from the top-of-bank of the active channel and extending landward or by the centerline of a stream or river (where applicable).
 2. Outer Zone: The outer zone of the water quality buffer shall be measured from the edge of the inner zone and shall extend the perpendicular distance required to obtain a total minimum buffer width of sixty (60) feet, when combined with the width in the inner zone.
- b. For ponds and lakes that are directly connected to community waters, a minimum buffer of thirty (30) feet shall be provided around the perimeter of ponds and lakes. The buffers shall be measured perpendicular from the topographic contour that defines the normal pool elevation.
 1. Water quality buffers shall not be required around the perimeter of hydraulically disconnected ponds and lakes or ponds that are designed and constructed for the purposes of stormwater quality treatment.
 2. The minimum vegetative target for water quality buffers on ponds and lakes is mowed dense grass that covers the entire buffer area.
- c. A minimum buffer width of thirty (30)-feet shall be provided around the perimeter of a wetland, as measured from the outermost edge of the wetland.
 1. Water quality buffers are not required for wetlands designed and constructed for the purposes of stormwater quality treatment.

2. The minimum vegetative target for water quality buffers around wetlands is undisturbed, mature, moderately dense forest (i.e., trees) with woody shrubs and understory vegetation.
- d. Where steep slopes of 15% or greater are located within fifty (50) feet of the water body, one of the following conditions shall apply:
1. The water quality buffer width in the steep slope area shall be adjusted to include an additional twenty (20) feet, giving a total buffer width of eighty (80) feet. The additional twenty (20) feet shall follow the outer zone criteria.
 2. The water quality buffer in the steep slope area shall have a minimum width of sixty (60) feet and follow the inner zone criteria.

Section 4 STANDARDS FOR BUFFER VEGETATION

The vegetative goal is a use-restricted, vegetated buffer that is located along the perimeter of a community water within Blount County, containing natural vegetation and grasses, enhanced or restored that is native in origin.

- a. The Inner Zone and wetland vegetative targets are native mature, moderately dense forest with woody shrubs and under story vegetation.
- b. The Outer Zone vegetative targets are a minimum of mowed dense grass that covers the entire zone.
- c. The minimum pond or lake buffer vegetative targets shall be the same as the Outer Zone.
- d. If a water body does not have an established water quality buffer, then a water quality buffer enhancement plan shall be required. Such a planting plan shall be submitted to the Blount County Stormwater Department for approval and comply with the following:
 1. All planting plans shall be drawn to scale and may be part of a larger landscaping plan.
 2. The planting plan shall be a part of the required site plan review submittals.
 3. The planting plan shall include a “plant schedule” which lists the number and common and botanical name(s) of all existing and proposed plantings. The “plant schedule” shall also list the height, spread, and where applicable, the caliper of all new plantings at the time of planting.
 4. The landscaping plan must be designed by a licensed landscape architect.
- e. Establishment of a vegetated WQB must adhere to the following conditions and be shown on the buffer enhancement plan:

1. Stream banks must be planted with native vegetation that represents both woody (trees and shrubs) and herbaceous species as determined by a landscape architect. Density shall depend on the re-vegetation technique to be used and existing site conditions;
2. No trees shall be planted in a utility easement;
3. No single species may comprise more than one third (1/3) of the total planted trees or shrubs;
4. Seedlings/trees must be guaranteed at a seventy-five percent (75%) survivorship; and
5. Non-native species must be removed and managed.

Section 5 ACTIVITIES WITHIN THE WATER QUALITY BUFFER

The water quality buffer shall be established, managed and maintained to protect the physical and ecological integrity of community waters, to reduce flooding potential, provide tree canopy and to filter runoff from developed areas. Management of the WQB includes specific limitations on alteration of the natural conditions.

- a. The following activities are prohibited within the Water Quality Buffer:
 1. The storage of pesticides, herbicides, and fertilizers,
 2. The use or application of fertilizers,
 3. Parking lots,
 4. New structures,
 5. Vehicle storage and vehicle maintenance,
 6. Waste storage,
 7. Other manmade impervious areas,
 8. Septic tanks and septic drain fields, except as otherwise provided herein,
 9. Buildings, accessories, structures and all types of impervious surfaces,
 10. Hazardous or sanitary waste landfills,
 11. Receiving areas for toxic or hazardous waste or other contaminants,
 12. Mining (unless exempt by State law),
 13. Dumpster storage,
 14. Grease bin storage,
 15. Animal lots or kennels, and
 16. Other uses known to contribute pollutants to waterways.

- b. The following activities may be allowed on a restricted basis within the Inner Zone of the Water Quality Buffer with prior approval by the Blount County Stormwater Department:
 1. Septic tanks and septic drain fields in an approved location by the Blount County Environmental Health Department.
 2. Individual trees within the WQB may be removed if in danger of falling, causing damage to dwellings or other structures, causing blockage of the stream, standing in the path of an approved water, sanitary sewer, storm main; and/or the roots of a tree are penetrating or in danger of penetrating a sewer, water or storm drainage line at a

- joint or pipe connection. The root wad or stump should be left in place, where feasible, to maintain soil stability.
3. Infrastructure such as roads, bridges, storm drainage, stormwater management facilities that are appropriate for use in a riparian zone (i.e., wetlands, buffers), and utilities provided that they adhere to the following standards:
 - i: The width should be the minimum width needed to allow for maintenance access and installation;
 - ii: WQB crossings shall be at an angle that minimizes clearing requirements;
 - iii: The minimum number of WQB crossings should be used within each development, with no more than one crossing every one-thousand (1000) linear feet. The Stormwater Department may approve additional crossing if justified by traffic, safety, or access issues.
 4. Paths and greenway trails, provided the design and location are approved by Blount County.
 5. Access areas for utilities that are located in the water quality buffer shall be allowed. Access areas must be minimized to the maximum extent practicable and shall be located at intervals no less than four-hundred (400) feet unless warranted by valid safety, access, or service issues.
 6. Removal of forest vegetation that has the potential to impact traffic safety or limit access to areas immediately surrounding the approved stream or utility crossing. The area shall be vegetated with a minimum of dense grass.
 7. Bank stabilization / restoration / habitat alteration projects.
 8. Disturbances as required to establish and/or restore buffer areas in accordance to an approved buffer enhancement plan.
 9. The pruning of native vegetation is allowed provided that the health and function of the vegetation is not compromised. However, only the individual removal of understory nuisance non-native vegetation (i.e. honeysuckle, kudzu, privet) causing minimal soil disturbance is permitted. On land where the removal of such nuisance vegetation would cause a reduction in the amount of stream canopy by 50% or more, re-vegetation with native plants is required to provide 50% of the previous canopy at a minimum. For areas where such nuisance vegetation removal would cause a reduction in the amount of stream bank vegetation, re-vegetation with native plants is required to meet the previous density of coverage.
 10. Other uses permitted and approved by TDEC, or under Section 404 of the Federal Clean Water Act, or by the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA).
 11. Education / scientific research that do not require any prohibited activities identified in this section.
 12. Land uses that involve agriculture production and management consistent with all state and federal laws and all regulations promulgated by the Tennessee Department of Agriculture.
- c. The following activities are allowed within the Outer Zone of the Water Quality Buffer.
1. All activities that are allowed within the Inner Zone.
 2. Land disturbance and grading, but must be re-vegetated according to Section 4.

3. Clearing, grubbing, grading and re-vegetation, performed in accordance with an approved grading plan.
4. Disturbances necessary for the construction of utility access areas and approved stream crossings.
5. Ongoing vegetative maintenance activities such as mowing, bush-hogging, and weed-eating. No chemical application is allowed in the outer zone.
6. Storm water retention and detention facilities that meet the approval of Blount County.

Section 6 PROTECTION OF WATER QUALITY BUFFER

All water quality buffers must be protected during construction / development activities.

Prior to the initiation of land disturbing activities, construction layout surveys must include: staking and labeling of the water quality buffer perimeter. A combination of stakes, flagging and/or silt fence may be used to ensure adequate visibility of the WQB. The layout must be inspected and approved by the Stormwater Department before grading begins.

All areas of the water quality buffer, including stream banks, must be left in a stabilized condition upon completion of construction activities. No actively eroding bare or unstable stream banks shall remain, unless approved by the Director of the Stormwater Department or his designee. Placement of riprap and other hard armor is allowed only when bioengineering alternatives are not feasible.

Water quality buffers cannot be encroached upon or disturbed during project construction, unless they are being established, restored, or enhanced in accordance with an approved buffer enhancement plan.

Once construction has ceased on a project, water quality buffers must still be maintained in accordance with the recorded Covenants for Maintenance of Stormwater Facilities and Best Management Practices. The covenants shall require that maintenance of the water quality buffer be the responsibility of the property owner. In order to provide for long-term protection and maintenance, Blount County shall require that the water quality buffer be protected in perpetuity by placing the buffer in a permanent water quality or other easement that is recorded with the property's deed or plat. If the area is not publicly owned, the easement should be held by one of the following non-governmental entities:

- a. A viable third party such as a land trust, land management company or utility. The purpose of the third party is to provide monitoring and oversight to ensure the perpetual protection of the area in accordance with the requirements of a buffer area. The organization shall:
 1. Have the legal authority to accept and maintain such easements;
 2. Be bona fide and in perpetual existence; and
 3. Have conveyance instruments that contain an appropriate provision for re-transfer in the event the organization becomes unable to carry-out its functions.

- b. A property owners association (POA) provided that the following criteria are met:
 - 1. Membership in the POA is mandatory and automatic for all property owners and their successors;
 - 2. The POA shall have continuing lien authority to ensure the collection of dues from all members; and
 - 3. The POA assumes the responsibility for protecting, monitoring and maintaining the area as a conservation easement, in perpetuity.
- c. If neither of the above-stated non-governmental entities is able to provide perpetual protection of the buffer area, then the property owner must assume responsibility for the maintenance and protection for the buffer area.

Section 7 WATER QUALITY BUFFER ENHANCEMENTS

The property owner may restore or enhance vegetation within a water quality buffer with prior approval of a Buffer Enhancement Plan by the Director of the Stormwater Department or his designee.

The Director of the Stormwater Department or his designee shall have the authority to require a property owner to restore or enhance water quality buffers that have been disturbed or do not meet, or have the potential to not meet through natural vegetative succession, the vegetative targets for buffer areas that are defined herein.

Enhancement of water quality buffers must be performed in accordance with the requirements of Section 4 and the guidance provided below.

- 1. All areas/zones of the buffer being enhanced must be planted with vegetation that is appropriate to achieve the vegetative targets stated in Section 4.
- 2. All areas/zones of the buffer being enhanced must be stabilized against erosion.
- 3. If the outer zone of a stream buffer or the buffer around a pond or a lake will consist largely of grasses after enhancement, seeding must be performed at a rate sufficient to provide healthy, dense, permanent vegetative cover for 100% of the buffer area within one growing season. Mulch, pebbles, wood chips and other non-vegetative ground cover is not acceptable for buffer enhancement.
- 4. Where the removal of such vegetation would cause a reduction in the amount of stream canopy by 50% or more, re-vegetation with native plants is required to provide the cover of the previous canopy at a minimum. For areas where such vegetation removal would cause a reduction in the amount of stream bank vegetation, re-vegetation specifications with native plants is required to return the amount of vegetative cover to its previous state, at a minimum. To reduce the potential for stream bank erosion, re-vegetation measures along stream banks must include sufficient erosion control measures, such as turf reinforcement mats, erosion control blankets, straw wattles, etc., to stabilize the area in the short- and long-term.

5. To increase the chances for the success and health of the buffer area, the plant species, density, placement, and diversity proposed in the Buffer Enhancement Plans must be appropriate for stream, wetland, and pond/lake buffers to achieve the vegetative target that is defined for the buffer through natural succession. Proposed planting and long-term maintenance practices must also be appropriate and properly performed.
6. Vegetation mortality must be accounted for all planting densities that are proposed in buffer enhancement plans.

Section 8 SITE PLANS AND PLATS PREPARED FOR RECORDING

Unless otherwise provided herein, all site development plans and plats shall:

- a. Show the extent of any WQB on the subject property by metes and bounds or defined distance from metes and bounds referent and be labeled as “Water Quality Buffer”.
- b. Provide a note with reference to the WQB stating that there shall be no clearing, grading, construction or disturbance of vegetation except as permitted by Blount County.
- c. Visible permanent boundary markers approved by Blount County shall be required to be installed prior to the recording of the final plat or the issuance of a Certificate of Occupancy. The boundary markers should be installed in a visible area located near the property lines and every one hundred (100) linear feet for parcels with buffers exceeding two hundred (200) linear feet for a single parcel of land.

Section 9 VARIANCES - WATER QUALITY BUFFER AVERAGING

A variance may be granted in the form of a reduction in the Water Quality Buffer width over a portion of property in exchange for an increase in buffer width elsewhere on the same property such that the average WQB width remains sixty (60) feet. A property owner may request a variance from the requirements of the WQB by submitting a letter to the Blount County Stormwater Department justifying the purpose for the variance and the width of variance requested. The variance may be granted provided the following conditions are met:

- a. The width of the averaged buffer within the boundaries of the property to be developed shall not be less than sixty (60) feet; and
- b. The width of the buffer shall not be less than thirty (30) feet at any location (sixty (60) feet for steep slope areas), except where stream crossings have been approved by Blount County.
- c. Those areas of the water quality buffer having a minimum width of thirty (30) feet (or less at the stream crossing) can comprise no more than fifty (50) percent of the buffer length.

- d. Buffer averaging is required for WQB that have stream crossings.
- e. Buffer averaging is prohibited for any portion of the developments that have or have planned land use as described:
 - 1. Areas that have slopes greater than 15% that are located within fifty (50) feet of the stream to be buffered;
 - 2. Developments or facilities that include on-site sewage disposal and treatment system drainfields (i.e., septic systems), raised septic systems, subsurface discharges from a wastewater treatment plant, or land application of biosolids or animal waste;
 - 3. Landfills (demolition landfills, permitted landfills, close-in-place landfills);
 - 4. Junkyards;
 - 5. Commercial or industrial facilities that store and/or service motor vehicles;
 - 6. Commercial greenhouses or landscape supply facilities;
 - 7. Developments or facilities that have commercial or public pools;
 - 8. Agricultural facilities, farms, feedlots, and confined animal feed operations; and
 - 9. Animal care facilities, kennels, and commercial/business developments or facilities that provide short-term or long-term care of animals;
 - 10. Other land uses deemed by the Stormwater Department to have the potential to generate higher than normal pollutant loadings.

Section 10 NON-COMPLIANCE

Whenever the County Stormwater Director or his designee determines that a violation of any provision of this resolution has occurred, or that work does not have a required plan or permit, or that work does not comply with an approved plan or permit, the County Stormwater Director or his designee shall issue a Notice of Non-Compliance to the property owner, utility, facility operator, lessee, contractor, permittee and/or the equipment operator doing work on the site. The Notice of Non-Compliance shall:

- a) Be in writing.
- b) Include a description of the property sufficient for identification of where violation has occurred.
- c) List the violation.
- d) State the action required.
- e) Provide a deadline for compliance or to stop work.

Section 11 CIVIL PENALTIES

a. Civil Penalty:

Any person or entity violating the provisions of this resolution may be assessed a civil penalty by the County of not less than fifty dollars (\$50.00) or more than five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) per day for each day of violation. Each day of violation shall constitute a separate violation.

b. In assessing a civil penalty, the County may consider:

- 1) The harm done to the public health or the environment.
- 2) Whether the civil penalty imposed will be a substantial economic deterrent to the illegal activity.
- 3) The economic benefit gained by the violator.
- 4) The amount of effort put forth by the violator to remedy this violation.
- 5) Any unusual or extraordinary enforcement costs incurred by the County.
- 6) The amount of penalty established by resolution for specific categories of violations.
- 7) Any equities of the situation that outweigh the benefit of imposing any penalty of damage assessment.

c. In addition to the civil penalty in subsection (2) above, the County may recover all damages proximately caused by the violator to the County, which may include any reasonable expenses incurred in investigating and enforcing violations of this document.

d. The County may bring legal action to enjoin the continuing violation of this resolution, and the existence of any other remedy, at law or in equity, shall be no defense to any such actions.

e. The remedies set forth in this section shall be cumulative, not exclusive, and it shall not be a defense to any action, civil or criminal that one (1) or more of the remedies set forth herein has been sought or granted.

f. If a violation of the provisions contained herein occurs during the construction period, all work on the site may be halted by a Stop Work Order until the Director deems corrections are sufficient.

Section 12 PERFORMANCE BONDS

- a. Prior to plat approval, a performance bond which guarantees satisfactory completion of new development or redevelopment projects may be required for work related to the water quality buffer until project approval by Blount County.
- b. Performance bonds shall name Blount County as beneficiary and shall be guaranteed in the form of a surety bond, cashier's check, or letter of credit from an approved financial institution or insurance carrier. The surety bond, cashier's check, or letter of credit shall

be provided in a form in an amount to be determined by Blount County. The actual amount shall be based on submission of plans and estimated construction, installation or potential maintenance and/or remediation expenses.

- c. The Director of the Stormwater Department may refuse brokers or financial institutions the right to provide a surety bond, letter of credit, or cashier’s check based on past performance, ratings of the financial institution, or other appropriate sources of reference information.
- d. A performance bond is not required for an individual residential lot, except when deemed necessary by the Director based on site conditions and the adverse impact on downstream conditions or other properties.

Section 13 REPEAL CLAUSE

The provisions of any ordinances or resolutions or parts thereof in conflict herewith shall not apply, except for ordinances or resolutions or parts thereof which provide stricter standards from those provided herein.

Section 14 CONFLICTS WITH STATE REQUIREMENTS

The State of Tennessee may require water quality buffers during construction activities via provisions contained in the Tennessee Construction General Permit (CGP) or other regulatory permits and processes. The State’s requirements may, or may not, align with Blount County’s requirements and policies for water quality buffers. It is the responsibility of the site owner/developer to be informed and educated on any State-level buffer requirements. If a site owner/developer intends to apply Blount County’s buffer requirements in lieu of any requirements of the State of Tennessee, the owner/developer must first obtain approval from TDEC and provide Blount County with written documentation of such approval.

Section 15 EFFECTIVE DATE

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Blount County Board of Commissioners meeting in regular session on this the 17th day of January, 2008, that this resolution shall take effect on final passage, the public welfare requiring it.

Water Quality Buffer Resolution Summary

This is one of the regulatory requirements promulgated under Federal and State Phase II Stormwater regulations. The county is required to adopt a stream side buffer program by February 26, 2008. This resolution has been reviewed by the county attorney as well as by other county staff. The Cities of Alcoa and Maryville are presenting similar resolutions to their Councils for approval.

As supplement to the full-text resolution, a summary is provided below.

Water Quality Buffer Resolution

- **Water Quality Buffer:** is a defined area that is intended to mean undisturbed vegetation including trees, shrubs, and herbaceous vegetation; enhanced or restored vegetation; or the re-establishment of vegetation bordering streams, ponds, rivers, wetlands, reservoirs, or lakes, which exists or is established to protect those water bodies.
- The water quality buffer shall apply to all non-residential new developments, modifications to existing developments, and/or redevelopments of any size, or any residential development or redevelopment that will result in a land-disturbing activity that is equal to or greater than one (1) acre within the unincorporated areas of Blount County.
- Certain activities are prohibited while other activities are allowed on a restricted basis.
- Land uses that involve agriculture production and management are exempt.
- Requires a sixty (60) foot buffer along streams with a thirty (30) foot inner and thirty (30) foot outer zone measured perpendicular from the top of bank.
- The Inner Zone vegetative targets are native mature, moderately dense forest with woody shrubs and under story vegetation. The Outer Zone vegetative targets are a minimum of mowed dense grass that covers the entire zone.
- Requires a thirty (30) foot buffer around ponds and lakes that are directly connected to community waters.
- Requires a thirty (30) foot buffer around the perimeter of wetlands.
- Requires an additional twenty (20) feet when steep slopes of 15% or greater are located within fifty (50) feet of a water body.
- Variances may be granted by the Stormwater Department.
- Buffer zones protect the physical and ecological integrity of water bodies from surrounding upland activities.

SPONSORED BY COMMISSIONERS JOHN KEEBLE AND WENDY PITTS REEVES

A RESOLUTION CLASSIFYING THE ROADS OF BLOUNT COUNTY, TENNESSEE
ACCORDING TO TENNESSEE CODE ANNOTATED 54-10-103 et. seq.

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners of Blount County, Tennessee, is required to classify the public roads of Blount County, Tennessee, and to provide for a record of said classification of public roads of Blount county, Tennessee, in the office of the County Clerk for Blount County, Tennessee, in accordance with 54-10-103 et. seq. of Tennessee code Annotated.

WHEREAS, at the October, 1975, meeting of the Blount County Legislative Body, an Official List of County Roads was adopted and has periodically been amended since that time to reflect changes occasioned by the addition and deletion of certain roads on the List by action of the Blount County Legislative Body; and,

WHEREAS, the Official List of County Roads must be updated on a regular interval to include those new roads constructed to a standard approved by a local planning commission for addition to the Official List of County Roads; and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Commissioners of Blount County, Tennessee, in session assembled on this 17th day of January, 2008, that the County does hereby amend the list of public roads of Blount County, Tennessee to include the roads in the schedule attached to this resolution and entitled "**Blount County Highway Department, Official County Roads List for 2008**" and does declare that all of the roads described in said schedule are hereby declared to be public roads and subject to proper maintenance in accordance with their classification; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the County Clerk of Blount County, Tennessee, shall, in accordance with the appropriate section of

Tennessee Code Annotated, maintain a record book in his office of the public roads of Blount County, Tennessee, and the aforementioned roads as presented in the schedule attached to this resolution shall be included in such record book; and







Re: Rezoning at 2541 East Broadway. **Setting a public hearing for January.**

Back ground:

Public hearing needs to be set for the January 8, 2008 at 6:30pm in room 430 of the Blount County Courthouse.

1. Mr. and Mrs. Walker are requesting that their property located at 2541 East Broadway be rezoned to C-commercial from S-suburbanizing. The property is identified on tax map 37J, group G, and parcel 43.01.
2. This property sits behind "The Medicine Shop" and has recently been re-plated to combine parcels 43 and 43.01 into one unified parcel.
3. This property is in the area of mixed commercial and residential properties. The property along the back is residential, the property to the North is commercial and the property to the South is residential. There is an existing privacy fence along the abutting residential use properties.
4. This lot is currently vacant with only a storage container located on it.
5. In July a site plan was approved for parcel 43 (the front lot). The site plan was for the construction of a new building to house the existing uses, and that plan remains to stay the same. Some of the parking for that site plan was located on parcel 43.01 (the back lot). Since that time the lots have been combined and now they are requesting the newly added back portion (used to be parcel 43.01) rezoned to commercial.

Dr. Bell also reported he had talked to the construction foreman concerning the New Union Grove Schools and things are going very well. Commissioner Reeves stated she had a call about the light at the entrance to the Carpenters Athletic Fields that is too bright and is blinding drivers. Dr. Bell stated he would bring that up at his meeting. There was no action taken in this matter.

Financial Report

Troy Logan gave a Financial Report. He stated he had been looking at where they are today. Mr. Logan informed the Committee that the School Board had a work session meeting regarding their budget. He stated they had just started the budget process. He asked if the Commissioners would like to have a joint meeting with the School Board. They discussed the possibility of February 19, 2008. There was no action taken in this matter.

Mr. Logan reported, concerning this year's budget and the revenue side and the property taxes, they should have \$450,000.00 more than they had budgeted. He stated they received an increase in BEP current year funding as the result of a mid-year insurance adjustment. He stated concerning the sales tax revenues, for year-to-date through December, they were at a 4% growth over last year. Mr. Logan reported, concerning the expense side, some things that may go over budget would be fuel adjustments for transportation, water and sewer line problems, and maybe electricity. He reported the fund balance at the end of June, 2007, total was \$6,077,000.00. After explanation of uses of the fund balance, he stated this would leave them with \$2.9 million for unreserved and undesignated. He stated he had tried to project what that fund balance will be at the end of this year, but he was not prepared to give that projection at this time. There was no action taken in this matter.

New School Property

Alvin Hord gave an update regarding the search for the property for a new school on the north end of the County. He stated they had a meeting before Christmas break. Mr. Hord stated they have asked for an appraisal of one of the pieces of property they are interested in. He stated they are making some progress. There was no action taken in this matter.

Trends and Drop Out Rates in Blount County Schools

Bob Proffitt asked about high risk students and if there was some means of contacting them. Alvin Hord stated they are doing that. He stated a ninth grade counselor had been hired for each school. Mr. Hord stated, only 3%, in Blount County Schools in 2007, of the 12th graders who started as 9th graders, did not complete the 12th grade. He stated the state's goal is 5% or less. He also discussed the "No Child Left Behind" graduation percents. Further discussion followed. There was no action taken in this matter.

PBA and Blount County Schools Future Projects

Don McNelly stated the School Board had not had any formal discussions about this matter. There was no action taken in this matter.

Joe Huff discussed the make-up and needs of the Parks and Recreation department.

This organization is jointly funded by the cities of Alcoa, Maryville and Blount County. Each entity is responsible for the maintenance of the property they own. The Senior Citizen Center is the only jointly owned property.

About 280 acres are presently under the Parks and Rec,s management including parks, trails, Greenways and everything. There is a need for much more, especially in the rural areas.

There is a need for a skateboard park for youth. There is also a need for a dog park so people can walk with their dogs.

Disc golf is a fast growing sport so there is a need for this kind of park.

A steering committee has been formed to look for land. There is a need for a large tract of land (80 to 100 acres) so there could be multiple basketball courts and indoor swimming pools. Blount County is one of the largest counties with no indoor public pools.

There are presently 61 youth basketball teams and 35 adult basketball teams in the county and there is just not enough Gyms to practice in.

We also discussed Mr. Newby's funding proposal presentation along with funding methods. Chairman Sitzlar will consolidate all our funding proposals and rank them. He will e-mail us a list to look over and be prepared to discuss at our next meeting.

The meeting was adjourned.

Our next meeting will be Thursday, January 10th, 2008 in room 315 at the courthouse.

MINUTES OF THE GMAC MEETING JANUARY 10TH, 2008

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Sitzlar. All members were present except Ms. Eastridge and Mr. Guillaume.

Chairman Sitzlar announced that Robert Pritchard had resigned from the committee.

Mr. Newby presented a report on the amount of “Greenbelt rollback taxes” for the last 5 years which shows an average of \$116,113 per year was collected from this source.

Mr. Newby also reported on a conversation he had with Budget Director Dave Bennett where Mr. Bennett said his first choice for raising funds for this project would be an extra penny on the tax rate. His second choice would be a Realty Transfer Fee.

We expressed our opinion that there must be some sort of non-profit organization such as a foundation or Land Trust established to manage the process.

We then started our discussion of the funding options we had identified in our previous meetings.

1. HOTEL/MOTEL TAX. We decided to recommend a 1% increase in this tax which would produce about \$400,000 annually to be divided as follows.

- *.5% going to the purchase or transfer of Development rights.

- *.5% to be divided as the 4% is presently is divided—50% to advertising, 37.5% to the county general fund and 12.5% to the Townsend Visitors Center.

Knoxville and Chattanooga are now at 8%. Pigeon Forge and Gatlinburg are 3% but they have other taxes that we don't.

We expect support from the Visitors Bureau Board since this would increase their revenue.

We may have some resistance from the Hotel/Motel owners.

Chairman Sitzlar to ask Rep. Overby to enter a skeleton bill before the deadline in case it is needed.

2. POSSIBLE SOURCES OF GRANTS.

- *The American Farmland Trust, a Federal program which will cover 50% of the cost to purchase development rights. The landowner must donate 25% and some other group would furnish the other 25% matching funds.

- *The Heritage Conservation Fund.

- *The Wetland reserve Fund.

- *The TWRA “critical” properties Fund, and

- *The Conservation Reserve Fund.

Finding Grant monies would be one of the duties of a Foundation or Trust set up to manage the program.

3. A STATE LICENSE PLATE.

- *Must have a minimum of 500 people willing to buy one.

- *Must be approved by the State Legislature.

- *We expect some resistance from some other Specialty Tag people such as TWRA and the Farm Bureau.

* Chairman Sitzlar will ask Rep. Overby to enter a skeleton bill before the deadline in case this option is approved.

4.DONATION BOX ON PROPERTY TAX NOTICES.

- *Would be administrated by the Trustees office.
- *Funds would go only to the PDR/TDR program.
- *Would be voluntary.
- *Escrow people would not see this request but could make a donation.
- *Property owners in full would see this on their tax bill.
- *Would require extensive marketing/promotion.

5.AN INCREASE OF .5% ON THE LOCAL SALES TAX.

- *Current breakdown of the present 9.25% is 7% to the State. 2.25% local.
- *Breakdown of local- The first 50% divided between Alcoa, Blount County and Maryville Schools according to the Average Daily Attendance. The other 50% goes to the city where it is collected or to the county if collected outside any city.
- *The local rate can be raised to 2.75% by vote of the County Commission or by referendum of the people.(May need to be the same way the 2.25% was approved)
- *We would like to see the .5% split 50% to schools and 50% to the PDR/TDR program.
- *J. C. and Bill to clarify how the local sales tax is set up. Can the State take the other .5% local without amending state law??

6.GREENBELT ROLLBACK TAXES.

- *In 2006 this tax generated \$114,391.
- *Rollback tax is Tennessee State law.
- Three Categories as follows:
 - *Development value minus Agriculture value= tax base X 3yrs.
 - *Development value minus open space value = tax base X 5yrs.
 - *Development value minus open space easement value = tax base X 10yrs.
- *What % of rollback taxes to ask for?
- *Is directly related to PDR/TDR.

7.PROPERTY TAX.

- *Ask the Budget Committee to set aside 1 penny on the tax rate in the next budget for the PDR/TDR program.
- *Would generate about \$255,000 annually.
- *Carol Evans info on land value.
- *American Farmland Trust cost of services study in Blount County:
 - For every dollar (\$1) collected in tax from residential areas it cost \$1.23 in services.
 - For every dollar(\$1) collected in tax from Industrial and Commercial areas 25 cents is spent on services.
 - For every dollar(\$1) collected in tax from farm and forest land services cost 41 cents.

We will discuss the remaining funding possibilities at our next meeting at 7PM on January 22.

The Court Security Committee for the Fifth Judicial District met in special, called session on the 10th day of January, 2008.

Present at the meeting were the County Mayor, the Sheriff, the District Attorney General, the Presiding Judge of the Fifth Judicial District and the Circuit Court Clerk.

It is noted that the Fifth Judicial District Court Security Committee exists pursuant to the mandates of **Tennessee Code Annotated § 16-2-505 (d) (2)**, all for the purpose of examining courtroom space and its facilities in order to determine the security needs and to provide safe and secure facilities.

The Clerk advised that the Blount County Purchasing Department had placed items for bid, pursuant to applicable law, all in relationship to a grant to be administered by the Administrative Office of the Courts in an amount not to exceed \$33,300.00 for security enhancements listed in the proposal submitted to the Administrative Office of the Courts.

The Clerk further advised that bids had been received, opened and reviewed by the Blount County Purchasing Department, all pursuant to applicable law. The motion further provided that a copy of these minutes serve as evidence for the Blount County Purchasing Department to show proof and acceptance of said bid.

5. Old Business

Make Up Of Ethics Committee

Chair Reeves reported to the Committee that Betsy Cunningham had resigned and included in the Ethics Committee meeting packet was a copy of a letter, which was for information only, from the County Mayor recommending John Paul Davis, Jr., to fill this vacancy. BLOUNT COUNTY GOVERNMENT CODE OF ETHICS

Section 1. Definitions.

- (1) "County" means Blount County, which includes all boards, committees, commissions, authorities, corporations or other instrumentalities appointed or created by the county or an official of the county, and specifically including the county school board, the county election commission, the county health department, and utility districts in the county.
- (2) "Officials and employees" means and includes any official, whether elected or appointed, officer, employee or servant, or any member of any board, agency, commission, authority or corporation (whether compensated or not), or any officer, employee or servant thereof, of the county.
- (3) "Personal interest" means, for the purpose of disclosure of personal interests in accordance with this Code of Ethics, a financial interest of the official or employee, or a financial interest of the official's or employee's spouse or child living in the same household, in the matter to be voted upon, regulated, supervised, or otherwise acted upon in an official capacity.

Section 2. Disclosure of personal interest in voting matters.

An official or employee with the responsibility to vote on a measure shall disclose during the meeting at which the vote takes place, before the vote and to be included in the minutes, any personal interest that affects or that would lead a reasonable person to infer that it affects the official's or employee's vote on the measure. In addition, the official or employee may, to the extent allowed by law, recuse himself or herself from voting on the measure.

Section 3. Disclosure of personal interest in non-voting matters.

An official or employee who must exercise discretion relative to any matter other than casting a vote and who has a personal interest in the matter that affects or that would lead a reasonable person to infer that it affects the exercise of the discretion shall disclose, before the exercise of the discretion when possible, the interest on the attached disclosure form and file the disclosure form with the county clerk. In addition, the official or employee may, to the extent allowed by law, recuse himself or herself from the exercise of discretion in the matter.

Section 4. Acceptance of gifts and other things of value.

An official or employee, or an official's or employee's spouse or child living in the same household, may not accept, directly or indirectly, any gift, money, gratuity, or other consideration or favor of any kind from anyone other than the county:

- 1) For the performance of an act, or refraining from performance of an act, that he would be expected to perform, or refrain from performing, in the regular course of his duties; or
- 2) That a reasonable person would understand was intended to influence the vote, official action, or judgment of the official or employee in executing county business.

It shall not be considered a violation of this policy for an official or employee to receive entertainment, food, refreshments, meals, health screenings, amenities, foodstuffs, or beverages that are provided in connection with a conference sponsored by an established or recognized statewide association of county government officials or by an umbrella or affiliate organization of such statewide association of county government officials. It shall not be considered a violation of this policy for an official or employee to receive an occasional meal or other items of nominal value.

Section 5. Ethics Complaints.

A County Ethics Committee (the "Ethics Committee") consisting of five members shall be appointed to one-year terms by the County Mayor with confirmation by the county legislative body, to be appointed each year at the same time as internal committees of the county legislative body. At least three members of the committee shall be members of the county legislative body; one member shall be a constitutional county officer or, should no constitutional county officer be willing to accept appointment, an additional member of the county legislative body; and the remaining member may be either a member of a board, committee, commission, authority, corporation, or other instrumentality governed by this policy, or an additional member of the county legislative body. The Ethics Committee shall convene as soon as practicable after their appointment and elect a chair and a secretary. The records of the Ethics Committee shall be maintained by the secretary and shall be filed in the office of the county clerk, where they shall be open to public inspection.

Questions and complaints regarding violations of this Code of Ethics or of any violation of state law governing ethical conduct should be directed to the Ethics Committee. Complaints shall be in writing and signed by the person making the complaint, and shall set forth in reasonable detail the facts upon which the complaint is based.

The Ethics Committee shall investigate any credible complaint against an official or employee charging any violation of this Code of Ethics, or may undertake an investigation on its own initiative when it acquires information indicating a possible violation, and make recommendations for action to end or seek retribution for any activity that, in the Committee's judgment, constitutes a violation of this Code of Ethics. If a member of the Committee is the subject of a complaint, such member shall recuse himself or herself from all proceedings involving such complaint.

The Committee may:

- (1) refer the matter to the County Attorney for a legal opinion and/or recommendations for action;
- (2) in the case of an official, refer the matter to the county legislative body for possible public censure if the county legislative body finds such action warranted;
- (3) in the case of an employee, refer the matter to the official responsible for supervision of the employee for possible disciplinary action if the official finds discipline warranted;
- (4) in a case involving possible violation of state statutes, refer the matter to the district attorney for possible ouster or criminal prosecution;

The interpretation that a reasonable person in the circumstances would apply shall be used in interpreting and enforcing this Code of Ethics. When a violation of this Code of Ethics also constitutes a violation of a personnel policy or a civil service policy, the violation shall be dealt with as a violation of the personnel or civil service provisions rather than as a violation of this Code of Ethics.

Section 6. Applicable State Laws.

In addition to the ethical principles set out in this Code of Ethics, state laws also provide a framework for the ethical behavior of county officials and employees in the performance of their duties. Officials and employees should familiarize themselves with the state laws applicable to their office or position and the performance of their duties. To the extent that an issue is addressed by state law (law of general application, public law of local application, local option law, or private act), the provisions of that state law, to the extent they are more restrictive, shall control. Following is a brief summary of selected state laws concerning ethics in county government. For the full text of these statutes, see the Tennessee Code Annotated (T.C.A.) sections indicated.

Campaign finance-T.C.A. Title 2, Chapter 10. Part One (campaign financial disclosure) requires candidates for public office to disclose contributions and contributors to their campaigns. Part Three (campaign contribution limits) limits the total amount of campaign contributions a candidate may receive from an individual and sets limits on the amount a candidate may receive in cash.

Conflict of interest-T.C.A. § 12-4-101 is the general conflict of interest statute that applies in all counties. It prohibits anyone who votes for, lets out, or in any manner supervises any work or contract from having a direct financial interest in that contract, purchase or work, and it requires disclosure of indirect financial interests by public acknowledgment.

Conflict of interest-T.C.A. § 49-6-2003 applies to the department of education in all counties and prohibits direct and indirect conflicts of interest in the sale of supplies for use in public schools.

Conflict of interest-T.C.A. § 5-1-125 applies in all counties and prohibits county officials and employees from purchasing surplus county property except where it is sold by public bid.

Conflict of interest-T.C.A. § 54-7-203 applies in all counties that are governed by the County Uniform Highway Law. It prohibits officials and employees in the highway department and members of the county legislative body from having any personal interest in purchases of supplies, materials, machinery, and equipment for the highway department.

Conflict of interest-T.C.A. § 5-14-114 applies in counties that have adopted the County Purchasing Law of 1957. It prohibits the purchasing agent, members of the purchasing commission, and all county officials from having any financial or other personal beneficial interest in any contract or purchase of goods or services for any department or agency of the county.

Conflict of interest-T.C.A. § 5-21-121 applies in counties that have adopted the County Financial Management System of 1981. It prohibits all county officials and employees from having any financial or other personal beneficial interest in the purchase of any supplies, materials or equipment for the county.

Conflict of interest-T.C.A. §§ 5-5-102 and 12-4-101 govern disclosures and abstentions from voting due to conflicts of interest of members of county legislative bodies.

Conflict of interest disclosure statements-T.C.A. § 8-50-501 and the following sections require candidates and appointees to local public offices to file a disclosure statement with the state ethics commission listing major sources of income, investments, lobbying activities, professional services provided, bankruptcies, certain loans, and other information, and to keep these statements up to date.

Gifts-T.C.A. § 5-14-114 applies in counties that have adopted the County Purchasing Law of 1957. It prohibits the purchasing agent, members of the purchasing commission, and all county officials from receiving anything of value, directly or indirectly, from anyone who may have or obtain a contract or purchase order with the county.

Gifts-T.C.A. § 5-21-121 applies in counties that have adopted the County Financial Management System of 1981. It prohibits the finance director, purchasing agent, and employees in those departments from accepting anything of value, directly or indirectly, from anyone who furnishes supplies, materials or equipment to the county.

Honoraria-T.C.A. § 2-10-116 prohibits elected officials from accepting an honorarium (including money or anything of value, but not including reimbursement for actual expenses) for an appearance, speech, or article in their official capacity.

Private use of public property-T.C.A. § 54-7-202 applies in counties that are governed by the County Uniform Highway Law. It prohibits the private use of equipment, rock, and other highway materials.

Court sales-T.C.A. § 39-16-405 prohibits judges, clerks of court, court officers, and employees of court, from bidding on or purchasing any property sold through the court for which such person discharges official duties.

Rules of the Supreme Court- Rule 10, Cannon 5 (Code of Judicial Conduct) establish all rules for judges and other court personnel when exercising judicial functions.

Fee statutes-T.C.A. §§ 8-21-101, 8-21-102, and 8-21-103 set out circumstances where fees are authorized, prohibit officials from requiring payment of fees in advance of performance of services except where specifically authorized, and set penalties for charging excessive or unauthorized fees.

Consulting fee prohibition for elected county officials-T.C.A. §§ 2-10-122 and 2-10-124 prohibit officials from receiving compensation for advising or assisting a person or entity in influencing county legislative or administrative action.

Crimes involving public officials-T.C.A. § 39-16-101 and the following sections prohibit bribery, soliciting unlawful compensation, and buying and selling in regard to offices.

Official misconduct-T.C.A. § 39-16-402 applies to public servants and candidates for office and prohibits unauthorized exercise of official power, acting in an official capacity exceeding the servant's power, refusal to perform a duty imposed by law, violating a law relating to the servant's office or employment, and receiving a benefit not provided by law.

Official oppression-T.C.A. § 39-16-403 prohibits abuse of power by a public servant.

Bribery for votes-T.C.A. §§ 2-19-121, 2-19-126, and 2-19-127 prohibit bribery of voters in elections.

Misuse of official information-T.C.A. § 39-16-404 prohibits a public servant from attaining a benefit or aiding another person in attaining a benefit from information *which* was obtained in an official capacity *and* is not available to the public.

Ouster law-T.C.A. § 8-47-101 sets out conduct that is punishable by ouster from office, including misconduct in office and neglect of duty.

**TO ADOPT A CODE OF ETHICS FOR OFFICIALS AND EMPLOYEES
OF BLOUNT COUNTY GOVERNMENT**

WHEREAS, Section 49 of the Comprehensive Governmental Ethics Reform Act of 2006, 2006 Public Chapter 1 (1st Ex. Sess.), (the "Ethics Reform Act") requires county legislative bodies to adopt certain ethical standards by resolution on or before June 30, 2007; and

WHEREAS, the County Technical Assistance Service (CTAS) is directed to prepare and disseminate a model of ethical standards which may be adopted by counties in compliance with the Ethics Reform Act; and

WHEREAS, County desires to adopt the CTAS model of ethical standards as the Code of Ethics for Blount County;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Blount County legislative body meeting in regular session at Maryville, Tennessee, on this 19th day of 2007 that:

SECTION 1. The model of ethical standards developed by CTAS and attached to this resolution is hereby adopted as the Code of Ethics for Blount County.

SECTION 2. Upon approval of this resolution, the County Clerk is directed to:

- (a) Mail a copy of this resolution to the State Ethics Commission; and
- (b) Mail a copy of this resolution and the attached Code of Ethics to each County office governed thereby, including all boards, committees, commissions, authorities, corporations or other instrumentalities appointed or created by the county or an official of the county, and specifically including the county school board, the county election commission, the county health department, and utility districts in the county; and
- (c) Post a copy of the Code of Ethics on each public bulletin board in the County Courthouse.

SECTION 3. This resolution shall take effect upon its passage and approval, the public welfare requiring it.

ETHICS POLICY PROCEDURE

PURPOSE

To provide a quick, effective and consistently applied method to address concerns regarding potential violations of the Ethics Policy and to have those concerns resolved in a timely manner.

It is Blount County Government's intent to be responsive to all perceived violations and to investigate all written complaints.

PROCEDURE

Step One:

a) Complete an Ethics Violation Complaint form available on the Blount County Government Website, Blounttn.org/HR and submit the completed form in person to the Human Resources Director and/or their representative. Identification from the individual completing the complaint will be requested.

Step Two:

a) The Human Resources Director will notify the individual a complaint was filed against as well as the appropriate Elected Official/Department Head. The HR Director will work with the appropriate individual named by the Elected Official/Department Head to obtain all information possible regarding the complaint.

b) The complaint and all of the findings related to such will be presented to the Ethics Committee at the next regularly scheduled meeting. (A special called meeting may be conducted if the seriousness of the situation deems necessary. The County Attorney may also be consulted for clarification regarding the claim if necessary.)

The Ethics Committee will notify in writing, the person filing the complaint, and the individual the complaint was filed against, as soon as administratively possible upon receipt of a complaint. All parties directly involved may be requested to attend the Ethics Committee meeting to facilitate a resolution, if the Committee determines the complaint raises serious questions of fact or interpretation of policy. The Ethics Committee will then notify all parties involved of their decision in writing. All parties will be charged with the responsibility of not discussing the situation with any other, until the investigation is completed.

Additional guidance:

a) The committee may, in the case of an official, refer the matter to the county legislative body for possible public censure if the county legislative body finds such action warranted or the District Attorney General. In the case of an employee, refer the matter to the official responsible for supervision of the employee for possible disciplinary action if discipline is warranted, with recommendation from the Ethics Committee.

REPORT TO BLOUNT COUNTY COMMISSION –JANUARY 2008

I. Introduction:

This report to the Blount County Commission is the report for January 2008. I will continue to provide you this report on a quarterly basis so that you may be informed of hospital activities, services and progress. This report addresses many items, which I hope are of interest to you, regarding hospital operations and activities including a Statistical Report, Financial Reports, and a report on other hospital projects and services.

In addition, I make every effort to attend each of your quarterly meetings in order to be available for questions or clarifications on this report and any other hospital activities.

II. Statistical Reports: (Please see the attached Statistical Report.)

Our volume of business for the first five months of this fiscal year has been below this year's budget, as well as last year's actual volume of both inpatient and outpatient care. This is true for other area hospitals and hospitals across the state due to the downturn in our economy, as well as changes in insurance made by employers shifting more of the cost of healthcare to their employees.

November 2007 was a below budget month both statistically and financially for the hospital.

Admissions for the month of November 2007, were 11.7% below budget at 918, and 5.6% below prior year.

Patient days were 3,840, are 11.1% below budget and 10.1% below prior year.

Average length of stay for November was 4.2 days, which is the same as budget and .2 of a day less than prior year. For the first four months of this fiscal year, admissions are 4,840, which is 5.7% below budget and 2.1% less than prior year.

Total patient days for the first five months are 20,046, which are 7.1% below budget and 2.5% below prior year.

Our length of stay for the first five months has been 4.2 days, which is equal to budget and prior year. Financially, November 2007, reflects gross patient revenues of \$36,430,000, which is \$3,207,000, or 8.1% below budget. Net patient revenues of \$12,116,000 are \$1,170,000, or 8.8% below budget.

III. Financial Report: (Please see the attached Financial Report.)

Total operating revenues of \$13,120,000 are \$1,306,000, or 9.1% below budget.

Expenses of \$13,471,000, were \$502,000, or 3.6% below budget, with salaries benefits and contract salaries as a percent of operating revenue of 60.88%, compared to a budget of 56.74%.

Operating loss for the month was \$351,000, compared to a budgeted gain of \$453,000, which resulted in a \$804,000 deficiency in operating income.

Bottom line for the month of \$112,000, is \$866,000 below budgeted bottom line of \$973,000.

For the year gross patient revenues, net patient revenues, total operating revenues, total expenses, operating income and bottom line are below budget by 4.2%, 3.7%, 3.7%, .7%, 143.5%, and 44.3% respectively. Operating loss for the year is \$646,000, which is \$2,132,000 below budget, while bottom line of \$2,290,000 is \$1,821,000 below budget.

Year-to-date, 2007, compared to 2006, shows gross patient revenues, net patient revenues, total operating revenues, total expenses, have grown by 4.2%, 2.1%, 2.2%, and 7% respectively. Operating loss, compared to prior year's operating income, is a swing of \$3,102,000, from a gain of \$2,456,000 in November of 2006, to a \$646,000 loss through November 2007, while bottom line has declined from \$4.6 million for the five months of 2006 to \$2,290,000 for 2007.

Year-to-date, salaries, benefits and contract salaries as a percent of operating revenue are 59.6%, compared to prior year of 56.15%.

Significant balance sheet changes for the month were growth in gross accounts receivable of \$2,228,000, net accounts receivable of \$578,000, property, plant and equipment additions of \$908,000, and a decrease in cash and cash equivalence of \$3,097,000. This decline in cash and cash equivalence is mainly attributable to a \$2,728,000 decline in current liabilities, with \$1,502,000 reduction in trade accounts payable and \$1,298,000 decline in interest payable.

Fortunately, our hospital is in a strong financial position to easily weather volume and financial downturns and in fact continue to operate the hospital with a positive cash flow and a total net gain. Without difficulty we are generating sufficient revenue to meet all of our short-term and long-term financial needs as well as to continue to meet our projected growing capacity needs and capital improvements.

IV. Other Hospital Matters:

A. MRI: I am pleased to report to you that we are adding a new technology component to our Breast Health Center, the Breast MRI. This new diagnostic capability provides more detailed and accurate information in the diagnosis of breast cancer. Attached to this report please see an article published in The Daily Times published today, July 14, 2008, regarding this new technology and equipment for our patients.

- B 5-East Patient Unit: I am pleased to inform you that this week we will be opening a new 40-bed inpatient and outpatient Oncology Unit. As part of our efforts to improve our overall comprehensive cancer care services, we have recently completed renovation on an old inpatient unit into a new modern state-of-the-art unit for both inpatient care and outpatient oncology and chemotherapy services.

- C. Meetings: As you recall last year the County Commissioners, County Mayor and County Vice Mayor, were invited to the hospital and a presentation on the hospital. This year I will be asking to meet with each County Commissioner individually. I think this will be important to give each Commissioner an opportunity to give me their views on the hospital and address any questions or concerns individually. Ms. Anne Thompson, my executive assistant, will be contacting you over the next several weeks to schedule a time to meet with each of you. The meeting should last no longer than 30 minutes. In advance, I appreciate the opportunity to meet with each of you.

Breast MRI imaging added to breast health center's offerings

Blount Memorial Hospital
 The Blount Memorial Breast Health Center now has the capability to offer breast MRI screenings following yearly mammograms for women who are at an especially high risk of developing breast cancer.
 The newly implemented, \$1 million technology upgrade allows for the earlier detection of smaller breast cancers, and it's recommended for those with a strong family history of breast cancer, those who've recently been diagnosed with breast cancer and those women who know they are carriers of the breast cancer gene, BRCA1 or BRCA2.

The American Cancer Society guideline of using breast MRI scans as an additional diagnostic tool, announced in 2007, helps give doctors a better chance of finding breast cancer at the earliest stage possible, when it's easier to treat and the chance of survival for the patient is greatest.

"The breast MRI (scan) can find early cancers that mammograms sometimes can't pick up," says radiologist Dr. Dan Dovgan, who explains the images the scans can return are of such high resolution that any questionable spots can be identified and reviewed. "Traditional mammograms look at the breasts' tissue density and calcifications, while the MRI scans enhance lesions and identify areas of increased blood flow in the breast, which could signal very early breast cancer."

The scans also are beneficial to women who have recently been diagnosed with breast cancer, as about 3 percent of patients who develop cancer in one breast also develop it in the other, according to Dovgan. MRI scans that come back positive then allow patients and their doctors to prepare for a biopsy and make treatment decisions, which may spare patients from extra rounds of surgery and chemotherapy.

Additionally, the ACS says breast MRI scans are recommended for women who have had radiation to the chest between the ages of 10 and 30, and for women who have Li-Fraumeni syndrome, Cowden syndrome, or Bannayan-Riley-Ruvalcaba syndrome or a first-degree relative — parent, sibling or child — with any of these syndromes.

Because breast MRI scans are not recommended for most mammography patients, radiologists work closely to identify a woman's previous medical history before suggesting the diagnostic procedure. Patients who have a breast tissue expander, cardiac pacemaker, implanted cardiac defibrillator, aneurism clip or certain other implanted medical devices can not have a breast MRI scan. Additionally,

patients currently taking hormone replacement therapies are asked to talk to their doctors about stopping administration for 30 days prior to their exams.

Patients who can benefit from the screen lie on their stomachs for the scan, which takes roughly 30 minutes to complete. An IV is necessary to administer a contrast medium, which helps doctors see breast abnormalities. A female technician always accompanies patients, and results are

sent to the patients' doctors within a few days.

"The addition of the breast MRI allows the Breast Health Center to provide comprehensive breast health care," says Dovgan. "With this addition, the center meets all recommendations set forth by the American College of Radiology and the ACS." While meeting the recommendations of nationally recognized cancer care and diagnostic imaging societies is important, Dovgan says, "The most

important thing is that we can use this tool to detect breast cancer in its earliest, most-treatable stage."

Dovgan reminds all women that they should have an annual mammogram and breast exam by a physician beginning at age 40, and most high-risk women should begin getting MRIs and mammograms at age 30, unless their doctors advise otherwise.

Additionally, women should be performing self breast exams at home on a routine basis.
